# Delay Lincoln Village for Year

## Wixom Set For Election On Monday

Wixom will determine Monday whether the once-obscure crossroads community shall become the state's newest city. Hundreds of voters are expected to go to the polls to decide:— whether a proposed city charter shall be accepted.

— and who shall serve as the city's first mayor, council and justice of the peace.

Odds are that Wixom will approve the charter by a wide margin. It has been thoroughly aired at public meetings, and has incurred little opposition.

But who will end up in the mayor's and council seats is not clear by any means.

Spirited campaigning by the three mayoral candidates—Incumbent Village President Joseph Stadnik, Wesley McAtee and Lawrence Schardt—has been going on for some weeks and probably will continue through election day.

## Questions and Answers About Proposed Charter

The 100 or more persons who attended Thursday night's charter hearing had some penetrating questions on their minds. Here are some of the queries asked at the charter commission and some of the answers which it in turn tossed back.

Q. Should not the elector, treasurer and possibly other officers be elected rather than appointed? Wouldn't this make them more responsible to the public?

A. This would be unwise. Such officers then could be removed only by a lengthy, expensive public recall rather than simply by firing them. In addition the public has control over them through the elected council. Besides, these officers should be directly responsible to the council.

Q. Shouldn't all appointees be residents of Novi?

A. Some appointed jobs (attorney, public works superintendent) require special training. What if no one in Novi has the requirements? And what if no one in Novi wants the job?

Q. What does a village manager do?

A. He handles everyday village business, carries out the council's decisions, and generally does what the township supervisor now does—with approval of the council.

Q. Why not elect councilmen by districts or wards instead of at large, so as to prevent the more populous areas from controlling the council?

A. It would be hard to tell where growth is coming and where improvements are likely to be made. Representation by ward would get out and campaign as they should. (An informal show of hands favored a large majority by about 25-6.)

Q. Why not have an elected president instead of appointing him? Wouldn't an appointed president be subject to water in a dispute?

A. No. Once he's appointed, he can't be ousted from the two-year term.

Q. As for roads, wouldn't a lot of the expected income have to be spent on equipment?

A. Yes, but it could be spread over a period of years. Technically, the money can't be used for buying equipment—only maintenance. But the village could buy it out of general funds and then rent it to itself, paying the rent out of road money. It amounts to the same thing.

Q. Wouldn't the township lose the \$7,000 in road money that it now gets?

A. Yes, but the village would gain it—plus another \$46,000 from the state.

Q. Wouldn't there be a dual government and dual taxation if Novi becomes a village?

A. Yes, there would be governments and taxes for both the township and village, but the township's role would be so limited that it wouldn't cost much. Duplication would be avoided by having the village take care of some matters, and the township handle others.

Q. Shouldn't the charter set the percentage of true value at which assessments are going to be figured? Otherwise, taxes could be increased simply by raising the percentage and the millage rate would be meaningless.

A. State law says property must be assessed at true value. Traditionally, of course, assessors figure it at 40 or 50 or perhaps 60 percent, but to write this into a charter would be an open violation of state law, and the charter would be refused by the governor.

Q. If the charter fails to pass, what happens?

A. The commission would write a new one. We have three chances to get a charter passed—over a period of two years. If all three fail, the issue is dead.

## Economic Slowdown Is Blamed

Construction of the proposed 2,000-home Lincoln Village development in western Novi township has been delayed "nine months to a year" because of the current recession.

A spokesman for Thompson-Brown Co., which plans to build the \$40,000 subdivision, said Lincoln Village "definitely has not been abandoned."

"The only change in our plans is the timing," said Ross Campbell, vice president of Thompson-Brown. "Except for a delay of a few months we intend to follow our original plans to the letter."

Those original plans call for some 200 homes to be built within the next five year on a 70-acre site immediately south of Wixom, straddling Wixom road. It would eventually include a shopping center, apartment house area, and community water and sewer system.

Lincoln Village would be one of the largest developments in Detroit history, and the biggest boon yet to Novi's growth.

Campbell said the decision to delay construction is based on "current unsettled economic conditions," especially in the automobile industry.

He said Thompson-Brown is not concerned with the possibility that many potential home owners would be connected with the auto industry, but more with the fact that the auto industry determines the Detroit area's general economic situation.

