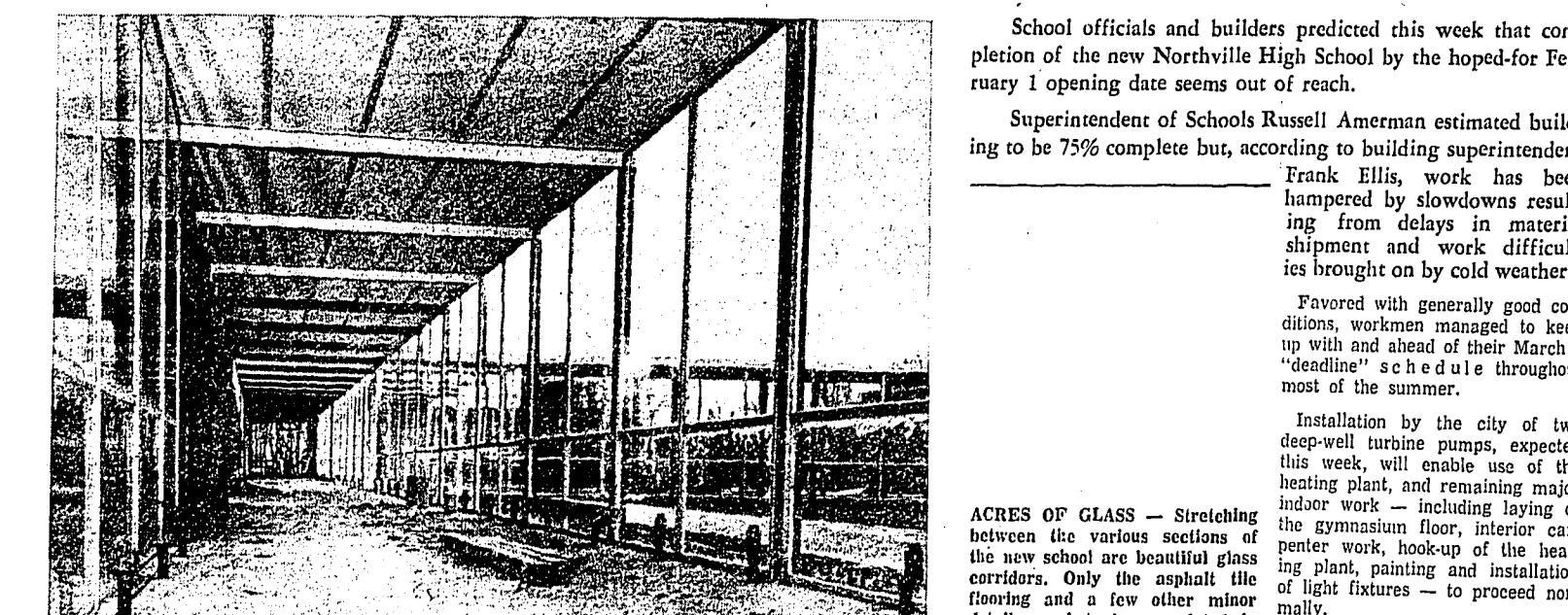

School officials and builders predicted this week that completion of the new Northville High School by the hoped-for February 1 opening date seems out of reach.

Superintendent of Schools Russell Amerman estimated building to be 75% complete but, according to building superintendent Frank Ellis, work has been hampered by slowdowns resulting from delays in material shipment and work difficulties brought on by cold weather.

Installation by the city of two deep-well turbine pumps, expected this week, will enable use of the heating plant, and remaining major interior work - including laying of the gymnasium floor, interior carpenter work, hook-up of the heating plant, painting and installation of light fixtures - to proceed normally.

Shipment of materials has picked up somewhat, Ellis said this week, adding that with the chief problems out of the way the March 1 deadline can probably be met.

