



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

Business, trade, technical and professional programs can be authorized i community training facilities after they leave the hospital. Courses are available in blueprint reading, shop math, power sewing machine operation, basic electricity and algebra. There are also college programs, technical school programs, trade school programs, business college study, on the job training and a sheltered
