Bracing For Inflation

Babson Park, Mass. — Because of the increased government expenditures for missiles, etc., there is much talk about more inflation coming. If Congress would accept the recommendation of the Hoover Commission, there would be no need of increasing the budget. We could save enough to meet our military and space needs without increasing the deficit. However, some members are up for re-election this year, there is little chance of their making these recommendations.

Stocks As A Hedge

The general feeling is that stocks are the best hedge against inflation. Let us look at the records: — This talk about inflation started in 1951. Here is what has happened to eight stocks since then. But many readers will say that these are hard to pick. O.K. but let us follow this 1951-1957 list with a more recent one covering 12 other popular stocks with an average 1957 drop of 65.0 percent. In fact, the entire stock market declined about 30 percent. Surely, none of the stocks below would have been good hedges against inflation.

LAND AS A HEDGE

A careful study of different forms of investment teaches me that raw land on a dry ground ten miles or less from a small city or town has the best record as an inflation hedge. To secure such at the right price, it should be purchased before it is thought of for lots for development. However, even then, with roads, electricity, water and sewage, it gives one real security. This may be more important than profit. Such land or small farms just outside a town limit should be excellent hedges.

If you do not want to be bothered with the taxes and care of such land which you do not expect to occupy but are to hold for speculation your broker will name some land companies whose stocks are listed on a stock exchange. In fact, some railroads are worth more as land companies than as railroads. Some Canadian mining companies with valuable underground deposits of ore should also be good hedges against inflation if bought at low depressed prices. They are off now about 50 percent — suffering from the big boom of a few years ago.

CASH IN THE BANK

Personally, I like best now putting my savings in the bank, at 3 1/2 percent interest. Of course, your broker may tell you such bank deposits are poor hedges against inflation. It is true that the purchasing power of a bank account for food, clothing and shelter will decline as the cost of living increases. However, I would not want to have my funds in a bank account too long. But such a loss of interest or decline in purchasing power, over a few years, is not notable compared with the possible decline in stock prices during said periods. When people ask me the best fertilizer for an orange grove I always say: "The footprint of the owner." Hence, I believe that the best of all possible land purchases for an inflation hedge is land adjoining which you now own. This you can watch and make more valuable. Of course, you would not buy land anywhere that you did not see. There is much land "outdoors" and no reader will see any one get a monopoly of it. In short, I believe inflation is slowly coming as it always has been, but it is nothing to get panicky about.

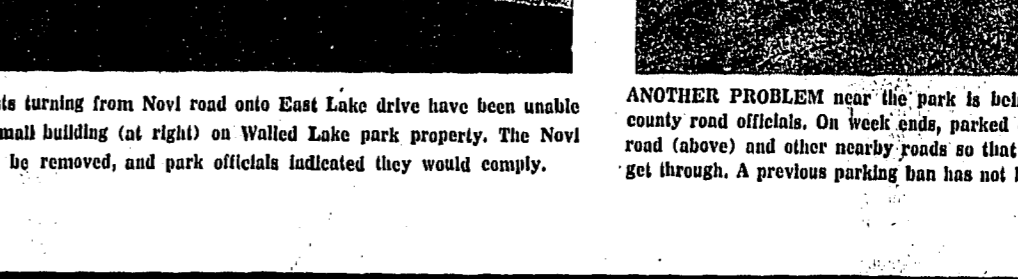

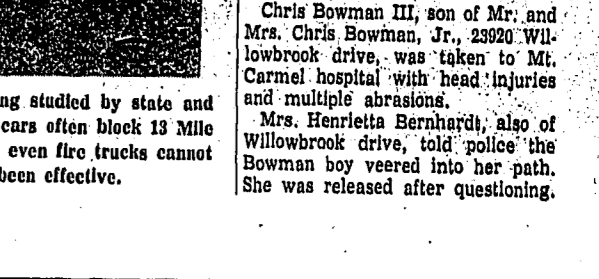

30 Building Permits Issued in 3 Months

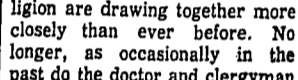
Thirty building permits representing \$163,470 in construction were issued in Northville during February, March and April.