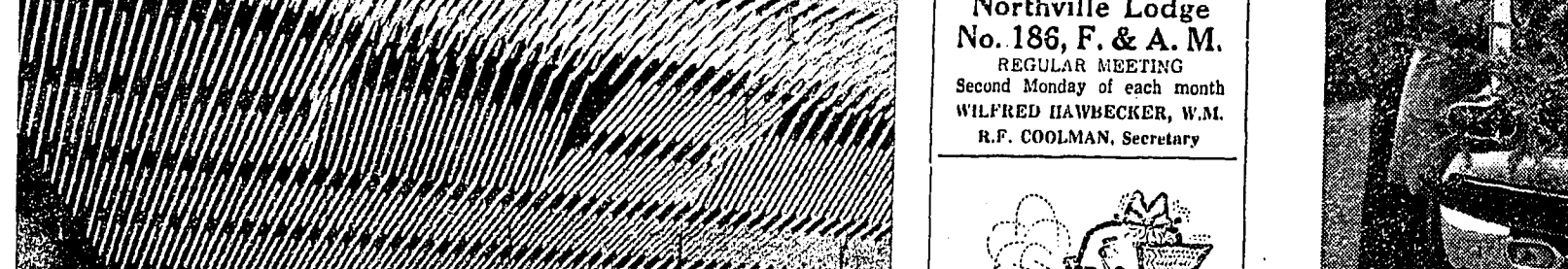
As far as it is practical, Amerman said, plans for the move into the new campus will hold "almost up to the last minute" in order to get renovations of the old high school building underway as soon as possible.

Both Amerman and Ellis indicated that measuring by present progress there is little reason to think that the moving date would be delayed much beyond March 1.