"It wouldn't be good business to invest this much money until we see signs that Detroit is getting back on its feet," he said.

Plans for the huge development were announced last November, shortly before the recession began taking shape. At that time, Thompson-Brown hoped to have several hundred homes built by the end of this year.

So far, no work has been done on the site except for the drilling of one well.

Campbell revealed that plans for a revolutionary new sewage disposal plant have been dropped. The plant, which would have been a \$10-million investment, failed to get approval of the state health department.

"The health department has completed engineering plans for a new type of plant, and are in the process of getting their approval," he added. "It's four years on a staggered basis with the present serving a two-year term."

Day-by-day business would be handled by a full-time village manager, who would be hired by the township and would be subject to its orders.

All other officers (treasurer, clerk, public works superintendent and the like) would be appointive.

Meetings would be held twice monthly, but special meetings could be called.

Special Assessments  
In general, capital improvements (sewers, water, and so on) would be paid for by special assessment of homeowners who benefit.

Action may be started either by petitions signed by homeowners or by action of the council. The latter would require approval of at least 60 percent of the persons fronting on the improvement area.

A public hearing on the special assessment would have to be held.

## Wixom Council Bows Out; \$104,000 Budget Studied

Wixom's village council probably conducted its last meeting to consider the state maintenance revenue will be used to pay for this service.

Discussion of the proposed post office site resulted in a council opinion that, although the site was not considered desirable, a building permit would be issued upon request. ### Northville Council Proceedings

A postponed regular meeting of the Northville City Council was held at the City Hall Wednesday evening, May 7, 1958 at 8 p.m.

Present: Mayor Allen, Councilmen Subenwolf, Canterbury, Reed and Welch.

Minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved.

The following bills were presented for payment:

General Fund, \$10,124.21

Other Government, \$555.56

Water Fund, \$434.58

Moved by Reed, seconded by Canterbury that these bills be allowed and paid. Carried.

Mayor Allen welcomed a group of students from Mr. Meaker's class who were present to observe, and introduced them to the members of the City Council.

Under the heading of communications, a card of thanks was read from Mrs. Claude N. Ely and family. A letter was also read from Michigan West headquarters asking that a report be sent to them on the meeting attended by our representatives.

The City Clerk reported that she had received a call from Mrs. Ida Cooke, of 516 Rouge St. again requesting that the City sell her the alley on the West side of her house as it is an eyesore in its present condition and her neighbor is piling stones and tree trunks in it. The City Manager was asked to look into the situation over and report back his findings to the Council.

Under the heading of communications, a card of thanks was read from Mrs. Green, of 128 E. Cady St., expressed the opinion that so long as the City is having a water main it is wished to call their attention to the partially burned-down house belonging to Paul Palmer, located at 135 E. Cady. This property has been an eyesore ever before it was burned and Mr. Green feels that in its present condition the City should require Mr. Palmer to demolish the house. He was informed that Mr. Robertson had written the contractor during the month of April to the effect that it would be necessary for him to take steps to remove the house as he would not be allowed to rebuild it and Mr. Palmer has promised to do so within a week. However, up to the present time he has taken no steps in that direction. The City Attorney was instructed to send written notice to Mr. Palmer to the effect that the building must be torn down within 30 days, as under the provisions of our code the City has authority to order its removal.

Sam Bongiovanni, of 228 N. Center St., was present to ask the Council what they were going to do with the creek running across N. Center St., which is adjacent to his property and into which the City is proposing to empty the storm sewer from the new high school. The creek is already washing away the bank on his property and he is wondering what is going to happen when additional water is emptied into it. He was assured that the situation would be investigated and the legal angles looked up before the next regular meeting.

Mr. Penn also reported on the requirements for pumping water to the high school and the equipment that would be necessary to do the job satisfactorily.

The following resolution was then presented:

"WHEREAS, the City of Northville has requested that the proprietors of the Northville Heights Subdivision increase the size of a water main through their subdivision in order that other areas of the City might be better serviced; and

WHEREAS, the contractor who has the job of installing said water line has agreed to install the larger water main and to charge the City only for the increase in cost of the materials and labor occasioned through the installation of the larger water main.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Council for the City of Northville does hereby resolve that there is no benefit to the City to be had in advertising for sealed bids for the above work and therefore waive the requirements.

