CITY OF NORTHVILLE AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE

The City of Northville Ordains: That Article XVII of the Zoning Ordinance for the City

of Northville shall be amended by adding thereto the following section Section 17.02. A fee of \$25.00 shall be charged and collected

at the time of the presentation to the Planning Commission of a petition for change or amendment to the Zoning Ordinance. Said fee shall cover the cost of advertising, printing and other expenses incurred by the City in connection with the processing of said petition and shall be paid to the City Treasurer to be credited to the General Fund of the City of Northville. If said petition is denied by the City Planning Commission prior to the calling and holding of a public hearing upon the petition the fee shall be refunded to the petitioner.

This amendment shall take effect March 3, 1961.