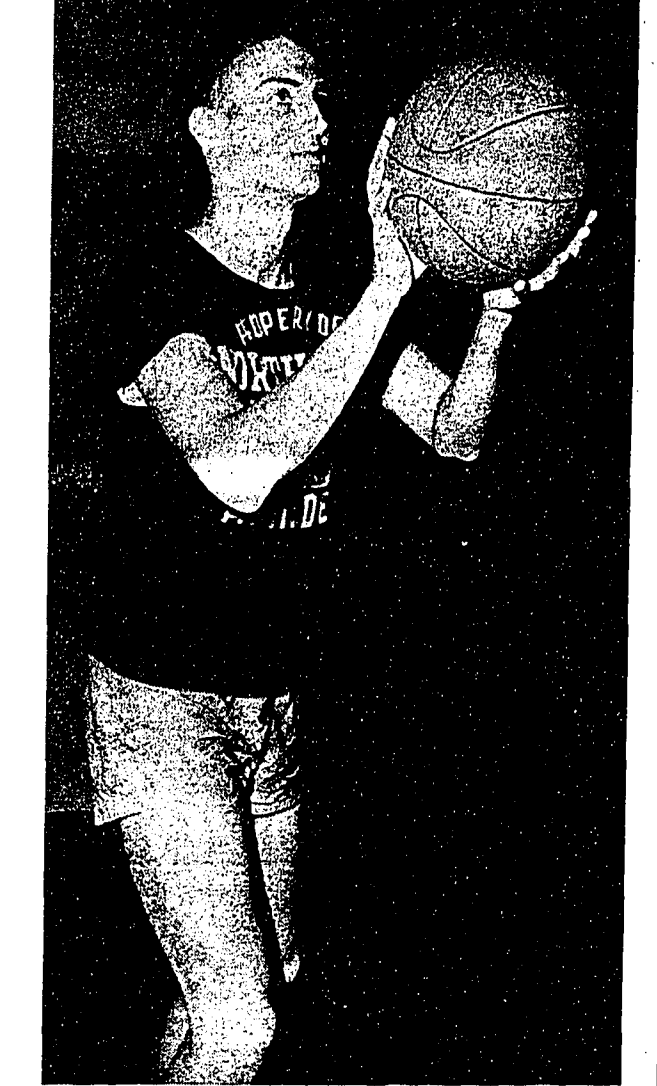

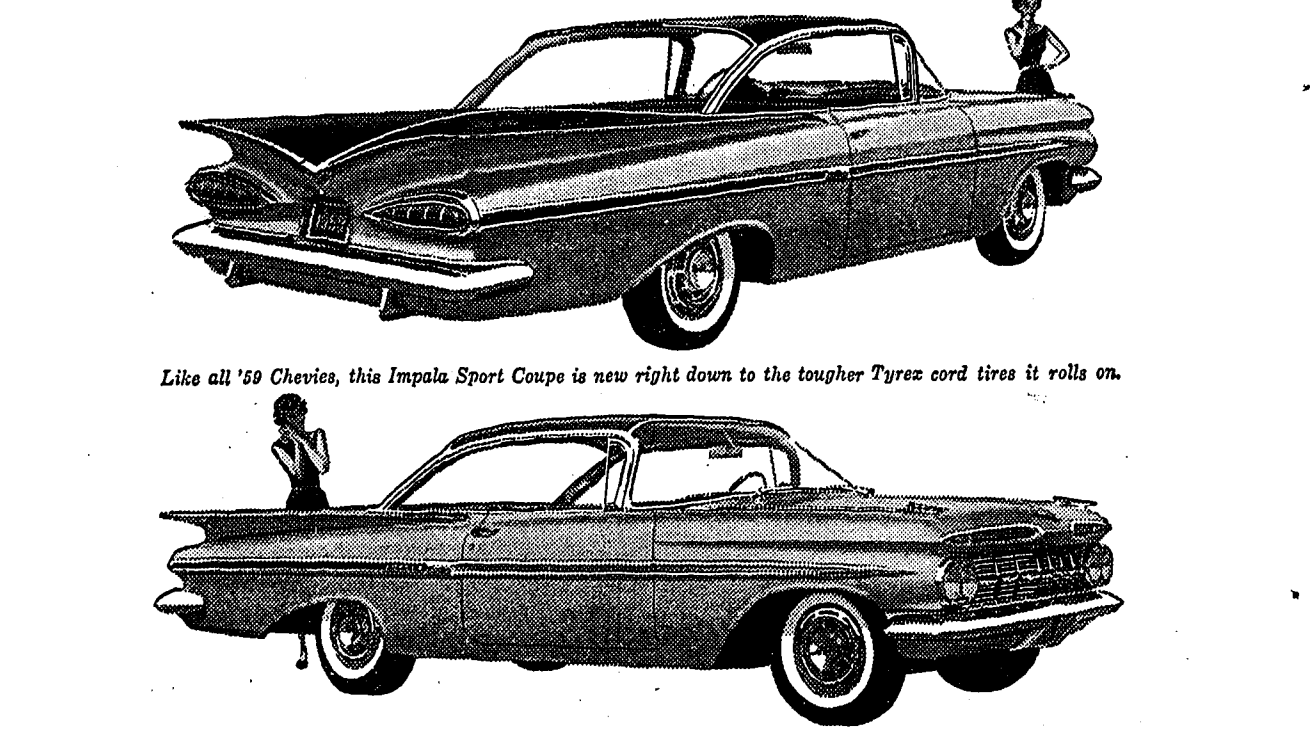

Exit 92,500 Deer

An estimated 92,500 deer were taken in Michigan during the 1958 season, according to the conservation department.
This is a high mark since the 1953 harvest of 99,500 and confirms a department pre-season forecast of a 10-15 percent increase over last year's take of 79,438 whitetails.

