This picture of a growing financial squeeze, with the schools caught between costs and income, was presented by Superintendent William Medlyn and Secretary Kenneth Bernard in a question-and-answer session with The Novi News. Documenting their statements with figures and "educated guesses," Medlyn and Bernard gave these answers: How much will school taxes increase if the extra millage is approved.

Not by  $2\frac{1}{2}$  mills, but only by 1.67 mills — because the coming year's operating millage is .83 mills less than last year's. That is, the county allocation board okayed 8.81 mills last year but cut it to 7.98 this year. How much will school taxes be if the millage is ap.

They'll total 17.48 mills - including the 7.98 approved by the county, the 2.50 special milage, and 7 mills previously voted for school construction.

How much will the extra millage yield? About \$25,000 each year. The 21/2 mills levied on the district's \$11,070,000 valuation would give about \$27,500, but

delinquent taxes would reduce this by several thousand dollars. Why does the board need the extra money? Because its revenue now appears about \$19,000 shy of its budget, and several more teachers are needed. The 1958-59

budget was set at \$252,200, but income will total only about \$233,000 unless the extra millage is okayed. Why have costs gone up so greatly?

Because enrollment has doubled in the past three years. teacher salaries have increased in competition with other districts, and general costs have risen. Wby has revenue failed to keep pace with this

Because both the state and county are forcing the local district to bear more and more of the tax load.

State aid payments don't reflect the added costs, and the county allocation board is inclined to cut the school's share of the 15-mill tax pie which is shared by the county, township and school district. For example, the current Novi millage of 8.81 on \$10.-

041,000 valuation yields \$89,023. Next year's 7.98 mills on \$11,070,000 valuation will yield only \$88,338 - actually a cut from this year. Novi has had a millage reduction every year since 1956 when it was 9.54. It was cut first to 9.04, then to 8.81 and now

to 7.98. Something has to give. Could not some expenses be cut?

It is nearly impossible. Most expenses are fixed, either suppliers or by the need to compete salary-wise. Salaries, for example, took up \$131,000 — or 67 per-cent of the \$195,00 budget last year. Tuition for Novi students attending Northville high school amounted to \$32,000 - another 16 percent. That means \$163,000 - or 83 percent of the budget -

was fixed. The remaining \$32,000 included these expenses: \$7.435 for fuel and utilities, \$6,500 for gassing and running school buses, and \$1,700 for insurance. These two are fixed. That left about \$16,000 to cover everything from new textbooks and new furniture to maintenance of buildings

Since salaries take so much money couldn't they be cut? Or couldn't the faculty be reduced. If teacher salaries were reduced, Novi could not com-

pete with other districts. They simply must keep pace. As for reducing the faculty, Novi already is several teachers short. Some classes have as many as 40 students - far above the desired 30-student average. And if the overall average reaches 34 students per

class, state aid payments will be reduced - and a vicious In addition, still more teachers will be needed as more

rooms at Orchard Hills school are put into service. Then couldn't other cuts be made?

Expenses already are at rock bottom. For example only \$1,453 is to be spent on maintenance of the \$600.000 Novi school - far less than necessary. Furthermore, no new buses have been bought in three years - though a couple are wearing out fast. Couldn't the district borrow money to tide it over

temboraril»? In the first place, that means paying interest.

In the second place, a permanent answer is needed. Novi has had to borrow twice in the past two years - \$20,000 once and \$25,000 the second time. It's only a temporary answer, because when the money is paid back the same old problem returns.

Can't the board manage its finances better? It's not a case of bad management. All school districts face the same problem and must borrow or raise extra millage. In fact, Novi is one of the few Oakland county districts which has not had a special millage increase in the past few years.

What if the millage fails to pass? Cuts will have to be made somewhere. That will be up

to parents and taxpayers to decide. Some districts have had to reduce bus service, go on half days, stop certain school programs, and even leave classrooms empty. This is not meant as a threat, but something will have to give if money is not available.

# To Report Tuesday