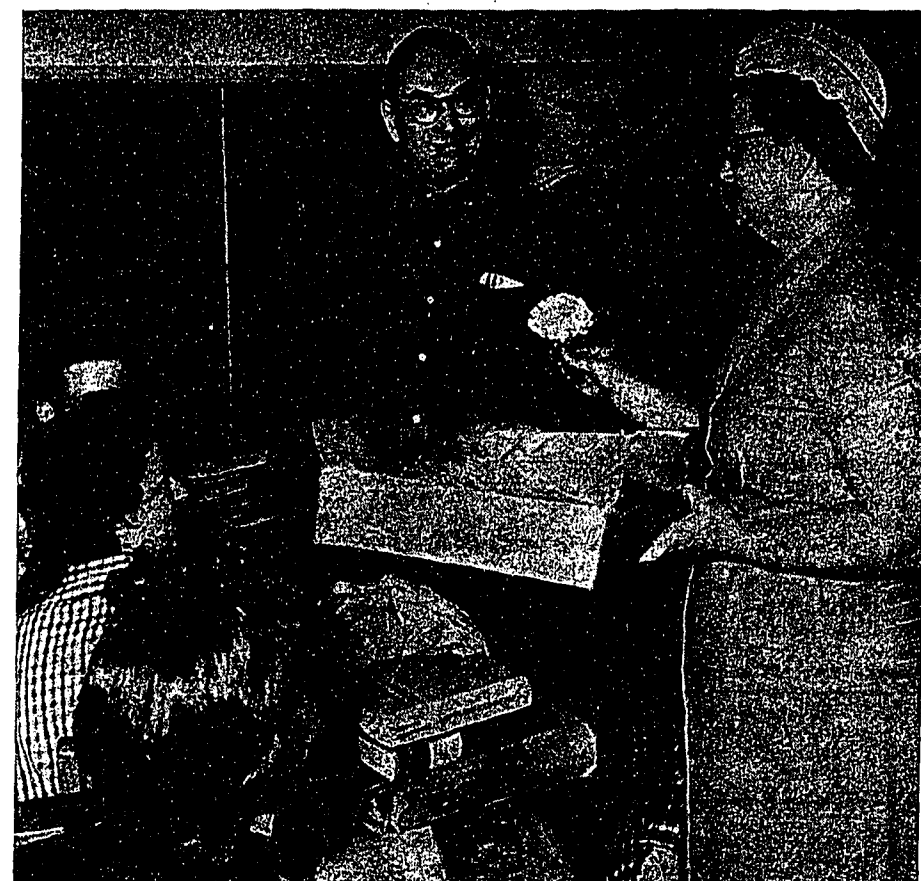

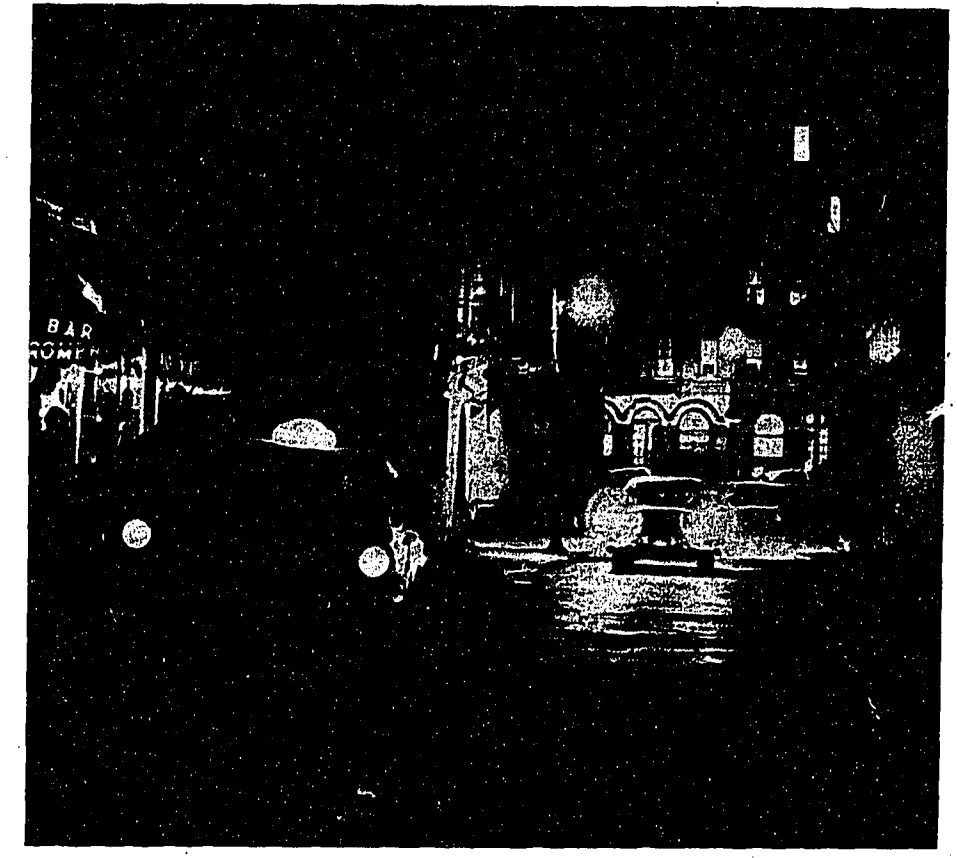

# Northville Township Electrical Ordinance No. 9

**ORDINANCE NO. 9**  
**AN ORDINANCE FOR SAFEGUARDING LIFE AND PROPERTY BY REGULATING AND PROVIDING FOR THE INSPECTION OF THE INSTALLATION AND MAINTENANCE OF ELECTRICAL WIRING, ELECTRICAL DEVICES AND ELECTRICAL MATERIAL; TO PROVIDE FOR THE LICENSING AND REGISTRATION OF ELECTRICAL CONTRACTORS AND THE LICENSING OF JOURNEYMAN ELECTRICIANS IN THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE, WAYNE COUNTY, MICHIGAN; TO PROVIDE A RECIPROCAL ARRANGEMENT FOR THE RECOGNITION OF EXAMINATIONS AND LICENSES ISSUED BY OTHER MUNICIPALITIES IN THE STATE OF MICHIGAN; UNLAWFULLY OPERATING IN THE ENFORCEMENT OF THIS ORDINANCE; TO PROVIDE A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF.**  
 THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE ordains:

**SECTION 1**  
**ELECTRICAL INSPECTION**  
 A. The Northville Township Board hereinafter called the Inspection Authority shall have and hereby is given jurisdiction, subject to review as hereinafter provided, over the inspection of all electrical installations, including changes, repairs and additions thereto within the Township of Northville, Wayne County, Michigan. The Township Board shall appoint an Electrical Inspector who shall inspect all electrical installations and electrical equipment for connection to electric supply systems having voltages over 30 volts, except as provided in Section 4.

**SECTION 2**  
**FEES FOR INSPECTION**  
 A. When an application is made for a permit required under the terms of this ordinance, a fee shall be paid in an amount as prescribed by the Township Board of the Township of Northville.

**SECTION 3**  
**RIGHT OF ACCESS TO BUILDING**  
 A. The Electrical Inspector and/or his deputy shall have the right during reasonable hours to enter any building in the discharge of his official duties or for the purpose of making any inspection or test of the installation of electric wiring, electric devices and/or electrical material contained therein and shall have the authority to cause the turning off of all electric supply and cut or disconnect in cases of emergency, any wire where such electrical currents are dangerous to life or property or may interfere with the work of the Fire Department.

**SECTION 4**  
**PERMITS**  
 A. No alterations or additions shall be made in the existing wiring of any building, nor shall any building be wired for the placing of any electric lights, motors, heating devices, or any apparatus requiring the use of electrical current at a potential over 30 volts, nor shall any alterations be made in the wiring in any building after inspection, without first notifying the Clerk of the Township of Northville and securing a permit therefor. Applications for such permit, describing such work, shall be made by the person, firm, or corporation installing same and permit when issued shall be to such applicant.

