



I hope that every taxpayer and individual interested in education will read the Roger Babson column on this page. What Babson has to say is not new, but important enough

to bear repeating over and over. Personally, I do not think that any of his suggestions are impractical. While everyone wants the best education possible for our children, we must also be practical enough to get the very most

for what we must spend. As Babson points out, many people will not agree with his appraisal. Others would go even further in economies.

Most important, however, is the fact that it has become absolutely necessary to seek out economies, whether we like being practical or not.

I see nothing wrong in mass-produced, basic design schoolhouses. We do it in our subdivisions to cut down the cost of our homes. It might stagger the architects and dent the pride of community planners who envision ivory towers that symbolize the spirit of their hometown, but it makes good business sense

Few school districts face greater expansion in the immediate future than Northville. Few have less oportunity to expand their tax base with industry.

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



Annexation Suit Goes Into Court

The city of Northville and Warren Products were scheduled to return to court today in another legal step towards settlement of an annexation election held last November 19.

The Baseline road firm took the city to court for the second time last December in an attempt to avoid annexation t the city. The November 19 vote favored annexation of the 220-acre site in which the plant is located by a 159 to 32 majority in the city and nine to five in the area annexed. Today attorneys representing Warren and the city are expected to appear briefly before the Oakland county circuit court after which they will probably be asked to submit

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Land Sale Holding Up Work on It

Plans for a multi-million dollar race track and sports pavilion in Novi are still very much alive, The Novi News was told this week.

Only a stalemate over sale of the track site has been holding up construction, said B. F. Gregoric, one of the principle back ers of the track.

Gregoric said construction of the \$5,500,000 structure can begin "immediately" after the land sale i finally completed.

Gregoric said his group's option on the track site - north of Grand River near Meadowbrook road has run out. The sale is now being re-negotiated with the owner of the site, Dr. August Holcomb. The race track issue has been

dormant for more than a year, and many Novi residents and some officials have speculated that plans for the elaborate sports center had died a quiet death. Gregoric refuted this mphatically. "We are very certain that the
