Bus Law Results

IT WILL PROBABLY take another year before the effectiveness of the 1958 law which makes it mandatory for motorized school buses to stop at a school bus stop can be determined.

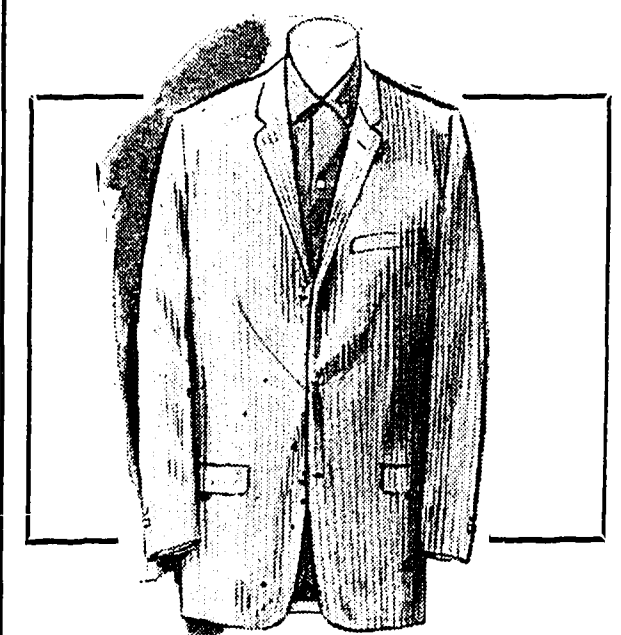

Present were Mr. Heslop, Mr. Erwin, Mr. Taylor, Mr. MacBride, Mr. MacMahon and Mr. Knodle. The superintendent was absent. Also present were Mr. Taraspa, Mr. MacMahon and a number of parents.

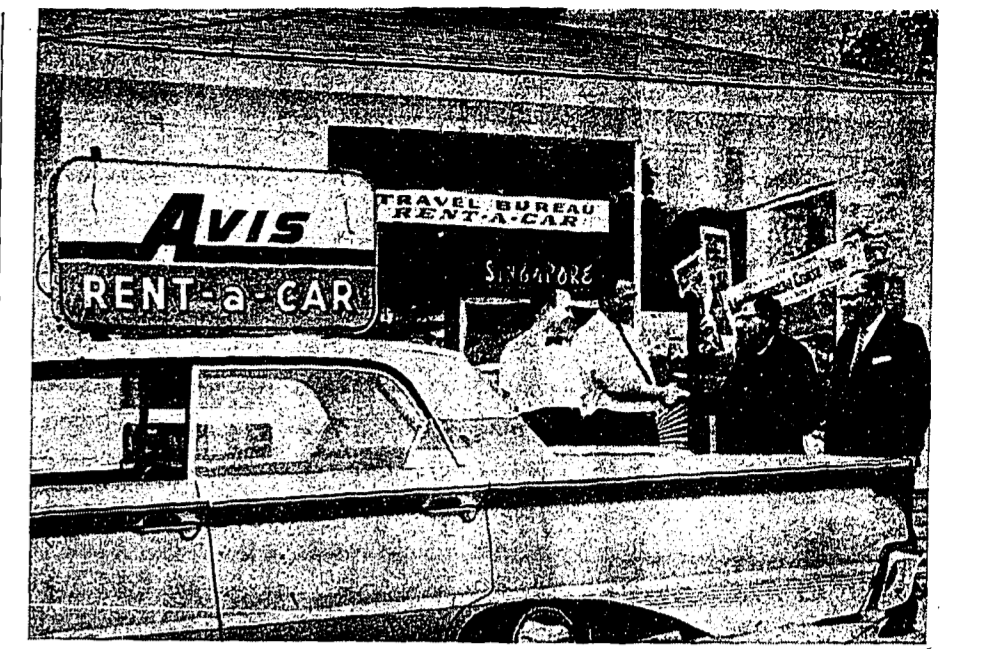