**SECTION 5**  
**INSPECTION**  
 A. Upon the completion of the wiring of any building, the Electrical Inspector shall inspect the same to notify the Clerk of the Township of Northville, who shall notify the Electrical Inspector to inspect the installation as soon as possible, and if it is found to be fully in compliance with this ordinance and does not constitute a hazard to life and property, he shall issue to such person, firm, or corporation for delivery to the owner a certificate of inspection authorizing connection to the electric service and the turning on of the current. All wires which are to be hidden from view shall be inspected before concealment and any person, firm or corporation installing such wires shall notify the Clerk of the Township of Northville, giving sufficient time in which to make the required inspection before such wires are concealed.

**SECTION 6**  
**REINSPECTION**  
 A. The Electrical Inspector may make periodically a thorough inspection of the installation in

buildings of all electric wiring, electric devices and electrical material now installed, within the Township of Northville and when the installation of any such wiring, devices and/or material is found to be in a dangerous or unsafe condition, the person, firm or corporation owning, using or operating the same shall be notified and shall make the necessary repairs or changes required to place the wiring, devices and material in a safe condition and have such work completed within fifteen days, or such longer period as may be specified by the Electrical Inspector in said notice. The Electrical Inspector is hereby empowered to disconnect or order the discontinuance of electrical service to such wiring, devices, and/or material so found to be defectively installed until the installation of such wiring, devices and material has been made safe as directed by the Electrical Inspector.

**SECTION 7**  
**CONSTRUCTION REQUIREMENTS**  
 A. No certificate of inspection shall be issued unless the electrical installation is in strict conformity with the provisions of this ordinance, the statutes of the State of Michigan, the rules and regulations of the State Board of Electrical Examiners as laid down in the National Electrical Code, as approved by the American Standards Association, and in the rules and regulations established as hereinafter provided (Section 10, par. D) shall be prima facie evidence of such approved methods.

**SECTION 8**  
**APPROVED MATERIALS**  
 A. It shall be unlawful to install or use any electrical device, apparatus, or equipment designed for attachment to, or installation on any light or power that is not of good design and construction and safe and adequate for its intended use. The Electrical Inspector shall have power to disapprove the use or installation of devices not fulfilling these requirements. Devices, apparatus and equipment approved by such generally recognized authorities as United States Bureau of Standards, Electrical Testing Laboratories of New York, or Underwriters Laboratories shall be held to have the approval of the Electrical Inspector unless explicitly disapproved by said Authority for reasons of faulty design and poor construction involving danger to persons and/or property.

**SECTION 9**  
**RECORD AND REVIEW**  
 A. The Clerk of the Township of Northville shall keep complete records of all permits issued and inspections made and other official work performed under the provisions of this ordinance.  
 B. When the Electrical Inspector condemns all or part of any electrical installation, the owner may within five days after receiving written notice from the Electrical Inspector file a petition, in writing for review of said action of the Electrical Inspector with the Board of Examiners, upon receipt of which the said Board of Examiners shall at once proceed to determine whether said electrical installation complies with this ordinance and within three days shall make a decision in accordance with its findings.

**SECTION 10**  
**LICENSE FOR ELECTRICAL WORK**  
 A. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, to install, alter or repair electrical wiring, equipment, apparatus or fixtures for light, heat or power purposes where the electromagnetic force exceeds 30 volts in or about buildings and/or structures located within the Township of Northville without first having procured a license.  
 Persons making application must be 21 years of age, shall be a legal citizen as a Journeyman electrician for a period of at least 2 years, and shall have passed a suitable

examination for Contractor's License. Persons, firms or corporations holding such license will be permitted to work in the Township of Northville without the payment of a registration fee. However, if one or more men employed with the above qualifications and experience, the person, firm or corporation owning, using or operating the same shall be notified and shall make the necessary repairs or changes required to place the wiring, devices and material in a safe condition and have such work completed within fifteen days, or such longer period as may be specified by the Electrical Inspector in said notice. The Electrical Inspector is hereby empowered to disconnect or order the discontinuance of electrical service to such wiring, devices, and/or material so found to be defectively installed until the installation of such wiring, devices and material has been made safe as directed by the Electrical Inspector.

