SPEAKING for the Record

Although Northville has little industry to boast about today, Fred Van Atta, 136 East Cady, says it wasn't always the case.

Around the turn of the century this was a booming industrial area, says Van Atta, and he brought a book along to prove it!

At that time the village of Northville was credited with being the largest manufacturing center in Wayne county outside of Detroit and Wyandotte.

Van Atta is shown below with a giant 24-foot long lathe that is now located in Greenfield Village. The lathe was a gift from Van Atta to Henry Ford.

It was originally used at Meads Mill (now the park area) by a firm manufacturing land rollers. Later it was moved to the prosperous American Bell and Foundry plant located at the site of the recently burned-down Allied plant.

Van Atta came into possession of the lathe when he moved his Superior Churn company into the American Bell and Foundry plant. Earlier he had used the top floor of the Union Manufacturing and Lumber company, now the Ford Valve plant.

Later Van Atta leased the use of the huge lathe to Sinton Aircraft for turning nose sections of their airplanes. Finally he called up his friend Henry Ford and offered the lathe for the museum.

Parade to Honor Novi War Dead

Can Novis Break Jinx In '500'?

Novi's two famous namesakes in the racing world will try again Friday to capture the glory that has eluded them for 12 years.

The two Novi Specials—racing's most popular and most jinxed cars—will be in a field of 34 high-powered juggernauts that will compete for the roses in the Indianapolis '500.

They will take with them a story of heartbreak, drama and death that goes back to 1946 when the first Novi Special roared around the old brickyard in Indianapolis.

Each year the Novis have been the odds-on favorites to win the big ones. But instead, they have broken down in seven of 12 races, killed two of the best drivers in the business, cost their owner upwards of \$300,000, yet never won a race.

This year for the first time, the fantastic cars—built to race only once a year—are not quite the talk of Indianapolis as they have been in the past.

Yet even in trials last week and early this week, the Novis provided more excitement than any of the 50-odd cars that vied for positions in the '500 field.

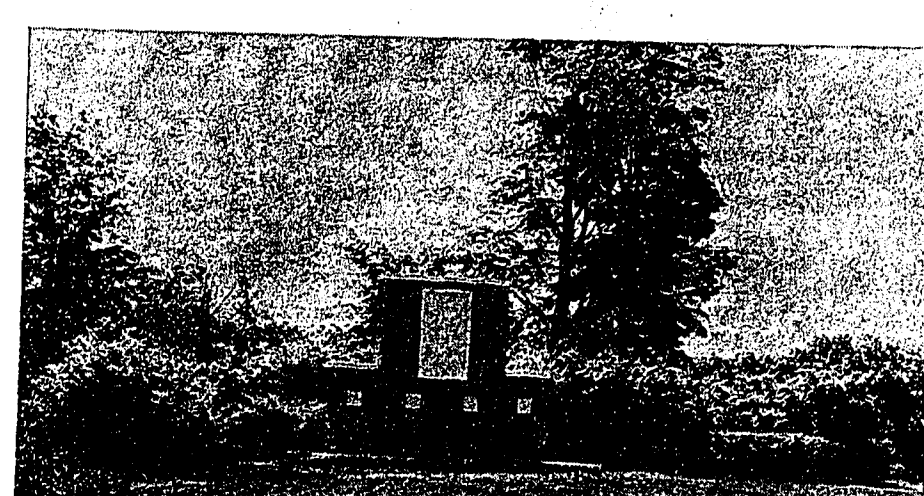
Chesebrough will be joined by Paul Russo, a veteran of 11 previous '500's, in the twin Novi. Last year, Russo burned up the track and led in early rounds but came in far behind when the 500th lap was registered.

Between the two of them, they may finally bring home the roses for owner Lou Welch, president of Novi Equipment' company on Novi road.

The '500' will be broadcast on a nation-wide network Friday, beginning early in the morning and lasting until mid-afternoon.

No one is predicting too much. They've learned not to bet on the jinxed Novis.

But when the field takes off on the grueling grid Friday, more than one racing fan will be inwardly hoping that the Novi finally prove that they are indeed the class of big car racing.

## Northville Artists Prepare for Exhibit



Artists from Northville, Plymouth and Livonia were making final preparations this week for their annual outdoor show in Plymouth a week from Saturday.

