Then, and only then, experts say, can you be assured of cure. Cancer MAY be cured at a later stage - many cases have been, but the best time to be assured of cure is to detect it when it is microscopic in size.

CAN I PUT IT IN JUST ONE BOOM? Yes, and economically, too, as indicated above. Typical examples: when you're add ing a new room, finishing an upstairs, closing in a porch or breezeway. Electric heat is especially valuable when the new iving space is a long way from the central reating system, or when the central system already working to capacity. Another good time to use electric heat is when you nave a hard-to-heat area. CAN I PUT IT IN THE WHOLE HOUSE?

Yes, you can switch the whole house over to electric heat. In this case, additions nsulation will be required, plus storm sash and storm doors all around. For greatest heating economy and summe omfort, regardless of type of heating system, good insulation pays off. Industry-established standards for this area for insulation thickness is not less than (overhead; 35%" in outside walls; 2" alongide and partially under concrete floor slab

WHAT DOES IT COST TO USE ELECTRIC HEAT? Various factors, including family living habits, affect operating cost, so a hard-andast answer is impossible. A rough rule o thumb is 25¢-28¢ per square foot of heated space, annually. But there's little need t guess. An electric heating contractor can calculate actual first cost and operating cost quickly and accurately. Electric heat will cost more. But the cost will probably not be as high as one would

WHAT MAKES ELECTRIC HEAT BETTER? FLEXIBILITY-Each room has its own thermostat. So each remains at the temperature you choose without affecting other areas. Temperatures can be raised of lowered in any room without overheating or chilling the rest of the house. Just touch on the proper thermostat does it. SPEED-When a thermostat is adjusted call for more heat, the response is fast! In the systems described here, the heat source is right in each unit-only inches away instead of many feet.