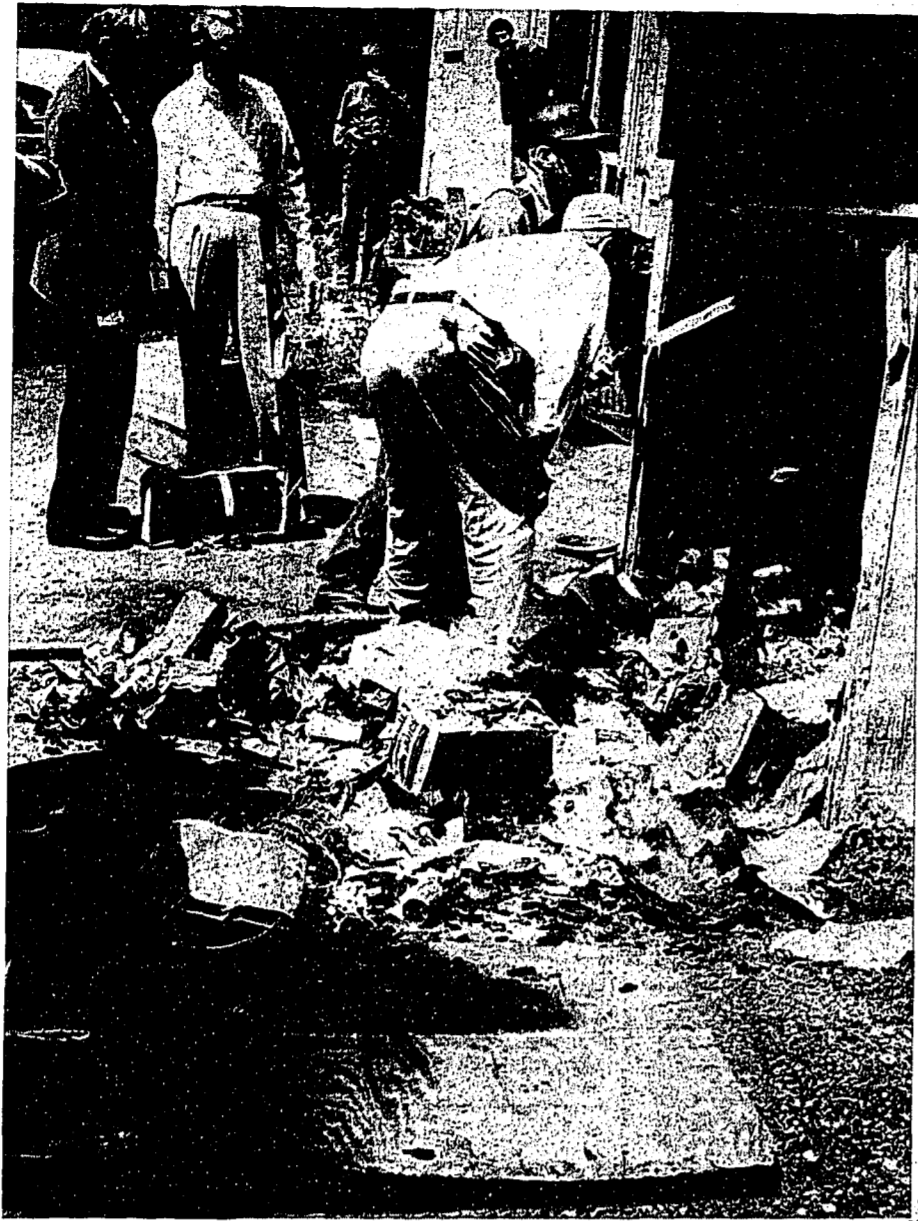

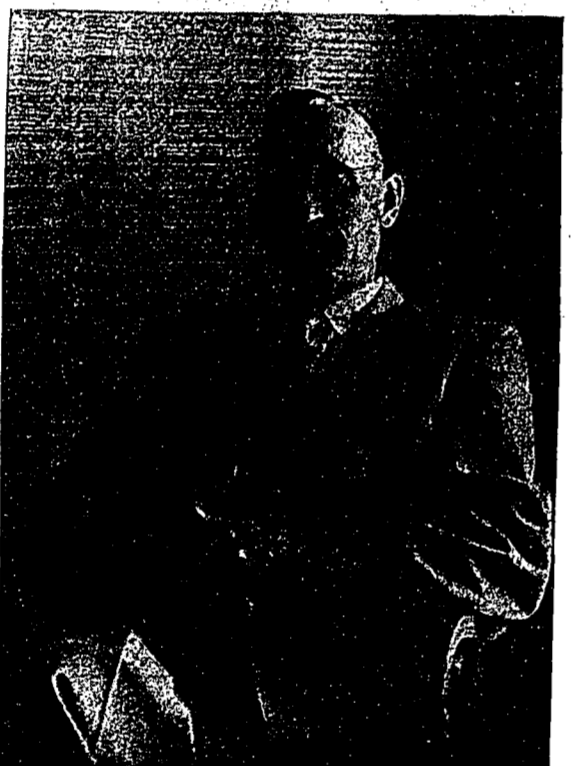

SUBSTITUTES

Nearly everyone has heard the story of the carpenter who was asked to build a house while the wealthy owner took an exhausted tour around the work. A certain amount of money was designated to cover the cost of the building, so the carpenter decided he could pocket all the money he saved in the construction. He made every short-cut and substitution he could. He built the house of inferior materials and pocketed the difference in cost. When the owner returned he was well pleased with the appearance of the house and since the carpenter had been in his employ for many years he decided to give the house to the carpenter in appreciation for his many years of faithful service. The good news was not very well received for the carpenter remembered how he had cheated in the construction and had not profited at all, but had really cheated himself.

This story illustrates many experiences of our everyday lives. All of us are taking short-cuts, substituting inferior materials and deceiving ourselves in many ways. For instance, take note how we substitute good intentions for good deeds. It is so easy to make a good intention satisfy our conscience for something that we could and should have done. Again take note how we make our ideals and dreams take the place