If anyone's ever written a book entitled "How to Select an Architect to Build a City Hall", the Northville council would undoubtedly buy a copy.

From a list of approximately 15 possibilities the council has narrowed down the architectural firms under consideration to four.

Still, there's some inclination to complete this important first step so that progress may be made toward actual construction of the building.

Will it get underway this year? That's anyone's guess.

A likely question for State Senator Ray Dzendzel when he appears at the community building tomorrow night for his second informal discussion with interested residents will be the new "loan to business" measure.

It passed the senate this week and will be a last-minute addition to the April 1 ballot. The bill would make state money available to community economic development groups, which would use the money to help finance industrial facilities for private firms.

The measure, proposed by Governor Swanson, will ask voters to repeal the present constitutional provision forbidding the state to invest tax money in private industry.

Speaking of industrial development, two young men moved their aluminum storm window manufacturing business into Novi last week with a burst of enthusiasm and determination.

Robert E. Metz and James Smallman, owners of Inter-Lake Window Industries, Inc., took over nearly 6,000 square feet of the old Young Door plant on Grand River north newly occupied by Smith Products and predicted their business would double this year.

They employ about 23 and build custom storm windows for some 140 dealers throughout the state.

Both Metz and Smallman are highly enthusiastic about Novi's location and access to major highways.

SPEAKING for the Record

A "handful" of people — 12 to be exact — turned out Friday night to discuss with State Senator Ray Dzendzel some of the issues before the state legislature.
Dzendzel isn't discouraged. He's coming back again, probably in May after the anticipated April rush of legislative business has passed its peak.
Senator Dzendzel is the representative in the state senate of Northville township and Wayne county residents of the city — whether they like his political affiliation or not.
He should be a source of valuable information to anyone interested in state government — and certainly there are more than 12 in Northville.

I like Senator Dzendzel's idea of making a public appearance each month or so before his constituents. It's billed as a non-political effort designed to keep the people at home informed on the Lansing scene.
We'd have to take the "non-political" part with a grain of salt — but fail to see anything wrong with the senator strengthening his job security so long as he is willing to undertake such a time-consuming project.
What's more, his appearances could hurt his popularity. If his answers are not fully comprehensive and complete in detail.
It is not important that Senator Dzendzel agree with his questioners; it is, however, important that he can substantiate his position on the issues.

As an unsolicited suggestion to Senator Dzendzel and his moderator, I would propose that future sessions might draw a larger audience and prove more informative if:
— interested citizens would be encouraged to submit questions to the moderator a week in advance of the meeting thereby giving the senator an opportunity for research, if necessary;
— a definite time schedule be established — 8 p. m. until 10 p. m., for example — and designation of the final half-hour to questions from the floor that had not been previously submitted;
— finally, the true purpose of the sessions could be served more properly if members of the audience would refrain from direct, blunt criticisms of political parties per se; this is not to suggest that debate of party policy differences should be excluded.

In a side-light of Friday night's meeting Senator Dzendzel pointed to a full page advertisement published by the Lansing State Journal as evidence of Michigan's strength — and as related to a recently published article in a national magazine entitled "Michigan: The Problem State."
In its positive answer to the article the Journal has this to say:
— Michigan is the first in the nation in the production of motor vehicles, parts, truck-trailers and mobile homes; boat building; conveyors; machine shop work; gray-iron foundry production; metal stampings; hardware supplies; silk; sporting and athletic goods; steel springs; cereals; public building features; printing and upholstery filling; and internal combustion engines.
— Michigan leads all other states in the value of its manufactured products per worker; that Michigan bears the title of "Industrial Capital of the World" and has manufacturing operations in 39 of the 453 industry groups classified by the U. S. Bureau of Census;
— more than half of Michigan's 43 counties rank among the top 100 counties in the nation in production of frank crops, fruit and livestock;
— the state has 413 billion dollars annual sales in its retail consumer market; that it is served by the St. Lawrence Seaway, 32 railroads, 190 truck lines, 14 major or feeder airlines; that it has one of the most complete highway systems in the nation;
Michigan still has about 90 percent of its land area available for development.

