

# SPEAKING for the Record

Whenever someone is involved in a fire, whether property damage has been heavy or light, it's inevitable that the work of the fire department will be mentioned.

Don't forget to commend the firemen for the job they do. It's the unanimous opinion. It's not just a polite phrase. But to appreciate firefighters you have to like their services.

It's like the arrival of the doctor when your small child is sick.

It broke out in the early hours of Wednesday morning. Fire broke out in the parlor of this newspaper.

Aroused by Officer Frank Heintz and informed that two units were fighting a fire at The Record I could only imagine the worse.

I fully expected to see a gutted shell when we arrived on the scene minutes later.

Instead Bill McGee and Alex Lyke and their crew had the flames under control and confined to one section of the ceiling in the rear of the pressroom.

Their work in the smoke-filled building was completely professional. A ton of worry was lifted off my shoulders when I watched them perform.

Township Treasurer Roy Terrill expressed the same sentiments to me this week. Fire struck his farm destroying a ten-acre house last week. Fast action of the Salem, House of Correction and Northville departments saved adjoining buildings from damage.

So to volunteers who answer the fire call — and usually at a most inconvenient hour — go our profound thanks.

The coordination between city departments in the case of fire is also worthy of commendation.

On hand at the Record fire were Public Works Superintendent Earl Hartner in case water was needed, while Officer Heintz handled all police problems.

We expected to hear some comments last week on the change in the appearance of the newspaper.

In addition, there are 31 doctorate degrees being presented. The total of 1,563 degrees compares with the previous midyear high of 1,328 in February, 1958.

# Novi Needs Own Junior High, Committee Says

A recommendation that the Novi school board "adopt a program so that they might have an operational junior high school by the year 1964" was handed down by the Citizens' Committee on School Sites at the Wednesday meeting last Wednesday.

The five-page typewritten report also recommended immediate appointment of a committee composed of citizens, teachers, consultants and board members to prepare a preliminary report of educational recommendations for a junior high school and that the report be submitted to the board within one year.

The board took no action on the report other than stating that it will be studied and asked the committee to come back to its next meeting March 8.

The committee chairman is David Fried, of 4100 Hollywood. Members are George Mair, of 42027 Grand River; Mrs. Cliff Cline, of 41232 N. McLaughlin; Circle, Farmington; and Herbert Dryer, of 27555 Novi Road, Northville.

The report said that the present arrangement with the Northville school system "is good and should be continued in what can be considered an unusual move, the board went into executive session to discuss the matter of discipline involving his child at Novi School about two weeks ago."

The Executive Board was out for two hours during which the public — mostly parents — of teachers from the Novi School — chatted and watched television in the Orchard Hills Library.

When the Board came back, they passed a motion stating that teachers "have the authority to discipline and two other teachers from Novi School."

The motion's purpose, as read by member Edward E. Brown, was to clear the air of "do" with the matter discussed behind closed doors. They said the new motion was an "aggressive" move.

The new motion said that the purpose of the December motion was "not to limit the authority of the teaching and administrative staff."

Before the motion was passed by the board, member Walter Ambler asked for an interpretation of the word "strict". Receiving none satisfactory to him, he proposed an amendment which called for a meeting as soon as possible to discuss the discipline problem.

It was voted down, 2-2. Heilip, Erwin and Russell Taylor voting nay. The new motion was then passed by a vote of 10-2. Ambler and John McBride voting nay.

Discussion from the floor centered about a "feeling" of many teachers that the December motion put the teacher on the spot and gave the students the impression that they couldn't be "tough".

McKacy said: "There has been a black mark on the teachers themselves and that they would be subject to the Board's criticism."

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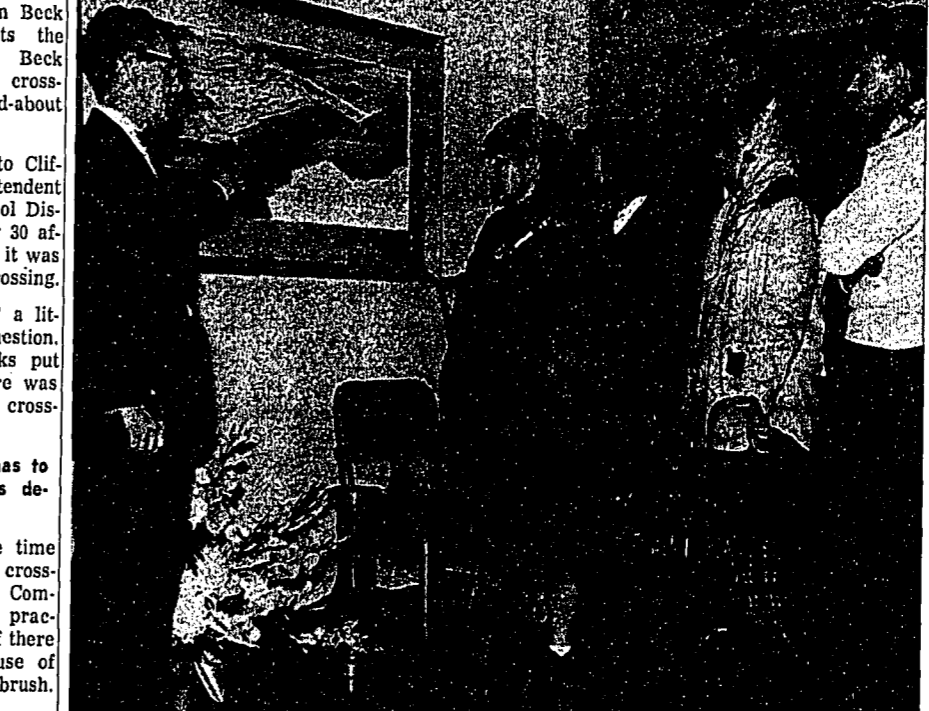

