Purchase of the Hills' building ended years of dickering by the city and represents a joint effort by the council and certain retail merchants to improve Northville's parking and

While the entire council worked to bring about the purchase, Mayor Allen shouldered most of the negotiation responsibilities and deserves credit for finally closing the

The idea to purchase the 90-year-old building and provide alley and parking area behind the Main and Center street stores began several years ago. The entire plan would call for purchase of another piece of property on Wing between Main and Dunlap to provide a third access and also enlarge the parking space.

In the past several years the city has marched along slowly aquiring property and developing alleys and parking with little participation by the retail merchants. In the case of the Hills' property it is a different story.

The Hills' building cost \$17,000. George Hills received \$10,000 for his two-thirds interest and \$7,000 went to Frank Hills for a one-third share. The latter brother resides and has his real estate office in the building.

Of this amount the city has reasonable assurance that merchants will pick up \$10,000 of the tab.

It's logical to assume that there should be some formula between local business and professional interests in the community and the city to share the financial burden of parking development.

To date the city has spent approximately \$100,000 on its parking-alley programs. There's a limit to how much can be

Actually, the city and merchants both have a stake in parking development. Alert merchants want more customers and they want them to park with easy access to their stores. They also want to be cerain that they are one step ahead of the population increase so that there will always be enough

Similary, the city has a definite interest in the facilities of its business district and a responsibility to see that they are adequate for shoppers of the area.

More inportant, perhaps, is the increased revenue that the city can expect to derive from a thriving business commun-

Despite a survey to the contrary, the city council as well as most merchants realize that Northville's parking facilities are far from sufficient.

In numbers of spaces the total may be adequate today. A good share of these spaces are on private property, however, and could be lost tomorrow.

Moreover, most of the existing facilities either need blacktopping, lighting or both.

In an effort to completely review and analyze the parking set-up as it exists in Northville today and to perhaps introduce suggestions for future development and financing of facilities a joint meeting of interested parties has been

The meeting should be of vital interest to every businessman who, by virtue of doing business locally is responsible for bringing traffic into town. The full city council will attend and the Retail Merchants Association is expected to be well represented. But every business person has been invited and if not, is welcome. The meeting will be held at the VFW building at 8:00 p.m.

We made a slight slip in the reporting of a school board

It seems that we quoted Superintendent Amerman as saying that there would be some \$640,000 left over from the school's \$3 million bond issue when the building was complete. We also hinted that this same amount would remain when the present high school is rejuvenated for junior high school

When the calls of congratulations began pouring in for his financial genius in saving all this money, Superintendent Amerman did some checking.

The story is really this, Some \$640,000 in school bonds remain UNSOLD from the original \$3 million bond issue. Part of this will be needed to complete the high school. Approximately \$150,000 will be used to rehabilitate the old high school. Still more is carmarked for an elementary school

After that, it's anyone's guess as to how much will remain unsold.

Sorry, Russ. But with all that money left over, things looked pretty rosy there for awhile!

In addition to selecting a slate of state and county officers at the polls next Tuesday local voters will also be asked to decide upon another important issue.

The proposal - a state constitutional convention - deserves careful consideration and, in our opinion, the support

For the fourth time since our state constitution became effective in 1908 the electorate will have a chance to decide

whether or not a general revision should be attempted. Submission of the question must be made every 16 years by constitutional provision. The question may also be placed on the ballot at any time by the legislature, as was the case

The convention — if called — would consist of 102 members, three from each of the existing 34 senatorial districts. The convention could draft and send to the voters an entirely new constitution, one or more amendments to the

existing constitution, or decide upon no changes at all. The need for revision of Michigan's constitution is generally admitted by both political parties. The reason cannot be attributed to the age of our constitution, however. Only six states have more recent documents.

The convention would almost certainly consider the four year term (all state elected officials, except the highway comnissioner are now elected for two-year terms). It is likely that the gubernatorial and senate terms would be extended. and possibly the house. Other areas bound to come under care-

Reapportionment — changing the basis for the election of state senators and representative; Lowering the voting age; the byways in style. Selection of judges; The 15-mill limitation and sales tax diversion; Organization for public school and higher education; And new flexibility for township government.

