

Dive Kills Ex-NHS Student

A former Northville high school student died Saturday after breaking his neck in a dive into shallow water at a lake near Jackson.

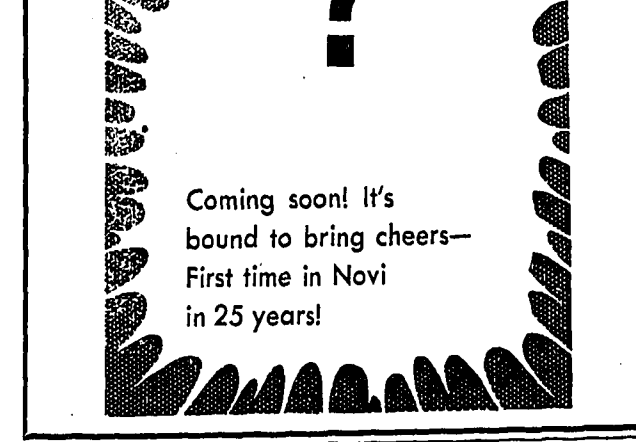
Smith had lived with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Franklin Smith, on Eight Mile road near Mendonwood until 1955 when the family moved to Jackson.

He had attended NHS through his junior year, graduating from Northville high school in 1954. He was to have started his sophomore year at De Pauw university in Indiana this fall.

Smith broke his neck last Thursday when he dove into two feet of water off a dock at Clark lake. After the accident, he told his father he thought the water was deeper because it appeared to reach the waist of a buddy swimming nearby.

Attendees said he spent a "fairly good night" Friday but seemed restless and apprehensive. He called a doctor in his bed Saturday morning and died at 7:30 a.m.

In addition to his parents, he is survived by two brothers, Thomas Franklin and David Crittendon Burr.

Youths Sentenced For Burglaries Throughout Area

Crime has come high for four of 10 Plymouth and Livonia youths who recently admitted nearly 100 burglaries in western Wayne county, including seven in Northville.

The four were sentenced to terms ranging up to 15 years in prison. Three were placed on probation and three others are still facing sentencing.

Sentenced to prison terms by Judge Richard Smith of Bay City in Washtenaw circuit court were:

—William H. McIntosh, 19, 4130 Five Mile, Plymouth, 2 1/2-15 years.

—Bernard M. Formwalt, 16, 397 Pacific, Plymouth, concurrent terms of 2 1/2-15 years.

—Kirkland H. McGowan, 18, 483 Am. Plymouth, 2 1/2-15 years.

—Curtis McGowan, Kirkland's twin brother, 1 1/2-15 years.

Three youths were placed on five years probation. They are:

—Linda Kramer, 17, 4218 Schoolcraft.

—D. J. Swape, 10, of Livonia.

—Leonard Ballinger, 17, 14894 Northville road.

Three other youths still await sentencing: John Kramer, 16, brother of Linda; Gerald D. Cowan, 17, 305 Roe, Plymouth; and Earl Goodwin, of Livonia.

Juvenile jurisdiction over Kramer was waived, and he is being tried as an adult. Goodwin, who escaped the original police roundup of the gang, was picked up in Kentucky and returned.

The youths' amazing spree, which included thefts from some 100 restaurants, stores and gas stations, was halted July 7 when Ann Arbor police arrested them after they had stolen a car from Northville.

Their break-ins in Northville netted them about \$1,000. They included: Northville Lanes bowling alley; Northville Drive-In Restaurant (three times); Amerman elementary school; and Bel-Nor drive-in restaurant.

Four of the youths also admitted setting fire to a barn at Six Mile and Sheldon to distract police while they broke into Abers'.

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Board Establishes New Youth Bureau

An ordinance to aid underprivileged, neglected and wayward youths in Novi township was approved by the township board Monday night.

The ordinance establishes a "child protection and youth assistance program" aimed at protecting and improving the physical, mental, emotional and moral welfare of all youngsters in the township.

In addition, the program will seek to prevent juvenile delinquency and neglect.

The program, unique in the country, has been adopted by six other Oakland county communities this year in cooperation with the county juvenile court.

The township board and juvenile court council appoint two committees to run the program: — a general citizens' committee which will organize the program, inventory services available to the youth, and handle general background work. On it will be school officials, professional people, police representatives, and lay men and women.

— a caseworker-executive committee which will actually deal with specific cases and refer the youth family to an agency which can be of help. It will be composed primarily of local persons who have had training in child service and welfare.

Juvenile court will keep tabs on the program through a professional caseworker assigned to work hand-in-hand with the Novi executive committee.

Once underway, the program will receive and investigate reports of bad family conditions, a youth going bad, neglect, or similar problems.