State Action Needed

Probably there never was a time when more Michigan people were thinking and talking about state action than now. This includes both common and state leaders. And probably there has never been a time when people of the state were so willing to work together in such programs. Unemployment figures, business reports and recent state action indicate that Michigan is in serious need of improvement — and now.

Arkansas, for example, has advertised for several years that "100 per cent financing of industrial plants" is available. In fact, Pennsylvania has spent something more than half a million dollars for this advertising alone. Five years ago the Pennsylvania legislature appropriated \$5 million for plant construction loans. From year to year additional sums have been appropriated to bring the total to \$18 million. For each plant construction project that qualifies the state loans a third of the cost is guaranteed by the state.

Babson Park, Mass. For years I have been comparing monthly retail prices of household goods. With the exception of the war years, these retail prices have always been lowest early in the month of February. The efficient merchant discounts to carry any merchandise more than a year. 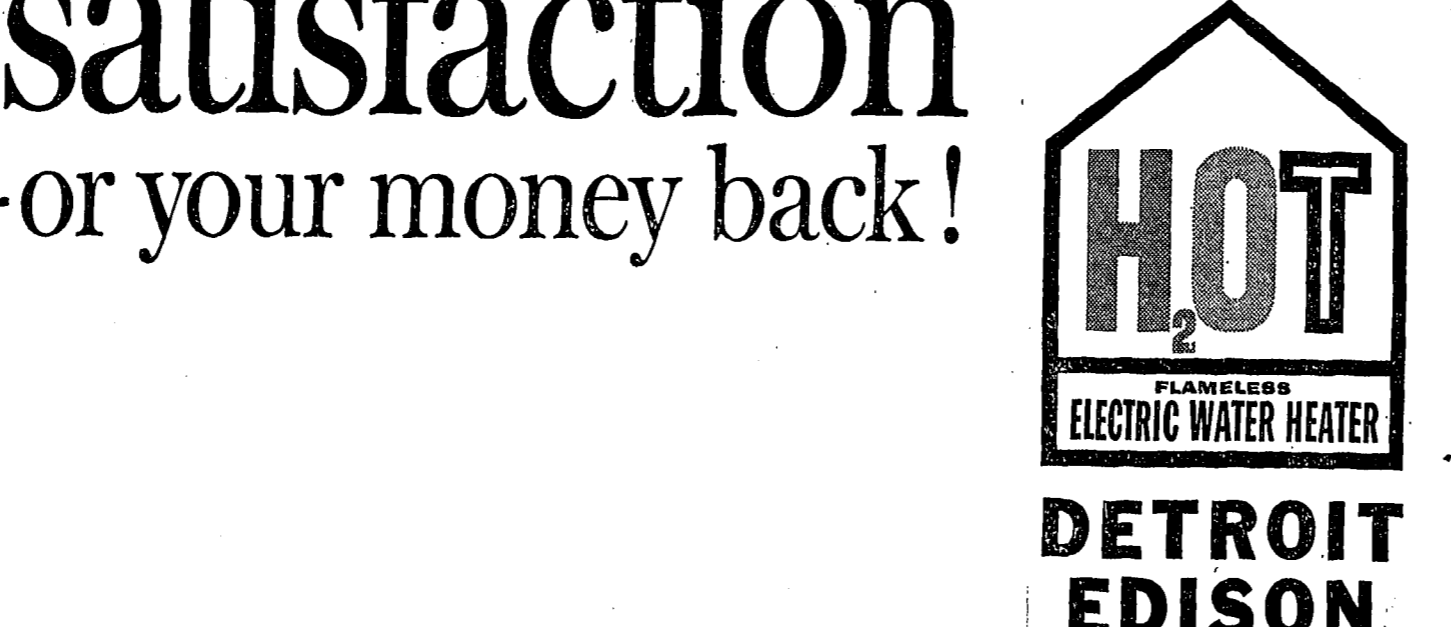

"She must have believed that she was in danger," said the cabbie. "She kept saying that Commies were after them and that I was a Commie and that they had better call the police right away."

