First Bùdget Is Approved For Wixom

Wixom's first budget — a \$106,-359.92 bundle covering two years' f expenses - was approved last week without change or opposition. At the same time, the city coun-cil adopted a resolution setting the tax rate at eight mills for the coming year.

The budget covers expenses incurred by two charter commissions and the former village government as well as projected city expenses for the coming fiscal year.

Nearly \$11,000 of the total budget will go for past expenses. The eight mills will be applied

against the 1957 Wixom assessment \$9.264.040 to provide \$74.112.32 in general property tax receipts. Other monies will come from state tax rebates, licenses, fines and per-

History Is Made: First Taxes Paid To City of Wixom

Novi, Michigan, Thursday, June 26, 1958

Wixom Treasurer Everett Pearsall was caught by surprise Tuesday morning, Without preparation or ceremony

he was met at 8:30 a.m. Tuesday by the first resident of Wixom ever to pay property taxes to the city. The taxpayer was Mrs. Orlando Smith, 48656 Pontiac trail, who just "stopped by" after driving her daughter to Bible school.

At first Treasurer Pearsall was reluctant to accept the money. "It isn't due until July 1," he remarked. But examination of the tax bill showed that a payable date wasn't indicated.

Pearsall was encouraged to take the tax money by Mayor Joseph T. Stadnik, who happened to overhear the conversation. After a year-long drought in which no taxes were collected by the village or city he wasn't taking any chances. "I would have enjoyed the privilege of being he first one to pay taxes in Wixom, but we need the money too badly to stand on ceremony," Stadnik exclaimed

Wixom taxes are payable at the city hall not later than August 31. Incidentally, Wixom's first taxpayer didn't think the taxes were high at all. The Smiths have been resients of Wixom for 11 years.