examination for Contractor's License. Persons, firms or corporations holding such license will be permitted to work in the Township of Northville without the payment of a registration fee. However, if one or more men employed with the above qualifications and experience, the person, firm or corporation owning, using or operating the same shall be notified and shall make the necessary repairs or changes required to place the wiring, devices and material in a safe condition and have such work completed within fifteen days, or such longer period as may be specified by the Electrical Inspector in said notice. **SECTION 11**  
**EXEMPTIONS**  
 The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to the following:  
 A. The installing of radio receiving sets and equipment. (The installation of convenience outlets for power supply to a radio set shall be subject to such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by the Township of Northville.)  
 B. All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

**SECTION 12**  
**LIABILITY**  
 A. This ordinance shall not be construed to relieve from or lessen the responsibility or liability of any party owning, operating, controlling or installing any electric wiring, electric devices and/or electric material for damages to person or property caused by any defect therein nor shall the Township of Northville be held as assuming any such liability by reason of the repeal.

**SECTION 13**  
**EFFECTIVE DATE**  
 The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety and are hereby ordered to take effect thirty (30) days after final enactment and publication.

**SECTION 14**  
**PENALTY**  
 A. Any person, firm or corporation who shall fail to comply with any of the provisions hereof, shall upon conviction thereof, be subject to a fine of not more than \$100.00 or imprisonment in the Detroit House of Correction in the discretion of the Court, or both, for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days, or by such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court unless otherwise provided in this ordinance.

**SECTION 15**  
**REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES**  
 A. All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

**SECTION 16**  
**LIABILITY**  
 A. This ordinance shall not be construed to relieve from or lessen the responsibility or liability of any party owning, operating, controlling or installing any electric wiring, electric devices and/or electric material for damages to person or property caused by any defect therein nor shall the Township of Northville be held as assuming any such liability by reason of the repeal.

**SECTION 17**  
**EFFECTIVE DATE**  
 The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety and are hereby ordered to take effect thirty (30) days after final enactment and publication.

**SECTION 18**  
**PENALTY**  
 A. Any person, firm or corporation who shall fail to comply with any of the provisions hereof, shall upon conviction thereof, be subject to a fine of not more than \$100.00 or imprisonment in the Detroit House of Correction in the discretion of the Court, or both, for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days, or by such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court unless otherwise provided in this ordinance.

**SECTION 19**  
**EFFECTIVE DATE**  
 The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety and are hereby ordered to take effect thirty (30) days after final enactment and publication.

**SECTION 20**  
**PENALTY**  
 A. Any person, firm or corporation who shall fail to comply with any of the provisions hereof, shall upon conviction thereof, be subject to a fine of not more than \$100.00 or imprisonment in the Detroit House of Correction in the discretion of the Court, or both, for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days, or by such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court unless otherwise provided in this ordinance.

**SECTION 21**  
**EFFECTIVE DATE**  
 The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety and are hereby ordered to take effect thirty (30) days after final enactment and publication.

**SECTION 22**  
**PENALTY**  
 A. Any person, firm or corporation who shall fail to comply with any of the provisions hereof, shall upon conviction thereof, be subject to a fine of not more than \$100.00 or imprisonment in the Detroit House of Correction in the discretion of the Court, or both, for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days, or by such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court unless otherwise provided in this ordinance.

**SECTION 23**  
**EFFECTIVE DATE**  
 The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety and are hereby ordered to take effect thirty (30) days after final enactment and publication.

**SECTION 24**  
**PENALTY**  
 A. Bracing For Inflation

Babson Park, Mass. — Because of the increased government expenditures for missiles, etc., there is much talk about more inflation coming. If Congress would accept the recommendation of the Hoover Commission, there would be no need of increasing the budget. We could save enough to unnecessary and wasteful spending to offset any increase in defense outlays. However, since the Congressmen are up for re-election this year, there is little chance of their making these recommended savings.

Stocks As A Hedge

The general feeling is that stocks are the best hedge against inflation. Let us look at the records: — This talk about inflation started in 1951. Here is what has happened to eight stocks since then. But many readers will say that these are hand-picked. O.K. but let us follow this 1951-1957 list with a more recent one covering 12 other popular stocks with an average 1957 drop of 65.70 percent. In fact, the entire stock market declined about 20 percent. Surely, none of the stocks below would have been good hedges against inflation.

