It is possible for a handful of people attending an annual meeting to discard the plans of a township board and insert the wishes of a minority group. By a simple vote of those present a oudget can be raised or lowered, or completely revised.

Years ago - and even today in sparsely populated townships - nearly every resident attended the annual meeting and

But now 50 or 100 residents present is considered a huge turnout. Yet this represents between one or two percent of a township

Even though I would favor eliminating the power that the public holds at an annual meeting, I still believe the idea is basic-

Such meetings recall the very method under which our nation was founded and stand as an excellent means for the board of trustees to make an annual report to the voters and

Our laws make it possible for the electorate to take proper corrective steps, if necessary, without hasty minority action at the

In my opinion another change could be made in township government that would be highly advantageous to the constructive dvancement of the community - the elimination of partisan poli-




Road Detours Bewilder, Anger Motorists, Residents





And home owners along these detour routes are equally upset as they hide in their homes covered by huge clouds of dust. According to county road officials, some of these problems will remain until Novi road construction is complete in November. Presently, motorists driving east on Eight Mile road



Eight Mile Ripped up Near Novi Road at Taft must travel along the newly constructed Eight-Mile Cutoff to Center street. Randolph street at Taft is blocked while road improvements are made. To continue east from Center, motorists must turn right to Baseline and then east again. At Eight Mile near the new cutoff motorists traveling east are again detoured over a dirt trail to old Eight Mile-which also has brought complaints because of its choppy condition. Construction Begins on Novi Road along this road because officials have stated that Eight Mile from Northville to Haggerty will be improved next year.
