With only 3 days remaining before the final tally for the 11-day 1958 United Foundations Torch Drive, Novi collectors from homes and small businesses are still just under the half-way mark toward the \$2,567 goal.

The nine-member board, named only Monday night by the village council, was not expected to act so promptly on the request. A spokesman for the village council had predicted that the planners would first develop a zoning and land use plan for the entire village. Currently, the village has adopted the township zoning.

The decision to call for an immediate hearing was made after representatives of the track group appeared before the board. Shortly after planners elected officers, Walter A. Cox, spokesman for the Grand River Enterprises corporation, asked the board to give the request immediate attention. Shirley Bernard, real estate agent who handled the 200-acre proposed track site sale, appeared with Cox on behalf of the request for a hearing.

The site, located at Ten Mile and Taft roads, is presently zoned agricultural. Track installation would call for manufacturing zoning.

According to Cox, his group will make a determined bid for a license to operate a track for runners and trotters as soon as the matter of zoning is settled.

In other business Tuesday night the planners elected Harry Watson chairman, Vincent Miklas, vice chairman, and Frank Watz, secretary.

The new commission is composed of five "holdover" members of the township planning board. They are Walter A. Cox, George Simmons, William Flynn and Andrew Burgess. Four new members on the board are Waz, Alex Modes, Henry Bashian and Burt Fisher.

The public hearing is scheduled for 8 p.m. at the township hall.

## To Trick and Treat For World's Children This Halloween

Halloween tricking and treating this year will take on a new twist for several Northville children. Like youngsters in more than 8,000 towns and cities in the nation, they will be knocking on doors to collect for needy children all around the world as part of the UNICEF (United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund) Halloween campaign.

As the UNICEF motto says, "The trick" has become "to treat all the world's children."

UNICEF is a part of the United Nations, an international cooperative to bring medical aid, food, clothing and other necessities to children in Europe, Asia, the Middle East, North Africa and Latin America.

This aid is given solely on the basis of need, without regard to race, creed, nationality or political belief, to reach the largest numbers. Among UNICEF's medical services are provision of vaccines, drugs, insecticides and imported equipment, and at times, the services of international experts.

More than ten million children have been vaccinated in UNICEF's anti-tuberculosis vaccination campaign.

Many countries cooperating in the UNICEF program exchange their particular resources with member countries so that assistance is given as well as received wherever possible.

More than one million dollars was collected for UNICEF during Halloween last year by American children.

According to the present Northville campaign director, Mrs. Warren Sterling, the \$26.87 raised last Halloween in Northville fell far short of what it could be.


Special collectors will also be placed in Northville business and public offices, churches and in schools, Mrs. Sterling said.

**Visits Daughter in Northville**

**John Drijver, Naturalist, is 'Audubon of Holland'**

The toll was sad. Hundreds of birds lay dead at the foot of the lighthouses each morning. Villagers carried them away by the basketful.  
Flying south, the migrating birds were blinded by the lighthouse beams. By the hundreds and thousands, they killed themselves against the scores of stone towers along the Dutch coast.

Then the society for the Protection of Birds stepped in. Within weeks the society found a solution as simple as it was ingenious. Floodlights were trained on the lighthouses.  
Now the half-blinded birds could see and avoid the illuminated towers. Today, even at the height of migration, 20 dead birds a night is a tragedy.

The man behind this remarkable program was visiting in Northville this week. He is Jan Drijver, naturalist, bird-lover, scholar, author, lecturer, and father of Mrs. Donald Riddering, 9705 West 6 Mile, Salem.  
Drijver is a sort of Teddy Roosevelt and John James Audubon combined. ("But I do not paint!") rolled into one. Now retired, he has devoted his life to protecting nature in the land-scarce country of Holland.

