Northville has arrived at the 'hour of decision' concerning future plans for capital improvements.

The council has known this for some time. It became clearly evident, however, at a hearing on the | budget last

Councilman John Stubenvoll said it plainly and emphatically when needled by critics seeking more capital mprovements on a smaller budget.

"We've reached the point where we can't make any progress on major improvements without raising taxes" he stated flatly.

There has been a reluctance on the part of the city fathers to assume any indebtedness. At the same time an awareness that this policy was near its end has been generally accepted and discussed by the council.

Soon after he accepted the late Mayor Ely's respons-ibilities Mayor Allen admitted that Northville could no longer evade a bond issue, or similar program of major expenditure.

Water, sewers, streets, curbs, sidewalks, alleys and parking facilities are pressing problems that cannot be ignored. The community cannot lock its limits and refuse to grow; and if new people are to come, existing facilities cannot stand up under the strain.

Recently Mayor Allen appointed Councilmen Reed and Welch to study the possibility of a major improvement program for Northville. What progress they have made has not yet been reported.

The council has done a remarkable job of providing improvements and still holding the line on taxes. But each year it has become more and more difficult to meet maintenance costs, provide for emergencies and meet the higher costs of employment and still make improvements from the general fund.

In the light of rising school taxes it is only natural that city officials hesitate to spend money. But this condition should not cloud their good judgment.

The council's decision to embark upon a sound program of capital improvements may well be the spark that our community needs. This expression of confidence in the future of Northville could provide the business district with the impetus to make improvements of its own.

But it remains for the council to adopt a master plan and designate an order of importance to the many pending projects. We still believe that voters will recognize that it takes money to run a city as well as schools. A program logically and wisely planned for long-range economy will receive their support.

Mrs. Larson, whose term still has a year to go, has decided to resign. Petitions are available at the Novi |