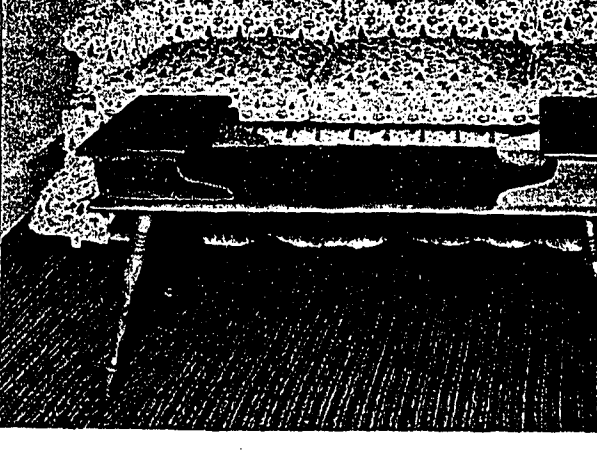
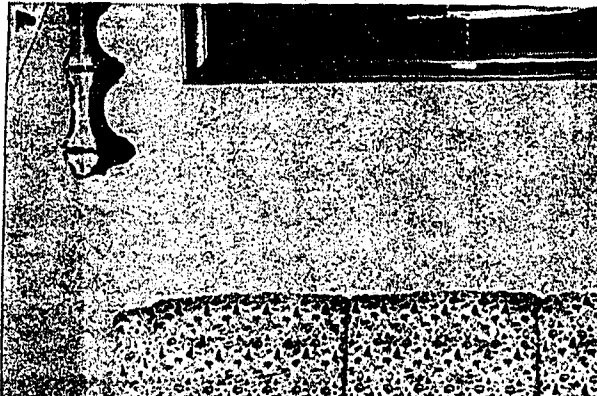

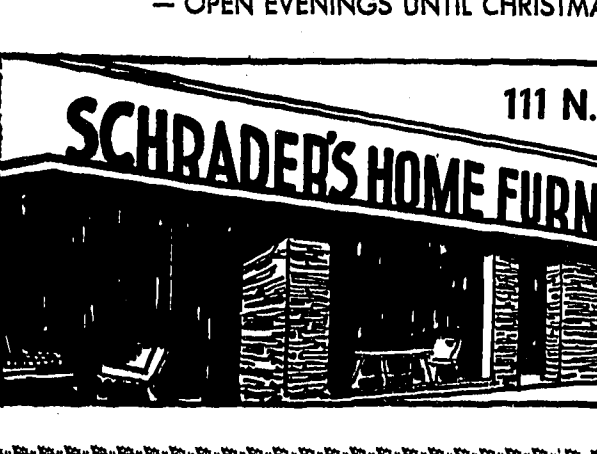

KEEP YOUR EYES ON JERUSALEM!
Jerusalem is the most important city in all the world. It is the only city in the world that is called "The Holy City" (Neh. 11:1 & 18). God promises a blessing to those who will pray for its peace. (Psalm 122:6). There is a very significant prophecy concerning it in which we ought to be interested. In Luke 21:24, we read "And they (the Jews) shall fall by the edge of the sword, and shall be led away captive into all nations, UNTIL the times of the Gentiles be fulfilled." Particular attention should be paid to the word "Until". The present dispensation shall end when Jerusalem is no longer under Gentile control.

THE SITUATION AT PRESENT
On November 29, 1947 the United Nations made its first decision concerning the division of Palestine between the Jews and the Arabs. It was decided that Jerusalem would be an international metropolis. This provoked the Jews and the Arabs.

The Jews and the Arabs fought in 1948 ending in a truce in December of that year. The Jews were the victors and the result was that they gained almost all that they asked for except Jerusalem.

Jerusalem is divided into two parts, the old city and the new city. The old city contains three sacred places for the three great religions of the world. The Church of the Holy Sepulchre for Christians; The Mosque of Omar for the Mohammedans, and the Walling Wall of the Jews.

The new city lies north and west of the old city. It has experienced an amazing pop- ulation growth during the last few years. On December 6, 1948, the Premier of Israeli moved his offices from Tel Aviv to the new city of the City of Jerusalem. This action was promptly condemned by the U.N. The order to move was never obeyed and never had been enforced by the United Nations.

This leaves the old city in the hands of the Arabs (Gentiles) and the new city in the hands of the Jews.