For more than 40 years, he bore the twin posts of director of the Society for Nature Protection and secretary of the Society for the Protection of Birds.  
He has written three books and countless articles, lectured wherever his words would help, visited other countries to study conservation measures, and vigorously urged the Dutch government to participate in nature protection and conservation programs.  
It was never easy. Unlike the U.S., where land is abundant, Holland must parcel out its acreage carefully. Huge national parks and state game refuges are unknown.  
"Holland has only one-fifth the population," Mrs. Drijver points out. To establish havens for birds and wild life, the societies actually bought land themselves. Money at first came from wealthy members, but eventually the Dutch people themselves began contributing through public campaigns.  
The Dutch government, mindful of the commercial importance of land, was never greatly enthused about conservation, Drijver says. Several areas have been designated as national monuments, but not in inviolable. One such area — a large breeding ground for waterfowl — was recently sold to the city of Rotterdam for development as a port.  
But gradually the government is coming around — partly because many children who have heard Drijver's lectures over the past 40 years are now in positions to influence laws now control hunting seasons and prohibit the shooting of many birds. International regulations outlaw the dumping of fuel wastes within 100 miles of the coast. Some birds — notably the barnacle goose — are almost pampered.

In short, Holland has become conservation-conscious.  
As a result, Holland still has purple herons even though they are unknown elsewhere in Europe. The nearly-extinct spoonbill is now increasing. Nature study has become almost a national pastime.  
And all over Europe, countries are following Holland's lead.  
During the war, the Drijvers suffered in fear for their children's lives — for both Mrs. Riddering and her brother were in the Dutch underground.  
It was there, as a postal clerk, that he first stepped into conservation work. Textel was widely known for its birds, and ornithologists visited the island regularly.  
Most were told to "look up Drijver, the postal clerk. He can tell you much about the birds."  
Drijver and his wife now live in their childhood home, the island of Texel on the North Sea.  
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With Harold Hartley, 402 Ransom, he has visited game areas and bird sanctuaries and tramped along the nature trails at Kensington park.  
With Robert Merriman, a Northville township trustee, he has visited Cranbrook, talked with zoologists at University of Michigan museums, and watched the hawk migration at Point Pelee, Ontario. One of his greatest thrills was seeing an American bald eagle soaring high over the Taboumenon river in the Upper Peninsula.  
"Surprisingly," he says, "America and Holland have only a few birds in common — the starling, the mallard, the English sparrow. Others, of course, are related but not quite the same bird."







# SPEAKING for the Record

Purchase of the Hills' building ended years of dickering by the city and represents a joint effort by the council and certain retail merchants to improve Northville's parking and alley facilities.

While the entire council worked to bring about the purchase, Mayor Allen shouldered most of the negotiation responsibilities and deserves credit for finally closing the deal.

The idea to purchase the 90-year-old building and provide alley and parking area behind the Main and Center street stores began several years ago. The entire plan would call for purchase of another piece of property on Wing between Main and Dunlap to provide a third access and also enlarge the parking space.

In the past several years the city has marched along slowly acquiring property and developing alleys and parking with little participation by the retail merchants.

In the case of the Hills' property it is a different story. The Hills' building cost \$17,000. George Hills received \$10,000 for his two-thirds interest and \$7,000 went to Frank Hills for a one-third share. The latter brother resides with his real estate office in the building.

Of this amount the city has reasonable assurance that merchants will pick up \$10,000 of the tab.

It's logical to assume that there should be some formula between local business and professional interests in the community and the city to share the financial burden of parking development.

To date the city has spent approximately \$100,000 on its parking-levy programs. There's a limit to how much can be spent and how fast.

Actually, the city and merchants both have a stake in parking development. Alert customers are attracted to stores and they want them to park with easy access to their stores. They also want to be certain that they are one step ahead of the population increase so that there will always be enough parking.

Similarly, the city has a definite interest in the facilities of its business district and a responsibility to see that they are adequate for shoppers of the area.

More important, perhaps, is the increased revenue that the city can expect to derive from a thriving business community.

Despite a survey to the contrary, the city council as well as most merchants realize that Northville's parking facilities are far from sufficient.

In numbers of spaces the total may be adequate today. A good share of these spaces are on private property, however, and could be lost tomorrow.

Moreover, most of the existing facilities either need blacktopping, lighting or both.

In an effort to completely review and analyze the parking set-up as it exists in Northville today and to perhaps introduce suggestions for future development and financing of facilities a joint meeting of interested parties has been called for next Monday.