The committee will determine exactly what the situation is, throwing out "crank" reports.

If a genuine problem exists, the family will be consulted and advised to seek help through such services as agencies as a psychiatrist, Alcoholics Anonymous, a visiting nurse, or a social worker.

The company agreed to delay the work by the outside contractor until a decision on a similar case at another plant is made by a labor umpire.

The dispute started at 1:30 p.m. last Wednesday and ended Sunday when the union members agreed to return to work on the first shift Monday.

Five Seek Council So Far; Friday Is Filing Deadline

To Assess Penalties For Signs

Merchants who have had signs on the Farmington-Brighton expressway in Novi during the past eight months will have to pay a penalty for the advertising.

A token fine, probably \$25, will be charged against the five or six businesses and advertising firms.

Signs will be legal in another two weeks when a new township ordinance takes effect. But in the meantime, they're strictly contraband — and have been for many months.

Consequently, the township board Monday night instructed Building Inspector Harold Akeley to levy the fine.

The decision was intended more as a strict enforcement of the present ordinance rather than as a slap on the wrist.

In any case, it will probably cause little concern to the merchants. The fee is cheap for advertising.

Most of the signs were put up shortly before the expressway widening.

The signs stayed up while the board pondered whether to allow the signs.

The ordinance had been passed and signed by the board.

But when the question of enforcement arose Monday, the board was divided.

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Five More Candidates Expected

Five candidates for the proposed Novi village council took their hats in the ring this week.

Several other candidates are expected to file nominating petitions before the deadline tomorrow (Friday) at five p.m.

The five who have filed so far: J. Philip Anderson, 50250 W. Eight Mile.

Burt Fisher, 120 Northwestern.

Walter Tuck, 4211 Grand River.

Dorcas Tafalnia, 4613 Grand River.

Other candidates have until 5 p.m. tomorrow to file petitions containing between 20 and 40 signatures with Charter Commissioner Clerk Dirk Groenewald, 45265 12 Mile road.

The field of candidates will vie for five seats on the proposed village council in a special election on September 22. At the same time, the village charter will be voted on.

The council will serve only if the village charter carries. Otherwise, the five candidates will serve on the Novi village council.

In their unofficial life, Anderson is a fruit farmer in southern Novi.

Tafalnia and Tuck served on the original committee which spearheaded the incorporation movement.

They and Anderson were then elected this spring to the committee which wrote the proposed village charter.

Fisher, proprietor of a coffee shop at Novi road and Grand River, was formerly president of the West Shore Novi Businessmen's Association in the Walled Lake area.

Harrowood, proprietor of a gas station at Novi road and Grand River, was president of the Novi Board of Commerce and has been several township positions. He is also a director of the Greater Grand River Businessmen's Association.

Tuck is a real estate agent and has been a Novi resident since 1954.

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Expect New NHS To Open in Winter

Barring unforeseen delays, Northville's new \$2 million high school will have students in its classrooms and hallways next February 1.

At least this is the target date announced by the board of education.

Board President Nelson Schrader said that present plans call for all ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth graders to be moved from the present high school to the new Northville high school on Tuesday between 9 a.m. and noon or between 4 p.m. and 8 p.m.

Those already registered need not report on those days.

Ninth graders are to report again on September 5 at 8:30 a.m. for a full day. Students in grades 10 through 12 will not report until September 8, when full-time classes begin.

Work on the new high school began last March and under the arrangements of the contract is scheduled for completion next February.

Plymouth Garden Club To Have Flower Show

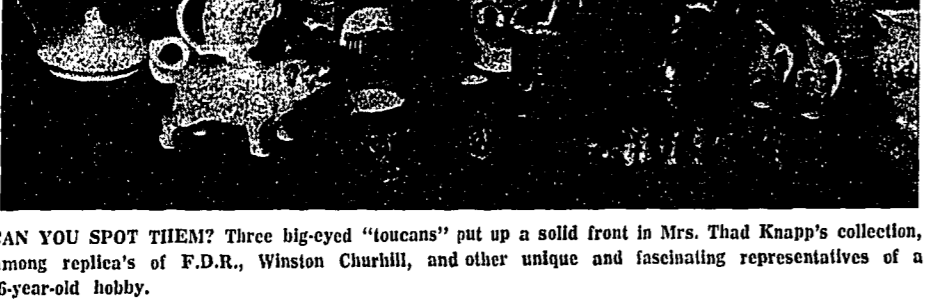
A community flower show will be held August 22 at the Plymouth junior high school from 2 to 9 p.m.

As she was passing through border customs once, the inspector asked Mrs. T. J. Knapp of Danlap street what she was carrying in that Madiera basket.