In between these two cities is a strip of land known as "No-man's-land". This division is guarded day and night by both sides. Here is where frequent border clashes occur. Barricades and barbed wire entanglements are the walls which separate these two.

THE POINT OF SPECIAL INTEREST
If the Jews should move in and take over the old City of Jerusalem, then the Times of the Gentiles would be at an end. It is at this point that the Lord Jesus will return for the second time. His return is the next great event in human history. The Bible speaks of a phenomenal evacuation of all Christians and the bodily resurrection of those who have died in the faith.

We seemed poised upon the very verge of a new age. Not only of new nuclear surprises, or the age of space travel—but the age of the Lord's return. If the Jews should suddenly decide to enter and possess the old city (which according to reliable information, they are well able to do) the time of His appearing will be at hand.

Surely this should cause every unprepared person to do some serious thinking about God's offer of salvation through Jesus Christ.

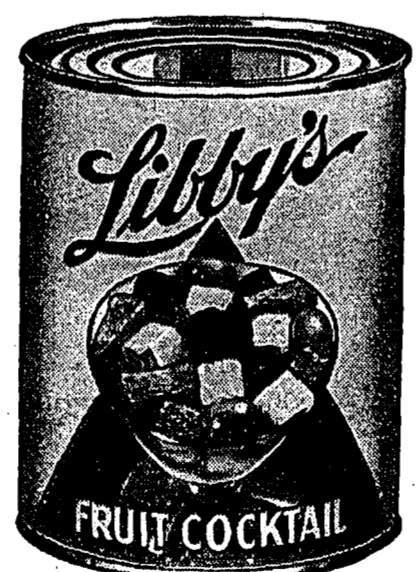

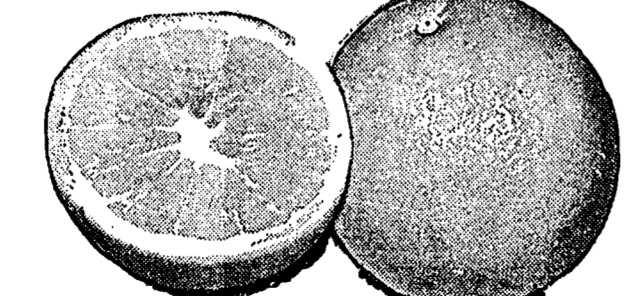

Balon Wins Seat On Wixom Council

Former Novi Township Trustee Stanley C. Balon was named to the Wixom city council last Thursday night.

Mayor Fred Beaman, nominated by Mayor Pro Tem R. W. Lahn, drew two of the votes.

Beaman had run for a spot on the Wixom city council at the last election.

Ackley based his denial on the grounds that the proposed park to be located at the southeast corner of Pontiac and West roads...

John Weiss, representative of Associated Investment Company, Detroit, which owns the proposed park site...

According to Weiss, "the park will be the most modern, attractive one in Michigan."

The investment company may request a zoning change through the Village Planning Commission.

The proposed park, he contended, would raise the valuation of adjoining property.

The investment company, which already has secured approval for the park from the state health department...

Members of the Novi Republican club have voted to meet at the home of each member, Eugene J. Choquet, club secretary, announced.

The monthly meeting decision was reached after the club learned it has the largest group of the Novi community building.

Committee reports on membership, lights, entertainment and fund-raising were given.

Novi HIGHLIGHTS: A token fee of \$1 was voted by the council for installation permits on new or converted gas units.

The vote was taken after citizen Herbert Abrams told the council it should eliminate permit charges for gas heating units.

Consumers Power plans to make its own inspections, Abrams said, making it unnecessary and unfair their charges for duplication of the city simply for the sake of collecting permit fees.

Other action taken up by the council: Denied a request by Robert Mexico to erect a sign on city property at the corner of Roydon and Loom Lake roads.

Endorsed application of Sigmond Erdel to amend his BDM license so that he may enlarge Ward general store. He plans to have the partition removed between the present store and the old post office.