The meeting should be of vital interest to every businessman who, by virtue of doing business locally is responsible for bringing traffic into town. The full city council will attend and the Retail Merchants Association is expected to be well represented. But every business person has been invited—and if not, is welcome. The meeting will be held at the VEW building at 8:00 p.m.

We made a slight slip in the reporting of a school bond story the other day. As a matter of fact, it was about a \$300,000 error—give or take \$100,000.

It seems that we quoted Superintendent Amerman as saying that there would be some \$640,000 left over from the school's \$3 million bond issue when the building was complete. We also hinted that this same amount would remain when the present high school is rejuvenated for junior high school use.

When the calls of congratulations began pouring in for his financial genius in saving all this money, Superintendent Amerman did some checking.

The story is really this. Some \$640,000 in school bonds remain UNSOLD from the original \$3 million bond issue. Part of this will be needed to complete the high school. Approximately \$150,000 will be used to rehabilitate the old high school. Still more is earmarked for an elementary school site.

After that, it's anyone's guess as to how much will remain unsold.

Sorry, Russ. But with all that money left over, things looked pretty rosy there for awhile!

## Napoleon: Dictator and Gangster

Saint Helena — I was taught that Napoleon Bonaparte was a very wonderful man. When I was in Gloucester (Mass.) high school many years ago, I won a prize for an essay on Napoleon. I was determined to become Emperor of Europe. His politics make me shudder because of the similarity with what we are seeing today. Napoleon assumed a form of religion and backed the organized churches. He cleaned up the slums, encouraged the building of homes, and education to be much interested in education, but not in elementary education.

Who Was Napoleon?  
Napoleon was born in 1769 on the island of Corsica. He had various brothers and sisters. He was bad tempered, selfish, and overbearing, but had a good mother. Through the French government of Corsica he secured admission to a military school in Paris from which he graduated in 1785. He became an important officer in the artillery.

Realizing that this artificial realization was not going to bring prosperity back to France, Napoleon gave up being a reformer and again turned to war. He began to place his brothers and other relatives in important foreign posts. When Napoleon was crowned Emperor, he thought that his satellites were all tied to him through agreements and that Russia was his only enemy. He thereupon got together a great army of some 600,000 men and started for Russia, whose Tsar was Alexander. He told his people that he would have peace and prosperity "for the Russian people a similar story, viz.: "Give us world dominion, and we will be no more war and no more unemployment." Napoleon became a "second Caesar." He had kept free. He immediately went into politics, promising everything he had expected. Winter set in; his soldiers were without warm clothing and food; and Napoleon's army collapsed. He escaped to St. Helena, where he was confined until he died.

## Michigan Mirror

### State's Financial Gloom Lifted - until after Election

POVERTY IN STATE government new taxes if the state is going to avoid a \$50,000,000 to \$80,000,000 deficit by next June 30. The present tax pattern is described as a "patchwork" put together to meet various crises which occurred during the years. But any change in the name of improvement is still unlikely, according to the legislature. Parts of the new plan almost leaked out before top candidates headed for the hustings to harvest votes.

The first leak developed last winter when Rep. Rollo G. Conlin (R-Tipton), chairman of the committee, released a tentative report favoring the increase in the intangibles tax. For weeks, there was conjecture that all bank deposits and the fixed incomes of old folks would be raided. To make it worse, Gov. Williams supported the idea as the top Democrat. This brought both parties into the fray and the taxpayer sat on the edge of his chair, empowered only to worry.

The legislature finally dropped the idea as Conlin pleaded for more time to develop his whole program, rather than run with the ball after only one of several ideas had been pursued. More time and more facts were required.

Through the summer the research people for the committee worked. Ominous sounds of an income tax for Michigan came from several sources. Democrats, led by Williams to abhor anything that sounds like a consumer tax (and only people pay non-consumer taxes, too) are saying privately it is "the fairest tax of all."

U.M. Professor Harvey E. Brazier, director of the legislative tax study, casually mentions the income tax idea and charges that the legislature must get down to work in 1959 and seek out new sources of revenue. Officially, nothing has been said about any new tax. But, wherever candidates gather, they know what Brazier's proposal is, and also that the income tax is the last new source of sizeable revenue. Brazier's proposal, he promised, will come up with ideas the legislature can use for "new sources of revenue, but without burning business and industry."

