

The worried merchants met in Brighton and organized themselves around the nucleus of an existing businessman's group there. Since then membership has soared to 136, including some 30 merchants from Novi.

30 merchants from Novi. Tackling the biggest problem first, the group asked the state to build a new bridge re-connecting old Grand River, which had been severed by the expressway near Kent Lake. They won the demand. Since then, they have met with state and county officials num-

For this reason, the merchants have decided to concentrate on new local business and to forget the transients who were once their bread and butter.

But present local business isn't enough to keep many of them going. What's needed, they feel, is new industry and general commerce. Factories bring people, and people are customers. The idea is nothing new. But what is new, at least along old

Grand River, is that the merchants are going out after the important industrial base instead of waiting for it to happen by. They know that if they don't get it soon, they may not still be in business when it does come.