LAND AS A HEDGE

A careful study of different forms of investment teaches me that raw land on a dry ground ten miles or less from a small city or town has the best record as an inflation hedge. To secure such at the right price, it should be purchased before it is thought of for lots for development. However, even then, with roads, electricity, water and sewage, it gives one real security. This may be more important than profit. Such land or small farms just outside a town limit should be excellent hedges.

If you do not want to be bothered with the taxes and care of such land which you do not expect to occupy just as a hold for speculation your broker will name some land companies whose stocks are listed on a stock exchange. In fact, some railroads are worth more as land companies than as railroads. Some Canadian mining companies with valuable underground deposits of ore should also be good hedges against inflation if bought at low depreciated prices. They are off now about 50 percent — suffering from the big boom of a few years ago.

CASH IN THE BANK

Personally, I like best now putting my savings in the bank, at 3 1/2 percent interest. Of course, your broker may tell you such bank deposits are poor hedges against inflation. It is true that the purchasing power of a bank account for food, clothing and shelter will decline as the cost of living increases. However, I would not want to have my funds in a bank account too long. But such a loss of interest or decline in purchasing power, over a few years, is not notable compared with the possible decline in stock prices during said period.

Michigan Mirror Night Visitors at Northville State

GOVERNMENT economy has lost a few skirmishes but has won a major battle in Michigan. When the dust cleared following the 1958 legislative session, which stuck to reducing spending programs the lawmakers who hold the purse strings seemed to have come out on top.

Now, pointing directly at Republican budget cuts, Williams said the Michigan State University, was the first to announce revised plans for operation.

It is clear that the more than \$1,000,000 cut from the 1957-58 budget crimped programs at the university; that the going would be tougher next year. He also showed continued concern over inability to prepare properly for increased state loads expected in the near future.

"But we still can operate a good university without major damage to our programs," he said. He predicted that less important programs and some of the services that are valuable but not basic can be dropped or reduced in scope to fit the budget cuts.

More agreement came from Dr. Albert E. Heintz, state health commissioner, whose budget cuts hurt his agency as much or more than they did some others.

Even programs as small (\$10,000) but important as the fight against "swimmer's itch" were abolished. Dr. Heintz called for all people to reconsider the impact of the taxpayer before complaining about less money to spend in state government.

"We should all do some soul-searching before throwing up our hands," he said. Heintz' statements are important. He is an appointee of Gov. Williams, who has argued for years that the state should expand its services and levy taxes to finance them.

GOV. WILLIAMS' reasons for trying for his sixth consecutive term as chief executive made more news than the announcement of his candidacy. No one was surprised when he said he would run. Anyone who didn't know it just hasn't been paying attention.

The stage was set months ago when Williams said that he and Lt. Gov. Philip A. Hart would run for senator and governor, respectively, from saying who would do what. Hart then announced for the U.S.

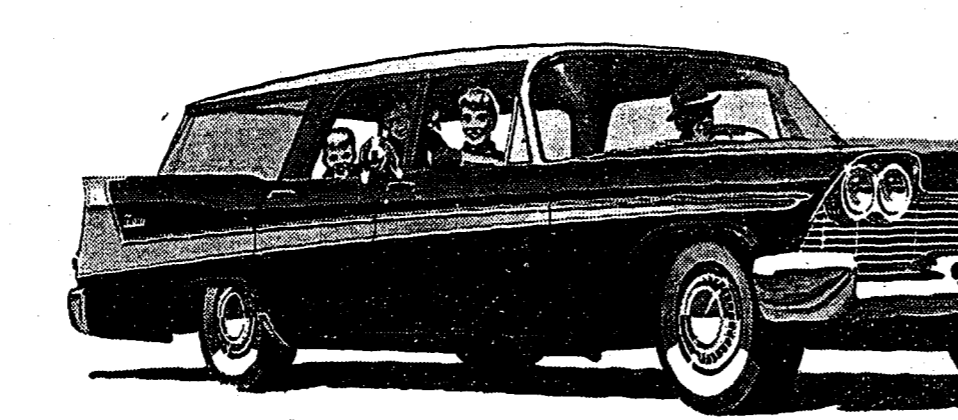