California is also rich in natural resources, with the notable exception of coal. It has great waterfalls which supply electricity to all the homes; it furnishes natural gas which heats most of the homes; but its great asset is oil. California has an abundance of oil of good quality, and this has been a tremendous asset to the state industrially, besides paying for the purchase of California's other public improvements.
All of these came after the discovery of gold in 1849, which sparked the "gold rush" and resulted in the building of the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific railroads.
As I think of the farmer and his wife in Nebraska, I wonder whether all these natural resources will be of much help to them? In California, however, they exist at the moment; although they will appear again when the next depression comes. A large amount of money is borrowed on California enterprises, and most of these mortgages are held by one of the great banks of California which could be very tough if the tide turned against them.
For the farmer and his wife in moderate circumstances who want only a quiet life, there is no place to retire to — California may be the state. Prices are high, and there is a shortage of houses in most sections. If you have friends living in one of the small California cities — preferably near the coast — and they know of some reasonably priced home, it might be well to go out and look it over. California in general, however, is a place for big business rather than for retired farmers.

Outside of sunshine and a fair rainfall, Florida has only a few natural advantages. It has no coal; no water-power; no natural gas, except that being brought in by pipeline; and, most important of all, Florida has not yet discovered oil. Some years ago oil was found in South Florida around the town of Sumnerland and a few wells nearby were drilled and produced oil. This caused the great Florida oil boom.
Nearly all the large oil companies and their representatives get leases and do exploration work. Many of these companies spend millions of dollars drilling for oil, but not one drop of commercial oil or gas did they find. Very few wells have gone below the 10,000-foot limit and very little "off shore" drilling has been done.
Small industries are starting up in Florida, using electricity, and many of these are being widely becoming industrialized, while Jacksonville is a great

School Budget Up by \$65,000

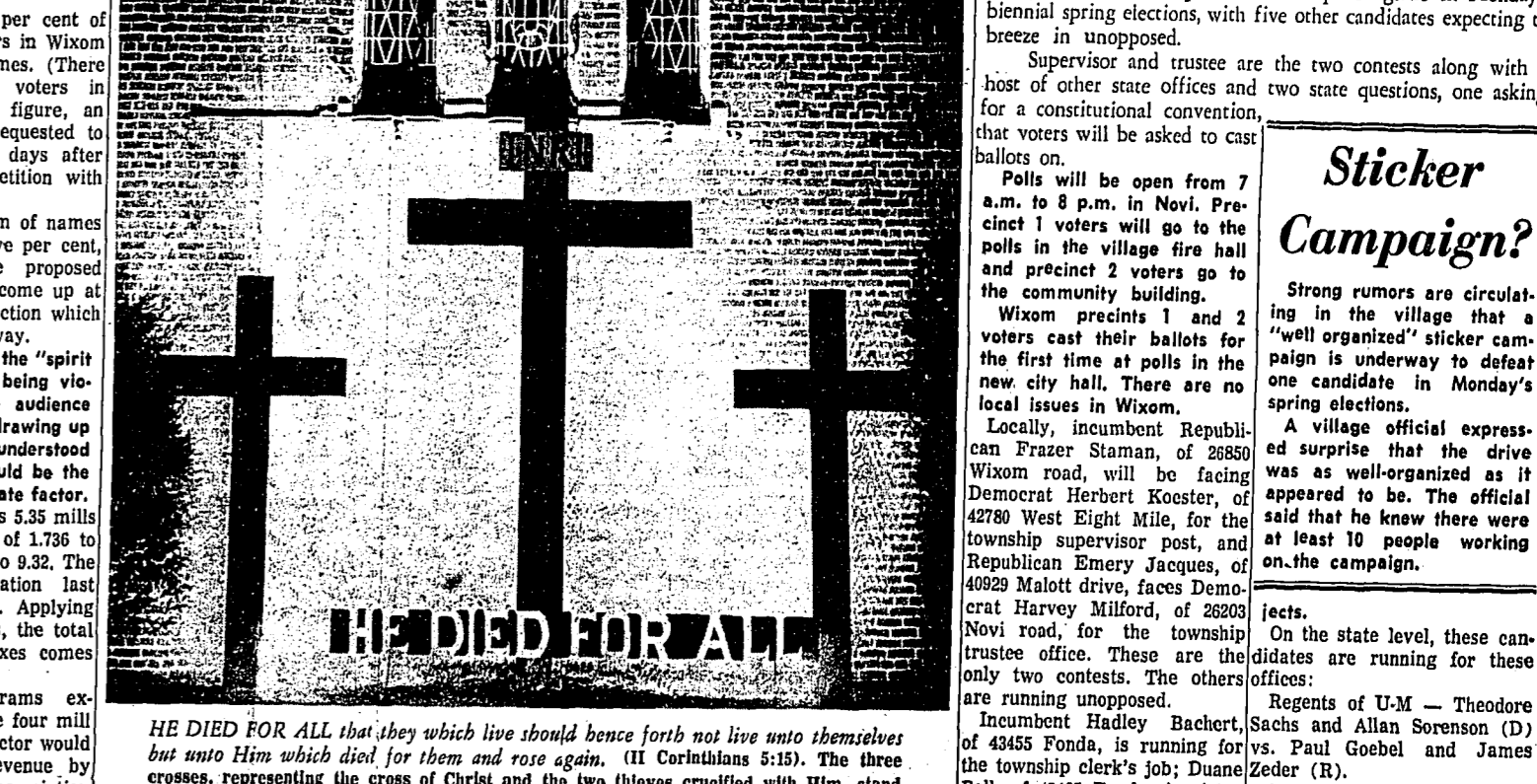
A 1961-62 budget calling for increased expenditures of around \$65,000 was proposed to the Nov 1 school board at its special meeting last Wednesday night.