Agreed to close the city hall offices on Friday following Christmas and New Year's. The offices will be closed Thursday through Sunday both week ends.

Changed the second December meeting date from Christmas, December 25, to tonight.

Agreed to meet with Oakland county commission and state highway personnel at 3:30 p.m., January 8 in Pontiac to discuss the parking situation in Wixom.

Other Wixom citizens who wish to attend may apply at the city hall, 101 Michigan Street, Wixom.

Volued interest in Michigan State university plays to investigate the framework of the city. Councilman authorized sending of a post card indicating the council's wish to know more about the project.

Keneth Warren, who has been retained to reorganize Wixom property, explained some of the procedures the council must go through in order to determine an assessed valuation rate to be applied to the new appraisal.

Warren told the council he and his staff would be finished with their work by today.

An application for the position of city assessor, building department and administrative assistant, was withdrawn after the council failed to act on it.

Warren reportedly asked for \$6,000 plus for the city assessor. Councilmen felt the budget would not permit the expenditure at this time.

Council Deadlocks on Manager Choice

Novi council tied themselves in a knot Monday over the hiring of a village manager.

After considerable debate and disagreement, the knot was untied — temporarily at least.

The issues which spawned disagreement were these: The council is considering three or four possible sites, but that he expects opposition no matter which is chosen.

Councilman Russell Burton, who wasn't wholly satisfied with either applicant, wanted to postpone hiring anyone until more of the nearly 40 applicants were interviewed.

Tuck and Anderson favored the older experienced applicant who has an engineering background, while Greenberg and Trafilan appeared to favor the younger man with less practical experience but who has indicated a desire to tackle all facets of the job.

The two men considered were: Eugene W. Heidemann, 57, a self-employed civil engineer from Romeo, and Donald H. Ackerman, Jr., 28-year-old assistant political science professor at Western Michigan University.

Heidemann is a graduate of Notre Dame university, with past experience as a surveyor for the Ohio State highway department, assistant engineer for Toledo, field engineer for the Department of Interior manager, and city engineer for West Branch, manager-city engineer for Manistowick, and engineer-manager for the Michigan Department of Conservation.

Ackerman, who also is assistant director of the Michigan Citizenship Clearing House, graduated from Syracuse university, has had graduate work in political science, public administration, social sciences, local government and administration, and is a former teacher of handicapped children and a high school coach.

The unusual council proceedings started when Burton's motion to bring additional applicants died without support. Burton, in attempt to bring the issue to a head, then motioned to hire Heidemann, followed by a vote to accept Ward's Superintendent, Trafilan, and yes votes by Tuck and Anderson.

Burton then motioned to hire Ackerman, followed by a vote to accept Ward's Superintendent, Trafilan, and yes votes by Tuck and Anderson.

Advertisements for the past were carried in several newspapers and periodicals for the past month. They stipulated the annual approximate salary range of the manager would be between \$5,000 to \$6,000.

The council originally hoped to hire a manager before December 31, but it was unable to do so until after the year-end.

In other business Monday, the council voted to accept Ward's Superintendent of \$555 for four more and mid tires for the village truck; agreed to accept bids for two police cars; and Tuck and Anderson.

What Grades Reveal

Mrs. G. H. Wittes: "If an answer to a question is not on a test, it is not a question. It is a matter of fact. We have had considerable discussion about just what the grades reveal about the child's progress in school."

There has been relatively little published dealing specifically with just what teacher's marks really do indicate. That side of the perennial pro and con discussion about report cards has been generally ignored in favor of the more heated one of whether we should have report cards at all.

An increasing number of elementary schools are eliminating the marking controversy by eliminating teacher-parent conferences for reporting and discussing the child's progress in school.

When a teacher gives a mark to a child as an evaluation of achievement — whether it be an A or B or C or D — he risks the inevitable possibility of error. Any time any one person regardless of
