Traditionally, of course, assessors figure it at 40 or 50 or perhaps 80 bercent. but to write this into a charter would be an open violation of state law, and the charter would be refused by the governor.

Q. If the charter fails to pass, what happens? A. The commission would write a new one. We have three chances to get a charter passed - over a period of two years. If all three fail, the issue is dead.

CASH IN THE BANK Personally, I like best now put ting my savings in the bank at 31/3 percent interest. Of course, your broker may tell you such bank deposits are poor hedges against in-flation. It is true that the purchasing power of a bank account for food ,clothing and shelter will decline as the cost of living increases Therefore, I would not want to leave my funds in a bank account too long. But such a loss of interest or decline in purchasing power, over a few years, it not notable com pared with the possible decline in stock prices during said period. When people ask me the bes fertilizer for an orange grove I always say: "The footprints of the owner." Hence, I believe that the best of all possible land purchase for an inflation hedge is land adjoining what you now own. Thi you can watch and make more valuable. Of course, you would not buy land anywhere that you did not first see. There is much land "outdoors" and no reader will see any one get a monopoly of it. In short I believe inflation is slowly coming as it always has been; but it is nothing to get panicky about.
