

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

Persons between the ages of 18 and 21, except those who are married or in military service, are required to have the consent of parents or guardians.



AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR BELL AND WHISTLE OR SIREN ON ENGINES, USE AT CROSSING, PENALTY; CIVIL DAMAGES; SIG-NAL BOARD.

THE CITY OF WIXOM ORDAINS: ECTION 1-Short Title. This ordinance shall be known and e cited as the "Ordinance Providing for Bell and Whistle or Siren on Engines, Use at Crossings, Penalty, Civil Damages, Signal Board."

ECTION 2-A bell of at least thirty (30) pounds weight and the steam or air whistle or siren, shall be placed on each locomotive engine traveling within the corporation limits of the City of Wixom, and said whistle or siren shall be twice sharply sounded at least forty (40) rods before the crossing is reached, and after the sounding of the whistle or siren the bell shall be rung continuously until the crossing is passed, under a penalty of \$100 for every neglect; and the company shall also be liable for all damages which shall be sustained by any persons by reason of such neglect. Every railroad corporation shall and they are hereby required to cause signal boards to be placed well supported by posts or otherwise and maintained at each public road or street where the same is crossed by the railroad track at grade. The board shall be so elevated so as not to obstruct the travel and to be seen by people before reaching the crossing, and on each side of such board shall be painted in letters not less than 12" in height, the words "Rail Road Crossing". This provision shall not apply to signal boards already erected.

This ordinance was introduced at the council meeting of the City of Wixom held on Thursday, January 28, A.D., 1960 and shall be presented for passage at the council meeting to be held February 11, 1960.

Aside from the legal aspect (the area proposed for annexation lies partly in the township alone and partly in the village), there appears to be some concern as to the desirability (on the part of the city of Northville) of annexing the area. This is a new twist for local annexations. Previously, city residents voted heavily in favor of annexing the Novi area from Novi road to just beyond Taft road and north to the 81/2 mile

Now rumbles are being heard that it will just cost the city taxpayer more money to annex Northville Estates and the adjoining 135-acres of village property between the subdivision and the city limits on Eight Mile road.

Novi's village council, though not entirely by its own doing, seems to have gained an uncanny ability to jump nimbly from the fire to the frying pan and back.

Its troubles are common knowledge. Its attackers are strange bedfellows, each with individual grievances peculiar to their own interests. They are united only by the fact that each bears a complaint against the village - not through sympathy to one another's problem.

It's impossible to imagine a solution that would satisfy all factions. But, on the other hand, even the most optimistic member of the village council would have difficulty in proclaiming that

there is "nothing wrong" in Novi. We don't profess to have the ability to point a finger at the trouble spots — neither, however, do we believe they can be settled by closed "executive sessions" or the tabling of any official action with an ostrich philosophy that "if we

don't look it might go away". (Perhaps the council took its cue from the township board's newest policy; not to record any differences of opinion among board members in the minutes unless an official vote on the matter is taken. We don't like this either, and have no intention of deleting constructive discussions - argu-

ments — from our reporting of the meetings.) Specifically, The News' complaint is with the manner in which the village council has handled the resignation of Police Chief Lee BeGole.

The council has known officially of the letter since its February 1 meeting.
It has known of BeGole's reasons for resignation for sev eral months.

Yet at press time Wednesday the council had not yet acted on the resignation, which becomes effective in four Monday night. The village manager was not present (although




