

A proposed schedule is now being prepared by a study group for presentation by December 1 in hopes the recommendations can be initiated in the next school budget.

When this is successfully completed, it would appear that our "school house" would be well organized.

There will be other problems, of course. But the school board and school administrators will be ready to meet them as they arise. I believe it is a high tribute to the work of our school administrators and board members that Northville finds itself in this position. In a job that is the frequent target for criticism, they have moved ahead, despite serious money problems, to provide modern and adequate facilities along with a deeply interested teaching staff.

They have had a good share of outside help from willing parents, but the task of making decisions and moving ahead on projects has fallen on the shoulders of a few.