"Thirteen pitchers," she declared matter-of-factly.

The man peered into the basket suspiciously. "They don't look to me like they'll hold water," Mrs. Knapp laughs. "I think he was disgusted."

The pitchers, of course, were for Mrs. Knapp's fabulous pitcher collection . . . numbering at the last census . . . 382.

"I became interested in collecting pitchers on a visit to my mother in Chicago in 1927," she says. "I picked one up as a souvenir. But on returning, I discovered I already had 12 others at home.

Their ranks have since been steadily increased through Mrs. Knapp's continued purchases, and through the gifts of friends. Mrs. Knapp says she's made it a point to try to get pitchers from as many countries as possible.

Her extensive travels have added several first hand from Mexico and Europe. She has several from England and Italy and pitchers from most of western Europe and the Mediterranean countries.

Where she hasn't for one reason or another been able to go, Mrs. Knapp has depended on department stores.

This way, she's acquired pitchers from Latvia, Czechoslovakia, China and Japan.

Almost as interesting as the collection itself is Mrs. Knapp's careful catalogue of all her pitchers.

She systematically records the number of each pitcher, where it was made and where it was purchased, if a gift, who gave it, and the date received or purchased.

Mrs. Knapp has been encouraged by her collection to read up on glassware, but admits she's not as well-versed on the subject as she'd like to be.

The pitchers come in many materials: china; red; antique clay; bronze, copper and pink lustre; carnelian glass; cranberry glass; mercury glass; south Jersey glass; linwood and ceramic, to mention a few.

Mrs. Knapp donated a favorite and valuable 150-year-old English pitcher to the Highland Park library. "I was afraid it might get broken at home," she explains. As far as space permits, most of the others are on display in Mrs. Knapp's dining room.

Mrs. Knapp is the wife of the late Northville School Superintendent T. J. Knapp.

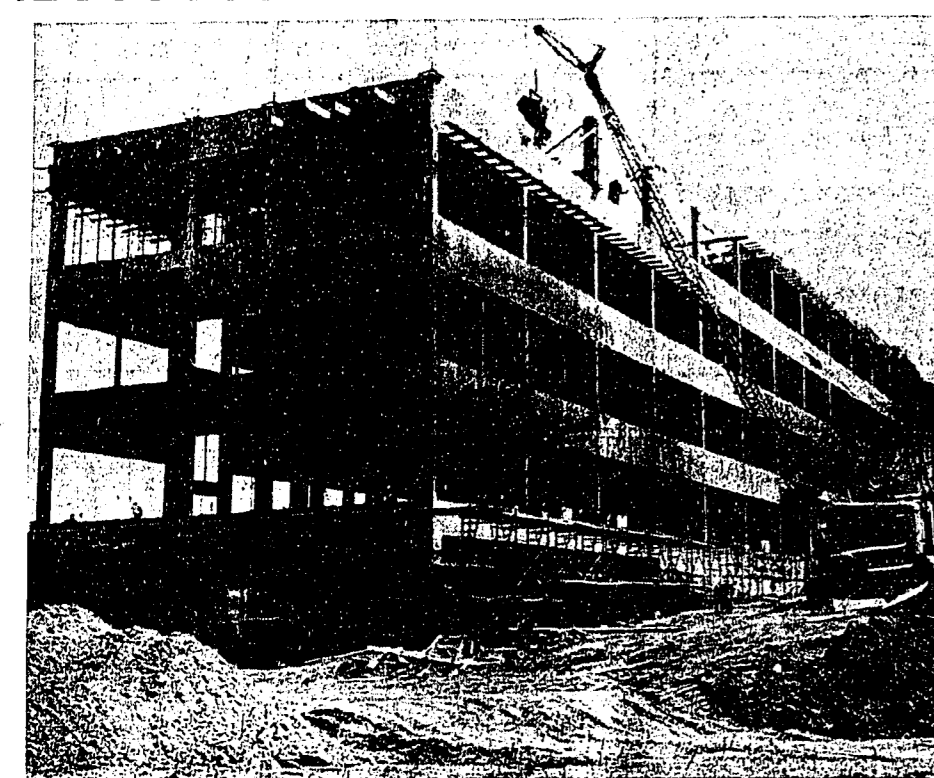

City officials are huddling with a financial consultant this week to determine the feasibility of selling revenue bonds for the purpose of improving Northville's water system.

Along with this project goes the installation of pumping equipment. Very soon — quite possibly to be considered in the same bonding project — the city must replace many of its old water lines, provide elevated water storage facilities and adopt a water treatment process.

In the past year the council has strived to put the water department on a paying basis, completely independent from the city's general fund.