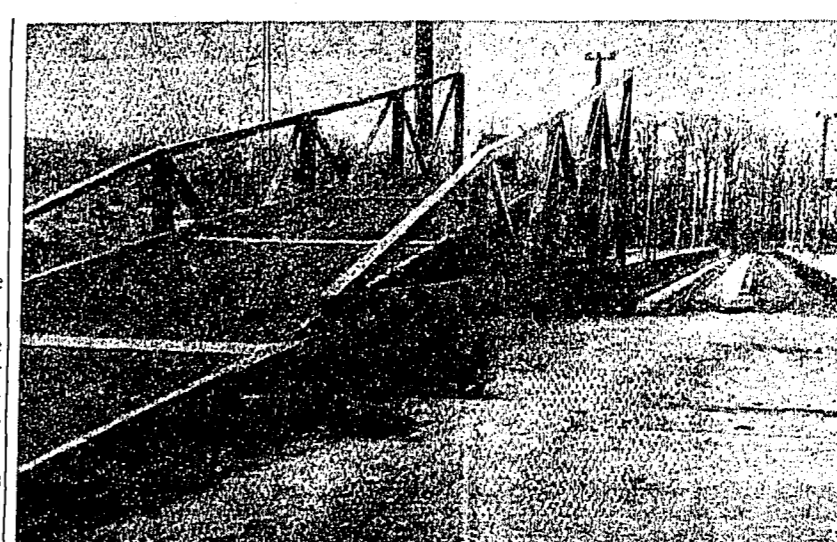
Late Sunday night, Verhaegh picked up Mr. and Mrs. William Kirpatrick, of 2326 Star Street, Detroit. They asked to be taken home, not an unusual request because Nov 1 Cabs make several trips daily to Detroit and other suburbs.

Then before he knew it, the woman began to cry and to threaten. He was driving east on Pontiac Trail at the time when the woman got into the car to Grand River.

Verhaegh said that he didn't believe they were going to harm him. He was just going this way, then that way, stopping and starting.

"But I played along with her," he said. "I didn't want to get into a fight and I figured if I kept her under control, I could keep him from using that knife," Verhaegh said.

He was finally ordered to stop at the Fairlane Motel, at 5700 Grand River, by Mrs. Kirpatrick. She wanted to call the police.

Truckers Protesting 'Unfair' ICC Rates

Truckers — their rigid fight is with the Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) — are demonstrating in front of the Wixom Lincoln plant this week protesting the Ford Motor Company's decision to ship Thunderbirds rail rather than truck.

Wixom is the only plant in Swanton where the repeal of the Ford plant producing Tri-levels and Continentals with in August, 1958, which the truckers maintain has "resulted in discriminatory tariff rates against a large segment of the trucking industry."

That ruling allowed the railroad industry to set its own rates so that it could compete with the trucks and airlines at a profitable level. The railroad claims that with World War II, but since then, the tri-level leaders they can operate profitably at a rate approximately one-half that of the trucks.

An official at the Wixom plant said that 25 to 30 rail road cars will be loaded daily. The tri-level cars, which all decks are used, hold up to 12 Continentals or 15 Tri-levels, equivalent to three to four trucks.

Loading at the four long docks to the north of the plant started this week. A giant automatic machine, consisting of a single ramp which can raise to the level of the deck being loaded, moves on rail from one track to the other at a rate of about 200 feet per minute. The loading area size is 700 x 200 feet.

But on the outside looking in are the unemployed truckers. Last month, the Automobile Transport, Inc., with offices across from the plant on Wixom Road and the E. & J. Transit Co., with offices across the expressway on Wixom Road, shut down, making over 400 men jobless.

Voters Defeat One Incumbent

Nov 1 township primary voters dropped one of their incumbent candidates and retained another by a narrow 11 vote margin in a decision which brought 716 to the polls Monday.

Gordon Promo, Republican trustee whose tenure on the board dates to June, 1958, was upset in his bid for re-nomination by Emery Jacques, 306 to 201.

Republican Justice of the Peace Robert Anderson was given a scare by William MacDermid, 219 to 208.

In the only other contested office on the Republican ballot, Donnell Bell defeated Mrs. Willard Sprague for nomination as township treasurer, 235 to 200.

The defeat of Promo must be termed a mild surprise, although Jacques has been active and well known in township community affairs.

Promo was appointed to his board position when Stanley Balon resigned. The latter resided in the Wixom section of Wixom township and became ineligible to serve in Nov 1 when Wixom incorporated into a city.

The vote to elect two additional trustees to the township board in 1963 was turned down by a 252 to 159 margin. In non-contested offices the results were: Democratic Herbert Koester, supervisor, 52; Harvey Milford, trustee, 46; Republican Eugene Starn, supervisor, 44; Hedio Daibert, clerk, 402; Kenneth Cook, board of review, 403; Republican Roger Curtis, constable, 270 and 315, respectively.

These were three winning candidates for township committee members, automatically selecting the trio. They are Miss Eugenie Choquet (6), Jacques (3) and Starn (3).

The spring election will be held April 3.