If voters approve the convention, delegates would be elected next April and they would convene in September. In either April or November of 1960, depending upon how long he convention lasted, the constitutional changes would be submitted to the voters. If adopted, the changes would take

Democrats have contended that choosing delegates to the convention on a senatorial district basis will give the Republicans an unfair advantage. Delegates from out-state GOP strongholds will outnumber the Democratic delegates from the more heavily populated metropolitan areas.

Nevertheless, the convention is receiving support from as approving a "YES" vote on this question. Superintendent of Schools Russell Amerman also urged support of the convention before P-TA members last week.



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Race Track Zoning to Face Opposition at Hearing

The newly appointed planning commission of the Village of Novi will handle its first item of business next Wednesday. It may never pass judgment on a more controversial measure. The nine-member board must rule on a zoning change for 200-acres at Ten Mile and Taft roads to pave the way for

a proposed race track venture.

Lines have already been drawn that indicate the request will not pass without opposition. And even a commission okay will be contested before the village council by at least one abutting property owner.

The request for the zonning change was officially made October 21 at the initial meeting of the newly appointed nine member planning commission. It was presented by Walter A. Cox, executive vice president and spokesman for the Grand River Enterprises corporation.

In surprisingly swift action the planners immediately scheduled a public hearing for November 12. At least one village councilman indicated before the meeting that, it was his opinion the commission would take an over-all look at the recently inherited Novi township zoning before making

The move to bring a track for trotters and runners is not new to Novi. It has been whispered privately, proposed publicly and finally voted upon locally. Essentially, the organization working to establish the track is the same one that was form ed many years ago. There have been some changes, but B. F. Gregoric remains as the guiding head of the group. Spokesman Cox entered the picture since the group won zoning approval for an oval north of Grand River near Meadowbrod oad. The new site has been called a more favorable location by the promoters. Plans at the old site were dropped.

Specifically, they are asking that the former Chapman and Correll farms be rezoned from agricultural to M-3 (industrial). According to Cox, engineering work for the project has progressed to the point where a serious request for the racing license will be made if zoning is granted.

He has stated that the facility would offer an oval for trotters and runners. Stands and parking facilities would accommodate 5,000 fans. Construction would begin immediately upon receipt or guarantee of a license, Cox stated. He indicat-

project has been estimated at \$21/2 million. While there was considerable oppsoition to the Grand River-Meadowbrook site re-zoning two years ago, the measure was upheld by a referendum, 382-351.

So, while a majority of the residents have indicated they approve the idea of building a track in Novi, the question of where it should be located remains as a controversy. The new request has an outspoken opponent in George R. Simmons, 46320 Ten Mile road, a fruit farmer whose property is directly across the road from the proposed site. Ironically, Simmons is a member of the planning commission. He has served on the board since 1945 and was named to the village commission along four other "holdover" town-

ship members and four new ones. "When the question of rezoning for a race track came before our board two years ago, I favored the measure. The property in question was already zoned M-1 (light manufacturing) and I did not feel the change would hurt the area," Simmons told The Novi News this week.

Taft road area "would seriously damage one of the most potentially beautiful residential areas in Novi.

"If I thought it was best for Novi, regardless of how it effects me, I'd support it," Simmons added. He indicated that if the request should win support of the planners he would protest to the village council when the measure came before that body for approval.

Zoning is not the only problem confronting the promoters of the Novi track. Racing Commissioner James Inglis has indicated that the procedure for awarding a new license is very slow even after

application is made. Furthermore, only one license remains to be issued in the metropolitan area. This permit was denied the Mt. Clemens association by Inglis and cannot be awarded until legal action brought by the group is settled. Wilbur DeYoung, attorney for the racing commission, has said that the litigation may take two years to settle.

Novi's planners will meet at 8 p.m. at the township hall and answer the first of the problems.
