

# SPEAKING for the Record

An editor's mail is filled with letters of all descriptions - many pointing out news releases that in reality are camouflage advertisements, others that are informative and contain excellent background information, often in a note of praise (honest), and, perhaps more often, constructive criticism.

Following our recent publication of area officials were received about a half dozen copies of letters of appreciation - for which we are appreciative.

It proves that many people are definitely interested in their city, township, school, county, state and national representatives.

Along this line, a letter was recently received from Councilman John Canterbury proposing that some publicity be given the availability of city charter books.

According to city hall estimates, only about a dozen copies of the book have been distributed since it was adopted - December 13, 1955.

Charters are available, too, in our neighboring communities of Novi and Wixom.

They may be purchased (usually at a nominal fee) or merely examined for content.

Probably few people understand the basic structure and principles around which their respective charters were drawn.

It sets forth taxation procedures and powers, council organization and duties, elections and the general organization of the specific government.

Charters are continually undergoing amendments as they are needed, but these, too, are available and usually are inserted at the rear of the book.

Presently, the Northville city council is making a complete review of its ordinances preparatory to codification.

Outstanding ordinances will be cast aside and duplication eliminated.

Available, too, are copies of the zoning regulations that set forth our residential, commercial and industrial areas - and provide just what can be done, where and in what manner so far as building is concerned.

Zoning requirements bring about more heated debate than probably any other single aspect of community government.

Cases in point exist today (and rather strenuously) in both the city and township of Novi and the Village of Novi.

A better understanding of these problems is certain to result from an examination of the basic rules. They're available at your clerk's office.

Speaking of planning, we're reminded of the fine job turned in by the city council, planning commission, board of appeals and city manager in handling the ordeal of the Krager project.

Programs of this magnitude require careful groundwork and many details come up for examination before the various governmental bodies. The council was charged with the responsibility of ruling on the side of the planners.

And to give site approval; the board of appeals had to grant certain variances; the city manager had to coordinate the procedure.

Because on occasion the public (as well as this newspaper) has suggested that "let dragging" was employed on other projects, we point out now that attention to details and accommodating promises were employed to bring this important project into being.

The work of George Zerbel and his planning commission deserves special praise.

Babson Park, Mass., after fifty years of study of the market, remember that the large stock market has always had signs for the culmination of a bull market, and offer an important final conclusion.

I like to notice the number of shareholders of the large corporations. When the number of shareholders begins to decline, it means that what we are seeing is the end of the bull market - that the insiders are selling out.

I watch the level of brokers' loans and the degree of market activity. There is a steady rise in both of these preceding the culmination of a bull market.

I like to watch the published percentage of total borrowing by members of the New York Stock Exchange. When it is 5% or more, it is a sign that the market is in a vulnerable position.

A prolonged period of tight money with low bond prices and large stock transactions usually points to the termination of a bull market. Of course, now, with President Kennedy attempting to control the money market, this situation is not so significant.

Although the Dow-Jones averages may continue to go up for some time before the bull market culminates, this does not mean that the stocks you hold will go up any further. Therefore the table of household discards of clothing, shoes, hats, toys, most types of furniture and other household discards.

The relation between stocks and bonds is worth watching. As a rule, bonds begin to decline first. As long as the bond yields are high, there will be little fear of the bull market's culmination.

All the talk about mergers, consolidations, etc., should be read. Naturally, the director of a company are in the best position to get earnings news. As long as the company is carrying a profit and its prospects are good, directors are not interested in consolidations or mergers.

Here are the news items about consolidations may be good signals that a bull market is culminating. In the case of the death of a large stockholder, this is usually a signal that the stock will sell off.

When you make up your mind that the bull market is culminating, you should not be too anxious to get out at the top. Which, deciding to sell, on for an order to sell "at a fair price."

## Prisons' Mental Cases

Mentally ill men in Michigan prisons need help they are not getting. A program is underway that would shift some of the people in mental institutions to the State Prison for the Criminally Insane for dangerous psychotics from the prisons.

But what the Corrections experts would really like to see is a separate unit for psychiatric care.

