FROM THE RESERVOIR TO NORTHVILLE HEIGHTS SUBDIVISION

Scaled proposals will be received by the City of Northville, Michigan at the office of the City Clerk, City Hall, Northville, Michigan up to 8:00 P.M. Eastern Standard Time, on June 23, 1958 and promptly thereafter the proposals will be publicly opened and read aloud.

The work to be performed consists of excavating approximately 9,000 cubic yards of earth over a distance of approximately 1,400 feet and to the grade and cross section as shown on the drawing. The editorial policy of your paper must be written with a fore-knowledge that the basic economic laws are about to be repealed. The unwavering theme of each editorial is as follows:

1. New city hall or new streets or new improvements.
2. Taxpayers will not hesitate to pay increased taxes.
3. The improvements will attract new industry.

Improvements are needed in the Northville business district as your editorial states. Lead the way Northville Record. Buy the building you occupy and provide the spark you say the town needs by remodeling the structure inside and out. Lead the way and share the tax load.

The taxpayers cannot pay increased taxes every year. Taxpayers are caught between slowly increasing wages or layoffs on the one hand and an increasing cost of living on the other. Some of the taxpayers are living on a fixed income or pension and the plight of these people cannot be stressed too heavily since increased taxes can mean the difference between living a full life or living on an austere budget. Fixed incomes and increased taxes mean less sales for the businessmen of the community.

Civic improvements will not attract new industry if taxes are raised. New industry can only be enticed into an area by low taxes and a proper attitude toward industrial growth by the people and their local representatives. Industry is not fighting to get into Detroit despite the beautiful new civic center, but their downtown business firms are fighting for their lives. Drive to the East across 9, 10, 11 and 12 mile roads to their terminals and see where small industry locates in large numbers, but you will not see

## West Shore Group Hears School Talk

Members of the West Shore association heard an appraisal of Walled Lake school district affairs at their regular meeting at 8:15 p.m. Wednesday.

Walled Lake Superintendent Clifford Smart told the group that more than 400 Novi children are now at St. Wendel Walled Lake schools. They help swell the district's enrollment to 5,000, compared to 4,400 in 1955, he said.

Mr. Smart said that the district is planning to accommodate the burgeoning school population, Smart said, the Walled Lake district will have a new junior high, a 10-room addition to the high school and a seven-room addition to the Twin Beach school.

The junior high is already planned for construction on Commerce road. At present, Walled Lake has seven elementary schools and a new senior high.

Despite continued rapid growth, Smart said, the district has had to register for school in 1956 and twice in the last 13 years.

### Charter Activity To be on Quiet Side For Month or Two

Novi village election activity, dormant for the past two months, probably will remain so until the middle of August.

The village charter commission has been taking it easy lately after eight months of intensive work leading up to completion of the charter in May.

The document is now in Lansing, waiting approval by the governor. Approval is almost a formality, and is expected shortly.

Positions for village office will be made available to township residents shortly after approval is given. Between then and the September 23 election, the commission will be for office and for the charter itself is expected to intensify.

Walter Tuck, chairman of the charter committee, said his group will not resume active campaigning for a "yes" vote on the document until late this summer.

But the group will discuss the charter with any group that wish.

Meanwhile, officials of the Novi Township Farmers and Landowners Protective Association, are making battle plans for their campaign for a "no" vote on the charter.

Encouraged by the last election, which gave the go-ahead for writing a charter by only 6 votes, Chairman Herbert Koester said his group this time plans an even more concerted campaign against incorporation this time.

### Dial Phone Instruction Begins

Northville telephone users are getting a sneak preview of what their service will be like when the new dial system goes into operation on July 20.

Operators have begun the job of calling every customer affected by the change. This gives users an opportunity to try their hand at dialing a few numbers and familiarize themselves with such things as direct distance dialing, dial tone and busy signals.

"We know that many persons are familiar with the dial operation, but there are many others who are not," said John Kamgo, area manager for Michigan Bell Telephone company. "And even those who have used dial phones probably aren't familiar with direct long distance dialing."

Kamgo said the sneak preview also is valuable in that it constitutes an acid test of the new telephone equipment's readiness.

Each customer is called, then asked to dial a number. As the subscriber dials, the numbers automatically are recorded on special test equipment. Any inaccuracies in dialing or in equipment show up as ink marks on paper tape.

From such marks, specially trained operators can determine whether the equipment is working properly. If the telephone user has any trouble with the dial, the operator will assist with instructions.