Finally, of course, non-revenue producing projects, such as streets or possibly city hall facilities, will have to be taken through general obligation bonds.

Although this happened earlier in the summer, we can't pass up mentioning the teaching ability of Meadowbrook's Andy Berroni.

State Changes Planned

EXPERTS IN HALF A DOZEN different fields are preparing state government for its biggest reorganization challenge in years.

Under the law passed last winter by the legislature, surprising everybody, the governor can propose reorganization plans for administrative agencies.

He must present them to the legislature within 30 days after the start of its next session.

He announced a special committee headed by Circuit Judge Clark J. Adams, of Pontiac. Other members are from Williams' present or former staff, education friendly to his administration or steadfastly non-partisan.

The Adams group first recommended that proposals be studied to place all tax collections in one agency or consolidate health functions.

Consolidate agricultural activities. Let the department of administration write checks to pay state bills rather than the auditor general.

All of these, in one form or another, have been before the legislature at least once, and all have been defeated.

Republicans feel it is a trifling presumption to bring them up again as Williams' ideas after members of their own party failed to support them in previous legislative sessions.

The commission said it would have the recommendations ready for Williams to offer to the legislature when it convenes for the 1959 session in January.

This, of course, is based on the certainty in Democratic minds that Williams will be governor.

If he is defeated in his campaign for a sixth consecutive term, the planning job will have to be done all over again because it is rare that a Republican takes Democratic advice or research—regardless of the facts on which it is based.

Pressure for major changes in administrative functions is being generated by the Senate Committee on Waste. The committee, headed by Senator L. Harvey Lodge (R-Drayton Plains), is not a part of the general scheme of reorganization, but already has started the ball rolling for changes.

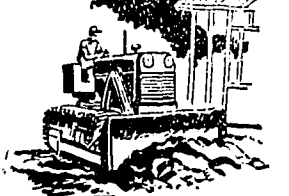

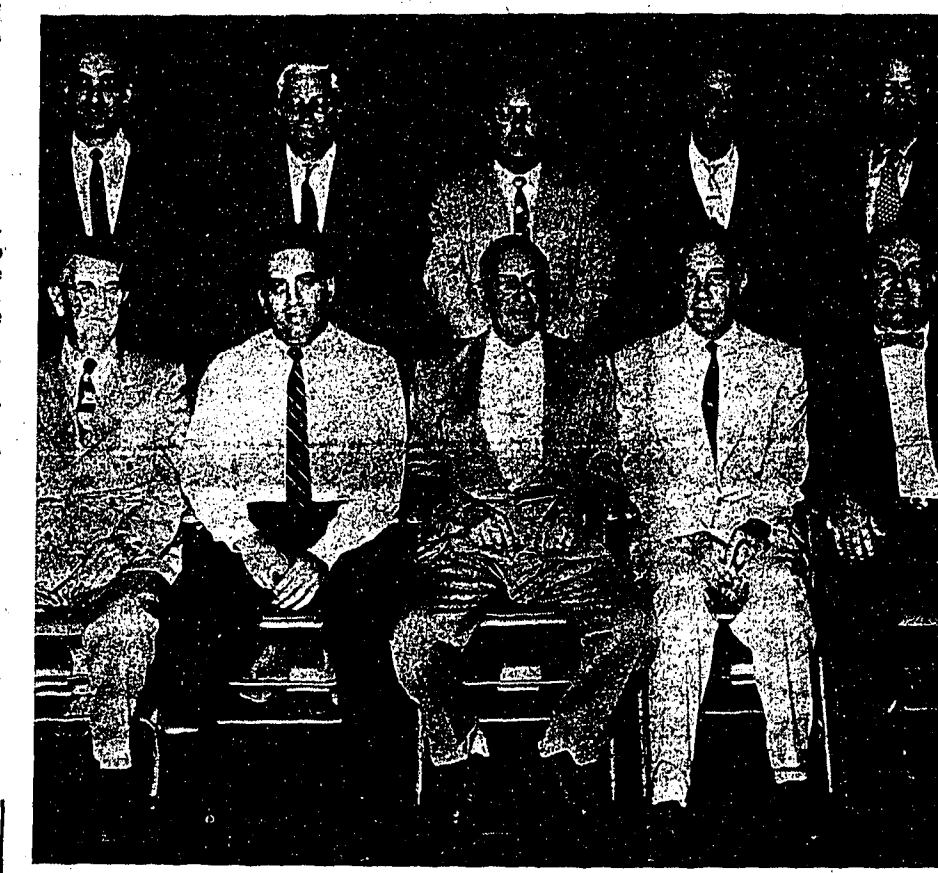