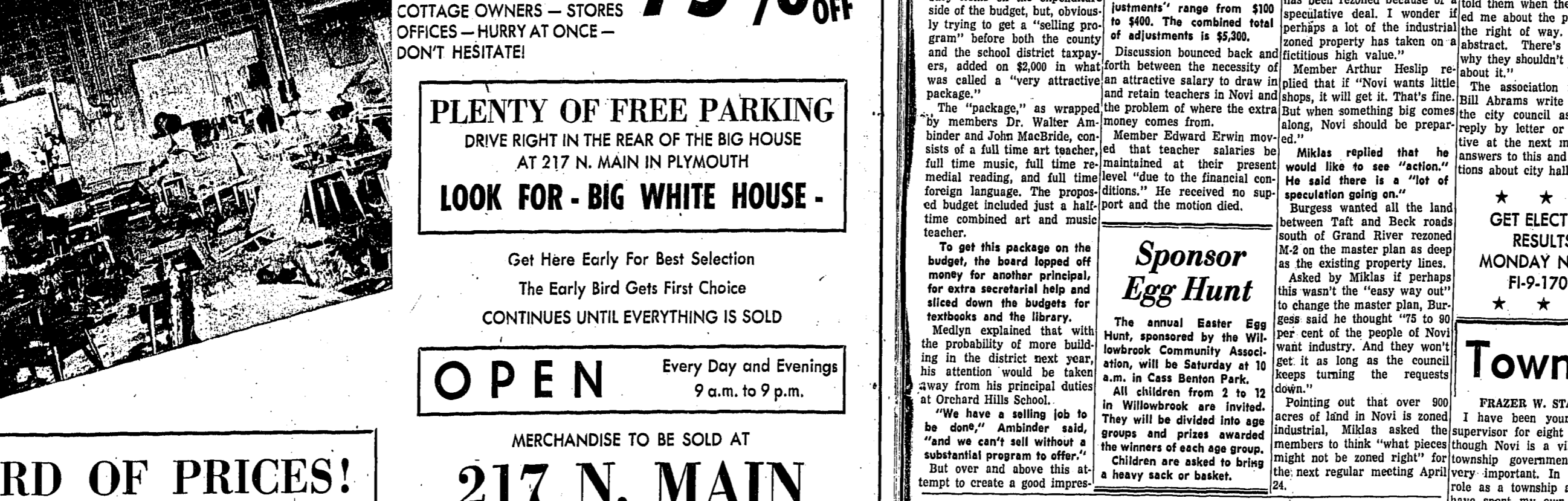