Kamgo said sneak previews have proved helpful in making the switch to dial smooth and easy in other Michigan communities.

Other developments which are reported to have had "more and more prospects every week" include Coenara Hills near Northville, Brookland Farms on Novi road near Nine Mile, and Pioneer Meadows at 11 Mile near Beck road.

The Orchard Hills development was dormant for nearly two years. But Compass Realty company of Detroit recently bought 103 lots and plans to go ahead with a \$2,000,000 development immediately.

Homes will come in five ranch styles and will have four bedrooms, two baths, and face brick. They will sell for \$15,000.

Plans call for a community water system and paved, winding streets. The Willowbrook Community church and new Novi elementary school are nearby.

J. S. Cane, president of the firm, said furnished models will be open in three to four weeks. Buyers probably can have possession by late fall, he said.

Cane's firm has built homes in a number of suburban Detroit communities and has a 600-home development going up in Millford.

At Echo Valley, more than 10 lots have been sold in the past few weeks and prospects indicate further sales when models are opened in the next few weeks.

At Echo Valley's homes, all ranch-style and split-level, set for \$24,000, \$30,000, cover 14,000 square feet and include a two-car garage.

Echo Valley's Keith Metcalf will have two prospects are persons connected with the Lincoln plant in Plymouth.

Until the \$40,000,000 Lincoln Village development was postponed earlier this year, 1958 was expected to be Novi township's biggest building year. Some 400 homes were scheduled for Lincoln Village alone.