They would prefer to have this diagnostic and treatment center, which would take care of chronically ill as well as acutely and emotionally disturbed inmates in the Detroit or Ann Arbor area.

There are several reasons why this location is preferred. It would be close to the search facilities of state universities. It would be near the metropolitan areas of southeast Michigan where many offenders are apprehended.

It would be centrally located to most of the prisons and mental institutions of the state.

Petitioners asking for another vote on the incorporation of Novi into a city were presented to the village council Monday night.

The action came quickly on the basis of last week's Supreme Court decision favoring Northville in the long-disputed Northville Estates annexation case.

The council immediately directed the village clerk to notify the county that it had such petitions on file now, in the words of one citizen backing the city drive, "plug the hole" on any other petitions in the village. The first filed petition has precedence over all others.

And there are other petitions, too, according to rumormongers circulating in the village.

Herbert Koester, recently defeated candidate for the township supervisor, told the Novi News that he had petitioners present to the council, asking that Novi return to township status.

He said that he had received a petition from a resident of Novi asking that Novi be reincorporated as a city.

The total budget is \$177,800, as compared to \$154,723 for this fiscal year ending June 30.

Brooks told the council he was confident that the budget would be passed on without any real difficulties. The council will discuss it in executive session Monday night and it will come up for a public hearing May 18. It goes on file for public view in the city hall May 11.

An increase of almost \$2 million in assessed valuation accounts for the fact that no millage increase is needed. Millage remains at \$5.33 per \$100,000 of assessed value. The total assessed value is \$13,128,248 and using the state formula of 1.72, equated at \$22,618,274.

A prominent feature of the proposed budget is \$13,400 in the capital improvement fund. This is the first payment on the new city hall which was originally scheduled to be paid for in five years. The only other out of the building is the \$17,000 for the land, also scheduled to be paid up in five years.

A new budget item this year will be the fire department, up to now included under services. With Wixom's own truck and a volunteer force of some 20 men, Mayor Brooks said he proposed \$5,000 for the department, admitting it was a guess with no previous budget experience.

At any rate, it will be lower than last year when almost \$7,000 was appropriated for fire contracts with Novi and Commerce township and expenses.

Broken down into the major categories, the proposed budget looks like this: Administration - \$45,500; services (garbage removal, parks and recreation, street lighting, etc.) - \$6,075; fire - \$5,000; police - \$25,000; DPW - \$51,300; capital improvement - \$13,400; road paving fund - \$24,000 (representing \$15,000 for this year's program and \$9,000 borrowed to last year's capital improvement fund).

On the income side, the city is expecting \$121,000 from general property taxes and \$56,800 from state and local sources.

It took a year to decide, but some 235 acres formerly a part of the village and township of Novi have been officially annexed to the city of Northville.

In a suit brought by the village of Novi against the secretary of state and city of Northville the supreme court ruled that a March 28, 1960 annexation was valid and proper.

The decision came at a blow to the village of Novi. It was a member of the association, thought that it was a necessary thing for the community, but with some things are being handled.

The council emphasized that the records are open to the public by passing a motion to this effect last month. It was pointed out that the council's regular meetings are on the second and fourth Thursdays of the month but included in the reply to the association.

It also prompted the filing of petitions Monday night at the Novi village council meeting seeking an election to incorporate the village into a city.

The petitions were circulated by a dozen interested citizens and submitted by Russell Buton, a former village councilman.

Specifically, the city hall, the council moved that the area annexed to Northville include the 120-acre Northville Estates subdivision in the northwest section of Novi and the 135-acre parcel of Beck and Baseline roads.

The subdivision, composed of some 40 homes in the \$25,000, \$50,000 class, was in the township of Novi and the village of Northville, however, the area had to be added to the city of Novi.

The decision vote favored the village, 53 to 9, while city of Northville voters supported the annexation of Novi area.

The village engineer consulted with the village attorney and recommended that Oscar Schaeffer, of 3208 Beck Road, be appointed to file the plan of annexation replacing Robert W. Rickard who resigned April 15.