of real living. Every person has a high opinion of the kind of person he would like to be but so few are willing to pay the price of loyalty and discipline to actually become the kind of person he ought to be. Furthermore, we substitute appearance for character, glamour for integrity, and a busy round of activities for true devotion to great causes. We substitute devotion to ourselves and our own selfish interests for devotion to great causes. We call attention to ourselves and inflate our own egos when we should be self-forgetting in the service of others. We try to elevate ourselves by knowing the right people instead of following the morals of the masses instead of following the truth. We make weak sentimentality take the place of honest sympathy, and token interest in others, such as sending a card, to take the place of a visit to a sick person.

All in all, the habit of substitution leaves a tragic vacuum at the center of life. If life would be satisfying and meaningful, nothing but the genuine best of ourselves in love, sympathy, gentleness, and goodwill should be used in our daily living. Let us be aware of substitutes in our human relations.

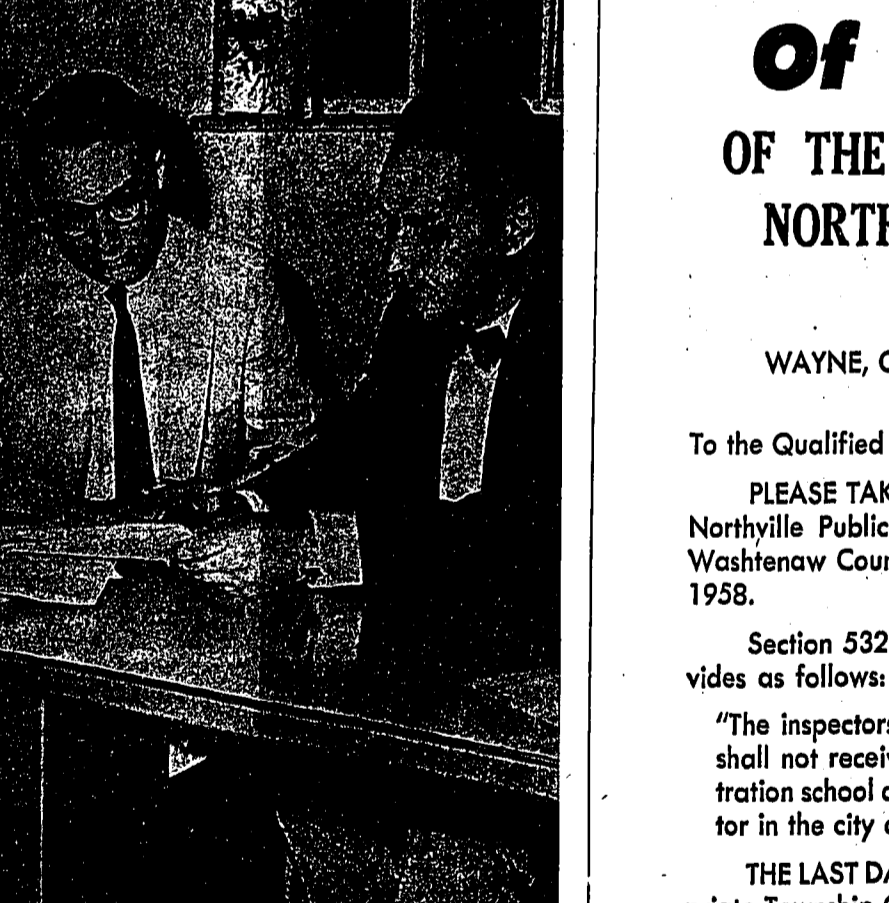

SPEAKING for the Record

Although Northville has little industry to boast about today, Fred Van Atta, 136 East Cady, says it wasn't always the case.