## Interest High in Tuesday's Election

### Protests May Bring Parking Changes

A contingent of Wixom businessmen won their point before the city council Thursday night. After an hour-long lively session the council voted unanimously to seek permission from Oakland county to remove parallel parking signs along the business section of Pontiac trail and Wixom roads.

Business establishments in the community had complained that parallel parking reduced the number of available spaces and hindered their business. A petition seeking a return to angle parking was presented the council two weeks ago and tabled until Thursday night.

Strongest advocate of parallel parking was Mayor Joseph Stadnik. He pointed out that the roads were state controlled and that state police authorities would not permit angle parking. "It would be better even if we had a choice, to go back to angle parking because it is unsafe," he stated.

Suggestions to provide offstreet parking were considered. Property adjacent to the city hall and Wixom General store is offered for public parking use if improved by the city. Action was also taken to contact C & O officials for use of railroad-owned property for parking.

Mayor Stadnik pointed out that the county had already warned the city that a plan should soon be considered for providing off-street parking in case all parking is discontinued on Pontiac trail and Wixom roads.

In a report to the Wixom city council Thursday night \$7,600.00 was recorded as collected, only \$940.26, or 1.01 percent of Wixom's 1958 city taxes are delinquent.

### Candidates Visit Area In Vote Bid

Novi and Wixom residents will cast their ballots next Tuesday for eight state, two congressional and six county candidates.

One proposition, a state referendum question, also will be voted upon.

Despite the absence of local issue propositions and presidential race excitement, recent visits by the two major gubernatorial candidates are expected to spur voter interest.

A total of 2,222 voters are registered in the township. Of these, 1,059 are from precinct 1, while 1,174 are from precinct 2. In Wixom, 506 residents are qualified to vote.

The total Novl township registration is down from two years ago because Wixom was incorporated as a city and hence is no longer part of the township.

Two years ago, 2,177 of the 2,507 registered voters turned out for the presidential election. It was the biggest total vote in Novi history.

Republicans came through with almost a 5-2 margin in every contest, with Democrats claiming only one victory — a 659-576 win for Governor Williams in precinct 2.

In one of the nearest races this year, William S. Broomfield, Royal Oak, will be attempting to retain the United States congressional seat he captured two years ago.

Broomfield is opposed by Leslie H. Hudson, young Pontiac Democrat and state legislator for the past two terms.

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### Novi Torch Drive Nears \$2,667 Goal Before Final Tally

Novi Torch Drive returns might yet reach the area's goal of \$2,667 or come close to it, before final tally Friday.

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### How to Use Voting Machines

Because voting machines are new to many persons in the area, instructions are printed here for registering your choice by machine November 4. Election workers will demonstrate use of the machines, if you desire, at election time.

There are three parts to each machine, a red, white and blue section. Red is for the amendments, white for party candidates and blue for non-partisan candidates.

Leaders have urged that everyone vote at his three parts.

This year, the white section for party candidates carries five political parties: Democratic, Republican, Socialist Labor, Socialist Workers and Prohibition.

Voters may split their ticket for any of these parties. For example, a voter may vote for a Democratic governor, a Republican lieutenant governor, a Socialist Labor attorney general, a Prohibition state treasurer, and a Socialist Workers United States senator.

First step in using a machine is to turn the switch lever (upper left hand corner) to the right and leave it there. This closes the curtain and unlocks the machine.

If you want to vote a straight ticket, turn down the lever of your party. Turn up the lever at the right of the name of any candidate you wish to eliminate, and then turn down the lever at the right of the name of the candidate you wish to substitute.

Remember you cannot vote for a president of one party and a vice-president of another.

To vote a split ticket, do not turn any party lever. Turn down the lever at the right of any candidate you wish to vote for.

The party levers do not affect the non-partisan ballots. These must be voted separately.

After you are through, check your vote again. Make sure that you have voted for all offices and questions on which you wish to voice an opinion. DO NOT PUSH BACK ANY LEVERS.

Now go back to the lever at the upper left of the machine. Switch it to the left. This records your vote and opens the curtain.