Schaeffer works at the Lincoln plant. He has been connected with production control since 1945, and has worked for years at American Motors before the plant closed in Detroit.

Richard, of 2824 Beck Road, has been on the planning commission since its inception some four years ago.







Court Rules

In favor of such proposition. In short, the court held that a village is merely a part of a township and subject to the same provisions for annexation to a city of 15,000 population or less is concerned. The court's opinion also points out that in annexation there must be a division of assets and liabilities of the municipality from which the territory is being annexed based upon the total assessed valuation of said municipality as against the assessed valuation in the annexed territory.

At Monday night's city council meeting Mayor A. M. Allen commended City Attorney Ogilvie on the outcome of the case. The annexation is the third in the past four years involving Northville and Novi. Eighty-eight acres where American elementary school is located and some 290 acres including Warren Products and Vestco Estates (Village Green subdivision) were also annexed to the city.

Brasur of the First Presbyterian church of Northville will be held Sunday evening at seven o'clock at the First Presbyterian church. The services will be conducted by the Rev. Albert H. Ritchie, moderator of the Presbytery of Detroit, presiding. The Rev. George P. Jerome will present the scripture message, while the charge to the new pastor will be given by the Rev. Robert Rivers, Jr., of the Garden City Presbyterian church.

Fine Detroit Youths. For Shooting Rifles. Two Detroit youths, charged with violating the village ordinance prohibiting the use of high-powered rifles in the village, were fined \$15 apiece by Justice of the Peace Robert K. Anderson in Novi Court last Thursday. Michael Garrett, 20, and Robert D. Kay, 18, were arrested April 22 shooting German Arma-mauser rifles in the 13 mile and Meadowbrook roads areas. Police said both admitted to being unaware of the danger of the guns which have a distance of over a mile. Investigation is still being carried on in the mysterious shooting in the same area April 10. The Robert Kirkwood family, of 2889 Summit, reported a bullet entering their home and lodging in a bedroom wall.

Spisak's case was more serious and he was taken to Pontiac Outpatient hospital where he is still a patient. Mrs. Spisak said that her husband will probably be released this weekend. Three patrols - Panther, Warrior and Ranger - were on the campout. What surprised the leaders most was the great majority of scouts who were not affected by the poison smoke.

**READERS SPEAK—Novi School Board Member Says System Below Par**

Dear Sir:  
 I have completed the first third of a three-year term on the school board, and I would like to take this opportunity to inform the electorate about my impressions of the Novi School system, its condition, and its future prospects.  
 The public, reassuring, and non-controversial thing for me to say is that we have a very fine system and that it is getting better and better. This, however, my conscience will not permit me to do. I cannot offer any soothing platitudes or those hopes for the future which, in spite of what some of our members of the board have said, our system is in my opinion, in a deplorable condition. At a time when the nation's resources are being mobilized to improve our educational system, Novi takes giant steps backward.  
 1. The board refused to approve hiring a foreign language teacher. The stated reason was that it cost too much even though it was pointed out that the Federal Government would subsidize a large portion of this teacher's salary.  
 2. Over 40 per cent of our teachers do not have college degrees. Yet Novi does little to insure that our future recruits will be better qualified, or that we can hire a consultant to help them next year.  
 3. No other suburban school system runs a junior high program without art, music, home economics, shop, physical education, etc. Yet the Novi board does not seem concerned.  
 4. Our library shelves are bare of books.  
 Our school is far below par. Incredibly as it sounds, the majority places fiscal values above human values.  
 Arguments about the significance of education apparently fall on deaf ears. They forget, too, that poor schools retard the growth and cause others to leave; consequently depreciating land values. Depriving youngsters of an adequate education is surely an expensive proposition in every way.  
 The present situation is shameful and the future looks bleak because virtually nothing is being done to overcome our deficiencies. There are two factors which might operate to change the picture. First of all we do have a core of dedicated, professional teachers who, with the school board, can help bring about change; but they need guidance and support from the school board. Second, we have the possibility of an irate citizenry who will indicate to the "go slow" boys that they are fed up with promises for a bright future and demand an excellent education for the present generation of school children.
