The area of the elevator was quite the hub' of commercial activity. Across the tracks from it, there was a barrel and a cheese factory. The latter was owned by Fred Warner, former Michigan governor.

To the east, up to the mid-1920's, two stockyards handled livestock. Operating it were a one-armed gent named Ed Holmes and his partner, Lou Bullum.

To the west, there was small barn where hay and fertilizers were stored. Between the barn and the elevator were coal bins. Where the Grand River viaduct stands there used to be a row of maple trees where farmers and their horses took a breather from the hot summer sun. To the north. fence posts were stored and It was conceivable for

farmer to pick up whatever supplies and materials he needed without walking more than a few hundred feet.

Official records are scarco as to when the elevator was originally built, A 1908 Oakland County map shows a Whipple's Elevator, Human memories recall the time shortly after this when it was known as McClaren's Elevator. He and his sons owned a chain of elevators throughout the area.

In 1929, John R. Walters and Leo Gildermeister, both from Farmington, bought the elevaor. Walters died in 1950, Giliermeister, about three years 'ater. Don Walters, with the Novi DPW now and a son of John, took over the operation intil 1955. When he closed down 1 1955, it marked 25 years since ie began in his Dad's business.