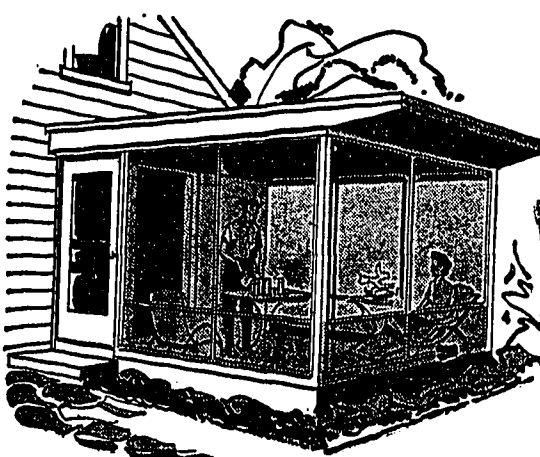

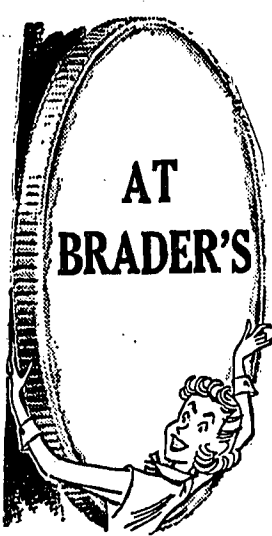

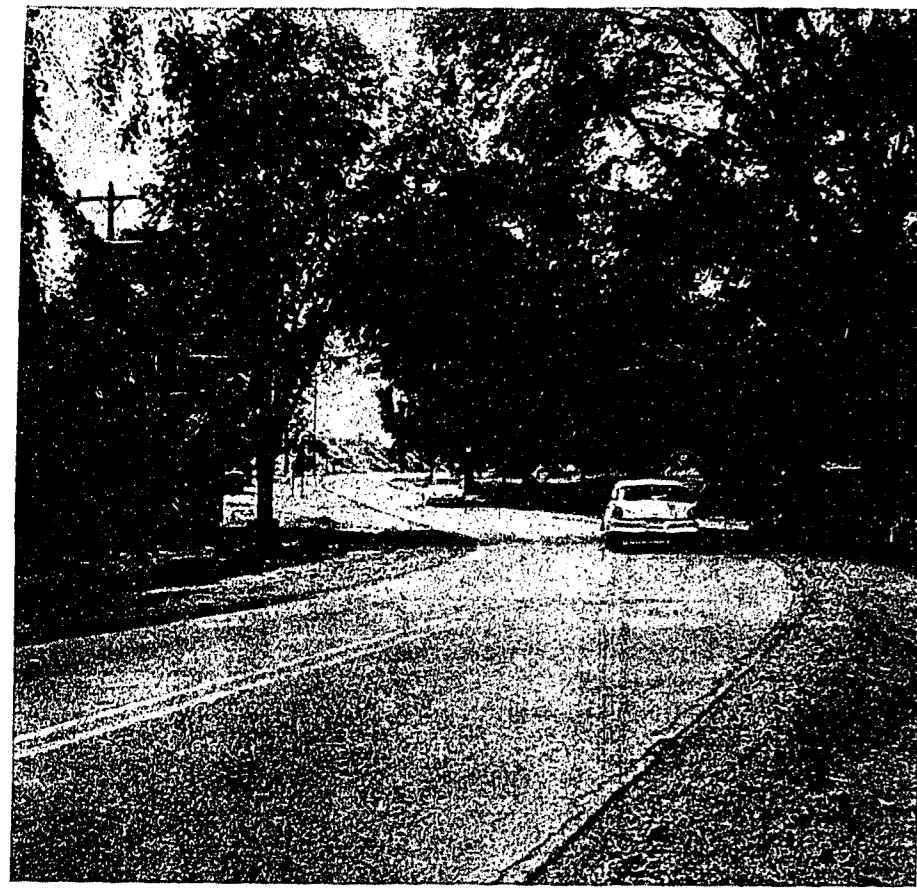

**A SAMPLE OF COMING JUDGMENT**

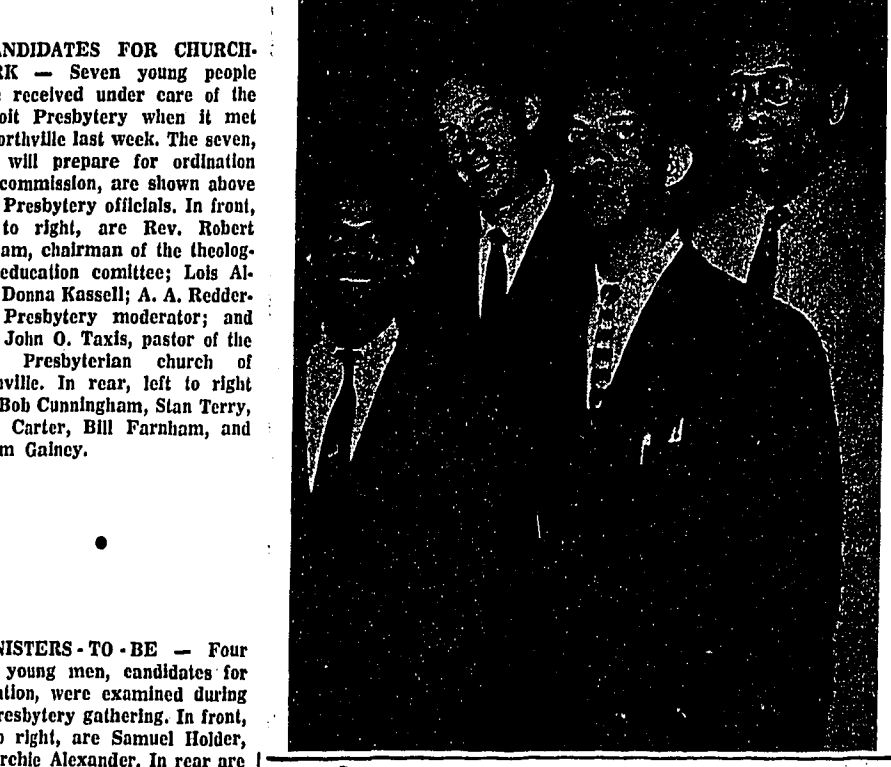
Some years ago a Missionary laboring in the Orient told how the judgment of God came upon certain in that country. His report said, "Not long ago in an area where terrible calamities have followed the wake of war, the crops were greatly suffering from drought. Certain Communists made an effort of God, had a public trial, and condemned Him for the drought. They shot Him and burned Him (in an effigy). That evening a hailstorm came killing the principle leaders in the case, flattening their houses, destroying what the drought had left. Those who love His name, dwelling but a few miles away enjoyed an abundant harvest. Surely his judgments are still abroad in this world!"

Since we are living in the age of Grace during which God is not pouring out His judgments on man as they deserve, transgressors often forget that there is a time of judgment coming. In Romans 14:11 he says, "For it is written, As I live saith the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall confess to God. So then, every one of us shall give an account of himself to God." Again in Hebrews 9:27 "And as it is appointed unto man once to die, but after this the judgment." This seems so far off to most people that they tremble not as its prospects. And, "because sentence against an evil work is not executed speedily, therefore the heart of the sons of men are fully set in them to do evil" (Ecc. 8:11). God is still on the throne and though wickedness abounds on every side it does not go unnoticed by Him and will some day bring every work into judgment.