Around the turn of the century this was a booming industrial area, says Van Atta, and he brought a book along to prove it!

At that time the village of Northville was credited with being the largest manufacturing center in Wayne county outside of Detroit and Wyandotte.

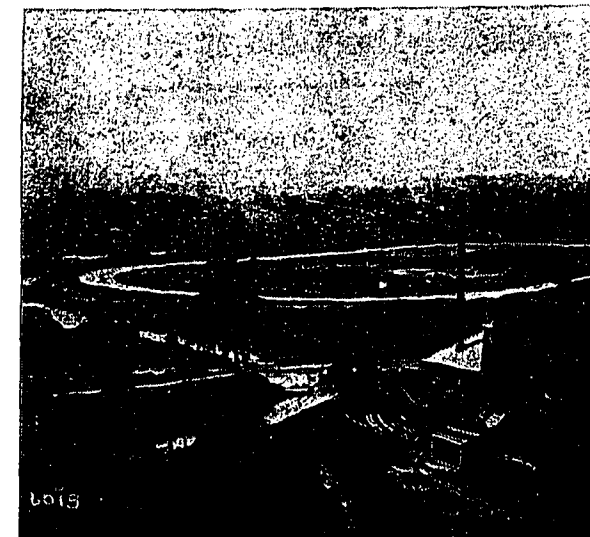
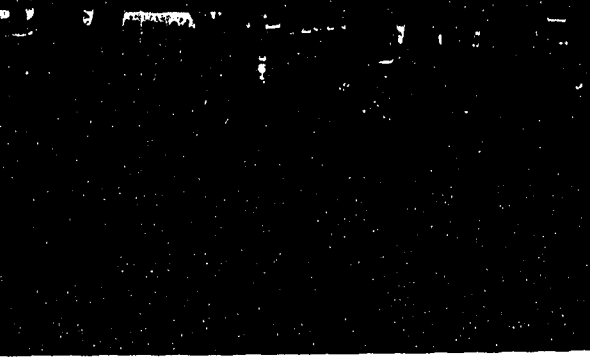
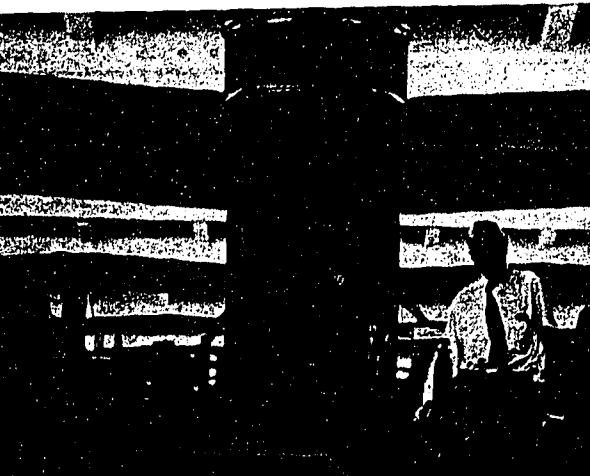
Van Atta is shown below with a giant 24-foot long lathe that is now located in Greenfield Village. The lathe was a gift from Van Atta to Henry Ford.

It was originally used at Meads Mill (now the park area) by a firm manufacturing land rollers. Later it was moved to the prosperous American Bell and Foundry plant located at the site of the recently burned-down Allied plant.

Van Atta came into possession of the lathe when he moved his Superior Churn company into the American Bell and Foundry plant. Earlier he had used the top floor of the Union Manufacturing and Lumber company, now the Ford Valve plant. For six months after Ford purchased the Union Manufacturing plant Van Atta continued to lease the upstairs space and it was then that he became acquainted with Henry Ford. According to Van Atta, Ford was a frequent visitor in Northville.

Later Van Atta leased the use of the huge lathe to Sinton Aircraft for turning nose sections of their airplanes. Finally he called up his friend Henry Ford and offered the lathe for the museum.

While we're reminiscing, below are two other photographs of Northville in the earlier days. The two pictures belong to Leona Parmalee of the Manufacturers National Bank. One is a scene of Northville Downs taken around 1910, while the other is the corner of Main and Center streets where The Record office is now located.
