Babson Park, Mass. is a jobbing center. Florida is a state of small homes; in fact, just now there is a surplus of small houses. Therefore, for farmers of the Central West and the East who want a winter home free from snow, or for retired families who would get a check from the north every month, I surely advise one of the small cities of Florida.

California is also rich in natural resources with the possible exception of coal. It has great waterfalls which supply electricity to all the homes. It has natural gas which heats most of the homes; but its great asset is oil. California has an abundance of oil of good quality, and this has been a tremendous asset to the state.

Michigan is the first in the nation in the production of motor vehicles, parts, truck-trailers and mobile homes; boat building; conveyers; machine shop work; gray-iron foundry; metal stamping; hardware supplies; silk; sporting and athletic goods; steel springs; cereals; public building fixtures; peddling and upholstery filling; and internal combustion engines.

Michigan leads all other states in the value of its manufactured products per worker; that Michigan bears the title of "Industrial Capital of the World" and has manufacturing operations in 309 of the 453 industry groups classified by the U.S. Bureau of Census.

As I think of the farmer and his wife in Nebraska, I wonder whether all these natural resources will be of much help to them? California banks with money, who can purchase large acreage for an extensive cattle ranch or orange grove. In California, there is still an opportunity for health, power, and property in California.

Outside of sunshine and a fair rainfall, Florida has only a few natural advantages. It has no coal; no waterpower; no natural gas, except that being brought in by pipeline; and, most important of all, Florida has not yet discovered oil. Some years ago oil was found in South Florida around the town of Sunland and a few wells nearby were drilled and produced oil. This caused the great Florida oil boom.

Nearly all the large oil companies and representatives of oil lease and do exploration work. Many of these companies spend millions of dollars drilling for oil, but not one drop of commercial oil or gas did they find. Very few wells have gone below the 10,000-foot limit and very little "off shore" drilling has been done.

Michigan Mirror New Tax Plans Face Legislative Battles

Michigan's muddled tax laws are being stirred up by the Legislature. The Governor is also promoting governmental reorganization plans and economic development proposals whenever possible.

The chairman of this committee, Sen. Clyde H. Geerlings, who is also the chairman of the Senate taxation committee, has advocated a plan which he says would hit the heart of the problem.

He is giving his plan, which includes a 3 per cent personal income tax, a 3 per cent tax on corporation profits, tax relief for industry, sales tax exemptions on food and prescription drugs and increased state payments to local units of government.

There is some opposition to this plan on the grounds that it would be giving the local government a taxing power which should be reserved to the state.

Another plan in the legislative bill hopper was prepared by Rep. E. D. O'Brien, D-Detroit. Like Swainson's plan, it would produce no more revenue for the state.

It does not include a personal income tax. It is too early to say which, if any, of these plans will be considered seriously by the Legislature.

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Change Master Plan; Give Council an 'Out'

Like a bad dream, another rezoning request on the south side of Grand River returned to haunt the village council Monday night.

But they have a way out — if they want one. The planning board moved to change the multiple dwelling zoning now on the master plan for property south of Grand River between Beck and Taft roads to M-2 restricted manufacturing to a line a quarter-mile deep running parallel with Grand River.

The change on the master plan does not in anyway affect the present zoning which, for the most part, is commercial in the front and agricultural in the rear.

The council said there was no "indication" on the master plan that the council for a meeting of the planning board.

Petitions asking for an amendment to the Wixom city charter limiting the city's assessing power to four mills in the village of Wixom are being circulated among the voters in a few days.

This action was approved by the Wixom City Association Tuesday night.

Their goal is 20 per cent of the registered voters in Wixom for at least 150 names. (There are 760 registered voters in Wixom.)

Wixom City Council handed out a varied agenda last Thursday, taking action on everything from public records to support for a bill pending in the state legislature that would relieve the county assessor of a lot of paperwork.

The public records matter was the most interesting. It started recently when councilwoman, Mrs. Lottie Chambers, gave a verbal opinion on the state Attorney General's office stating that all public records should be open to the public.

Mayor Donald Brooks explained that it was not his intention to hold the records back, but merely to insure that they were handled with care.

The council moved that the township clerk's job be transferred to the township supervisor's office.

The township board passed a resolution to support the Michigan State Board of Education.

Spring Vote Is Monday

Just two township offices are up for grabs in Monday's biennial spring elections, with five other candidates expecting to breeze in unopposed.

Supervisor and trustee are the two contests along with a host of other state offices and two state questions, one asking for a constitutional convention, and voters will be asked to cast ballots on.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. in Novi. Precinct 1 voters will go to the polls in the village fire hall and precinct 2 voters go to the community building.

Wixom precincts 1 and 2 voters cast their ballots for the first time at polls in a new city hall. There are four local issues in Wixom.

Locally, incumbent Republican Fraser Staman, of 2850 Wixom road, will be facing Democrat Herbert Koester, of 4270 West Eight Mile, for the township supervisor's job.



One group was made up of the crowd which insisted upon throwing verbal gibes at Christ. A second group was made up of the intimate relatives and friends of Christ. It consisted of Christ's mother, His aunt, Mary Magdalene and the disciple, John. The third group consisted of the soldiers in charge of the crucifixion.

Teacher Profile Miss Gloria Soulliere

Everything is a matter of degree with Gloria Soulliere, complete several years of college with Novich's eighth grade, math teacher and school counselor. She has the following degrees from Wayne State University: a bachelor of science in education, a masters in science education, and a masters in guidance and counseling. At present, she commutes several nights a week to Wayne State for courses toward a special degree in guidance.

Pausing for breath between night courses, teaching math, handling the diversified work of counseling and directing this year's testing program, she makes this statement: "To me, teaching is the most challenging and exciting career, because it gives me the opportunity to do what is meaningful and important. Working with teenagers is especially fascinating. They are usually a mixture of strange contradictions. They combine apparent sophistication with genuine simplicity. They know so much about so many things, but they are so naive. Often the latter are the things it would be well for them to know. They are outwardly so sure of themselves, and yet in truth they feel the outside world with bewilderment. They seem quite certain they can chart their own course, yet in their hearts they are desperately in trouble. They are so ready to intrude into their private affairs, yet they are eager for someone to give them a common sense guidance."

There are some misconceptions about school counselors to be sure, she explained, helping students who are not in trouble, up to a fraction of their capacity. In her opinion, while assistance in overcoming learning handicaps is a vital part of the job, so is assistance in improving the student's personal and social lives.

For an insight into this misinterpreted, yet essential, phase of the school world, the information prepared by Miss Soulliere for the use of students at the beginning of the school year is valuable. In part it says, "The more you know about yourself, the better decisions you can make about yourself. That is why we help you get a better picture of yourself during conferences by referring to what you have done in the past - your cards and achievement tests - as well as what you are capable of doing - intelligence tests, interest and personality tests are also available for those who wish to know themselves better in these steps of consultation at a meeting of the four school districts interested in forming the new school district. The four are: the Northville, Farmington, East Novi and Novi.