Scores of original works will be on display at the Three Cities Art club exhibit, to be held in Kellogg park from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The show, which annually features work by the best creative talent in the area, draws hundreds of viewers from throughout southeastern Michigan.

Members of the club will be on hand to talk with the public and demonstrate their approach in the various media on display.

Among the Northville artists whose work will be shown are Mrs. Don McKenzie, 21404 Summerdale Lane, and Jack Van Haren, an art teacher at Northville high school.

Mrs. McKenzie, a former designer for Hallmark cards in Kansas City, Wichita, Illinois, New York and California, is moving to Northville.

Her paintings, she says, are "derived from an expression not seen with the eye or an impression not voiced." One such painting - "Kilby's World" - is an interpretation of a cat's view of life.

Van Haren, despite a busy teaching and coaching schedule, finds time to turn out jewelry and ceramics as well as painting.

His ceramic and jewelry works have been displayed in Michigan, Wisconsin, Illinois, New York and Indiana. A holy water font recently won an award in the Detroit Ecclesiastical exhibit.

Many of his paintings are based on sketches of Japan and Korea which he made during four years with the air force.

"Through most of his paintings, he often takes a theme and attempts to create a visual image of it.

"Contemporary artists are criticized by the public for not painting 'real' things," he says. "But who can tell us all the 'real' things that exist. Science, through the microscope, camera, telescope and the like, has revealed many realities that were only illusions a few years ago."

3. Mr. Littell advised that the Wayne County Road Commission is ready to sign the papers relative to their purchase of right-of-way from the school. Sale will be consummated as soon as deeds are ready.

4. Laboratory Equipment: there is still a question concerning awarding of laboratory furniture contract for the new high school. Attorney Littell and the architect will make further study and advise the Board at another date.

5. Mr. Littell advised the Board that he has examined the proposed contract for kitchen equipment with the Great Lakes Hotel Supply Co. and finds it in order.

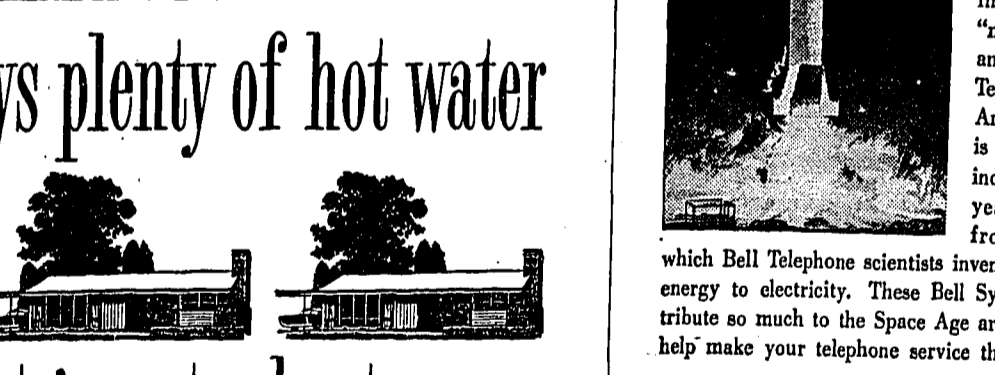

SPEAKING for the Record

Northville has arrived at the 'hour of decision' concerning future plans for capital improvements. The council has known this for some time. It became clearly evident, however, at a hearing on the budget last week.

Water, sewers, streets, curbs, sidewalks, alleys and parking facilities are pressing problems that cannot be ignored. The community cannot lock its limits and refuse to grow; and if new people are to come, existing facilities cannot stand up under the strain.

Recently Mayor Allen appointed Councilmen Reed and Welch to study the possibility of a major improvement program for Northville. What progress they have made has not yet been reported.

The council has done a remarkable job of providing improvements and still holding the line on taxes. But each year it has become more and more difficult to meet maintenance costs, provide for emergencies and meet the higher costs of employment and still make improvements from the general fund.

In the light of rising school taxes it is only natural that city officials hesitate to spend money. But this condition should not cloud their good judgment.

The council's decision to embark upon a sound program of capital improvements may well be the spark that our community needs. This expression of confidence in the future of Northville could provide the business district with the impetus to make improvements of its own.

But it remains for the council to adopt a master plan and designate an order of importance to the many pending projects. We still believe that voters will recognize that it takes money to run a city as well as schools. A program logically and wisely planned for long-range economy will receive their support.