Returning again to the thought of present samples of judgment, allow me to suggest that God has often warned people by wars, by floods, by hurricanes and startling events. How quickly we find the "Scientific Answer" to these calamities of life. How little we are acquainted with the ways of God in dealing with the peoples of the earth, therefore we are blind to God's hand in these events.

Space forbids me to print the text of scripture, so I would like to have you read Amos 4:6-11 which shows that God uses various methods to call people to repentance. Some of these very things are visiting our country today. We should receive them as warnings of greater judgments to come. Oh that the blindness of unbelief may be lifted from the eyes of the people of our nation to see these are but samples of the judgments to come.

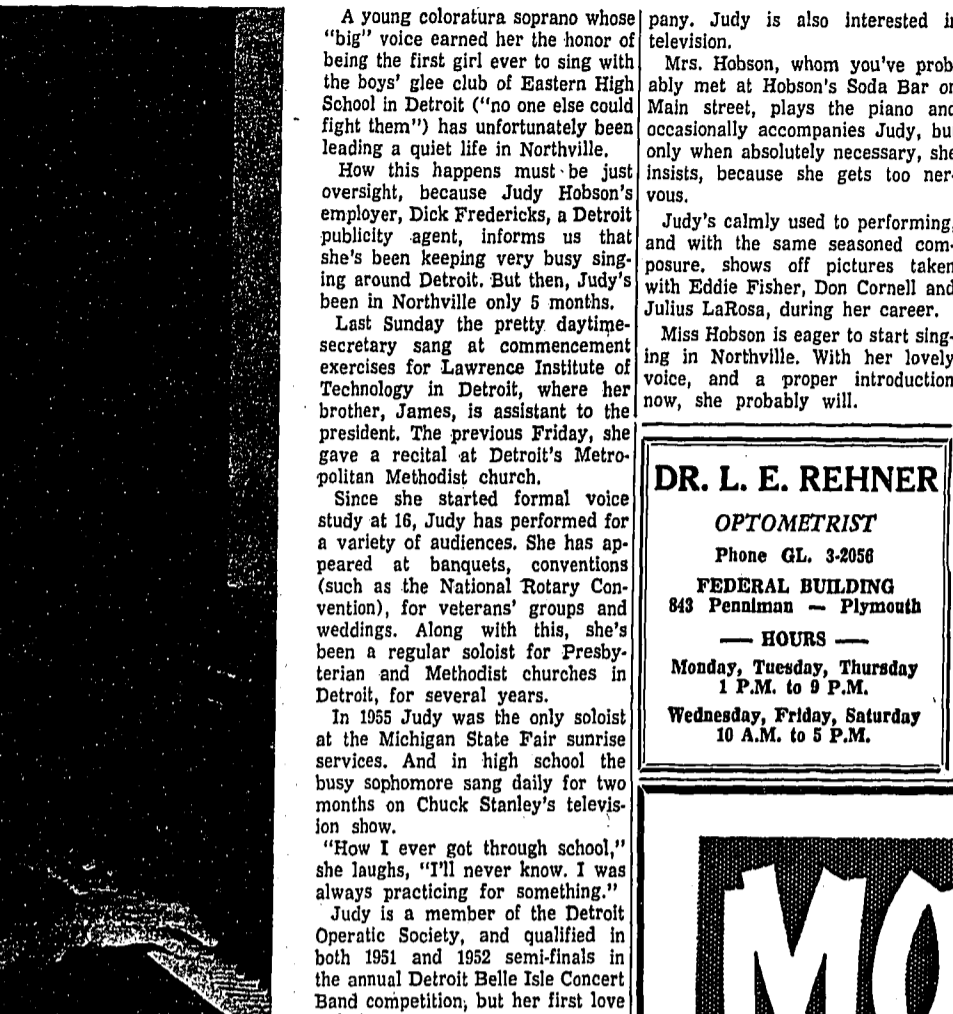

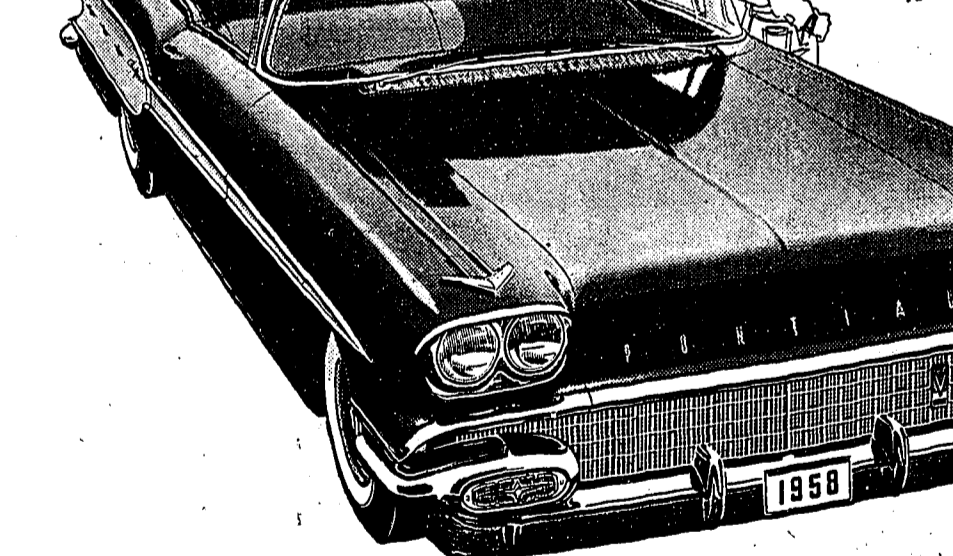

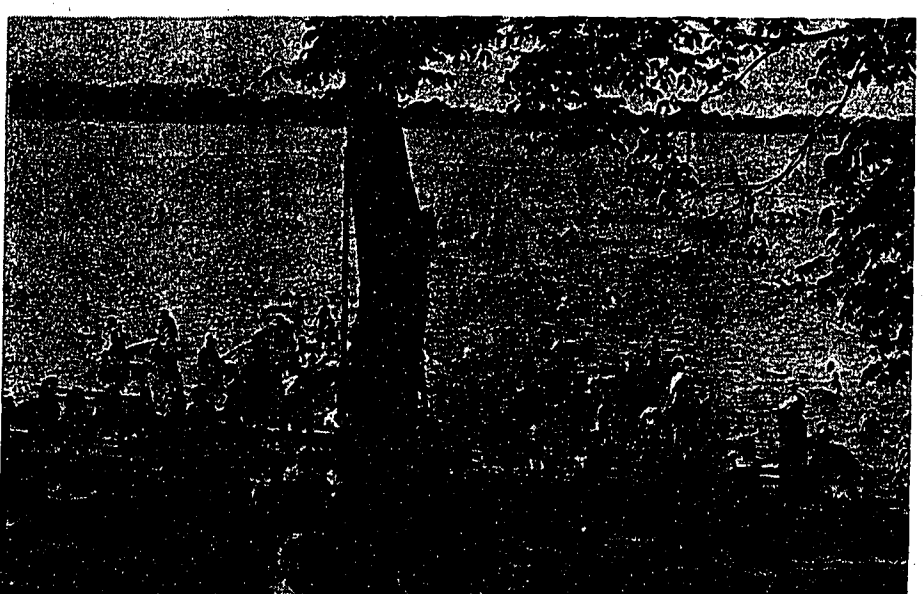

Since then, they have met with state and county officials numerous times. Leo Harward, a director of the group and owner of gas stations in Novi and New Hudson, has made seven trips to Lansing alone.

Among other agreements reached with state officials:—signs indicating that food, gas and lodging establishments are located off the expressway at certain intersections. —a new sign at the south end of the expressway, pointing the way to old Grand River.

Still to be worked out are plans for emergency phone booths and truck pull-offs along the superhighway. The merchants feel that when the entire Detroit-Muskegon route is finished, such services will be vital.

They also hope to make the "Food-Gas-Lodging" sign very specific. Many motorists, they feel, expect to find the services along the expressway instead of off it on a side road.

"All in all, the merchants have found state and county officials very cooperative.

"They give us anything we want," said Anderson. It may have been a slight over-statement, but relations have been cordial nonetheless. Despite the improved situation, however, no one claims traffic along old Grand River has reached its pre-expressway peak. It's still a trickle, and many old customers are probably gone for good.

For this reason, the merchants have decided to concentrate on new local business and to forget the transients who were once their bread and butter.

But present local business isn't enough to keep many of them going. What's needed, they feel, is new industry and general commerce. The idea is nothing new. But what is new, at least along old Grand River, is that the merchants are going out after the important industrial base instead of waiting for it to happen by.

"They know that if they don't get it soon, they may not still be in business when it does come."

**Registration Deadline Monday**
