The state supreme court decision upholding the annexation of Novi village property (plus the Northville Estates Novi township area) to the city of Northville turns the clock back two and a half years.

For it was then that Novi leaders argued for village incorporation to protect its borders from annexation.

There were other reasons for village incorporation bu certainly protection against annexation was the most convinc- at Holland. ing and must have swung many votes.

For at that time Nevi was still smarting from the annexation of the Ford Motor company's Lincoln plant by

The latter maneuver was accomplished first by Wixomites ncorporating as a village, then continuing the incorporation process a year later and becoming a city.

Thus Wixom, apparently fearful that village incorporation did not provide protection against annexation, took the step that assured preservation of its designated limits.

Meanwhile, Novi was minus an industry and a choice tax

So in September, 1958 it was not difficult to pass the village charter and elect a council. But in September, 1959 a proposal to incorporate as a city was soundly defeated.

It had been proposed not to protect against appearation because Novi believed it had already gained this security through village incorporation, but to eliminate duplication of village and township government by replacing both with a single city government

Novi's information concerning the invincibility of village borders was given in good faith, but without the test of the Benton Harbor and St. Jo-ties. supreme court

So the community stands on the very spot it has tried so desperately to escape - with both township and village reverament and stripped of its protective armor.

Township and village officials must now ponder this new turn of events. What does the future hold for Novi?

Will there be other areas seeking attachment to the cities of Northville, Wixom or even Walled Lake

For Novi it would seem that this is the time for calm and studied appraisal. Both township and village officials, who have contributed their best efforts over many years to help Mozart opera, an air show, the er the chief need for survival, palm trees had been torn out, other class of stocks. mold a better Novi, should set aside their differences and decide together upon a course to follow.

This is not to suggest that a change in its present status is necessary for Novi. But a consolidation of effort and purpose could very well rally a new spirit and comradery that would become stronger than any law - that would draw its borders where the people themselves wish them to be.

Assessments

Not Wantee

That is a statement made h a Councilman in one of 1 answers to some 250 to 300 signatures on petitions filed of jecting to any special assessnent on our unpaved streets. In other words, we, comprising signatures of a past village president, former councilman, usiness and civil leaders, plus good sound citizens, who sigr ed those petitions did not l what they were signing.

It is true there are argume on both sides of this delicate subject. However, the opin of those of us who signed sa petitions think our cause is and equitable, more so th any other kind of argume presented for said assessmen Is it not odd that since 19 to date any of our past cou cil during those years had r seen fit to change the metho of paying our streets? I ha been of service to our con munity as your councilman fo eight years and my street still unpaved. But, during a that time I agreed with th principal of that with which w

In the years of 1927 and 192 our village fathers attempted and did set up a special assess ment district at the request of property owners on certain streets to have their stree paved.

However, there was an gality in the assessment roll caused by the over assessment of the 5% allowed for any one year based upon the assessed valuation of the premises, (se chancery file no. 268252, referring that it was contrary Section 1639 of compiled law of 1929 and section 27.30 C.L 1915). The roll was set up for a ten year period. This illegali ty caused a law suit in which it was determined by the Cour that the total amount of mone that could be lawfully collected by the Village was \$45,000.00 The village had to refund any over assessment upon reque and that refund came mostly out of the general funds. Pay ments were made on bond from 1927 to 1939 which were defaulted leaving the village to float a new issue for a perio of thirteen years at a cost of \$136,724,48 which was paid of out of the general fund by th year of 1952.

We most all agree the pavi of streets should have been via special assessment method However, there was a case that created a specific problem and expense and as a result our leaders in the past said the streets should be paved out of

We, who have lived in our community for five to forty years, or even a life time have built up an equity in the general fund. Not only as far a paving is concerned but als n public utilities such as wa er, sewer, both storm and sanitary, fire protection, etc. The development of these certainly cost the residents a large amount of dollars. Further while waiting for streets to paved the residents had to sui fer the consequences of liv on unpaved streets. The conse quences to the uninitiated con sist of dust, tracking of oil oumpy roads, etc. Any new res ident moving into our commun ty and becoming a part there does have the advantage of these improvements and th cost thereof. I believe any ne citizen will recognize this the rv and fact.

It may take ten years instead of seven or eight to accomplis all of the paving out of th general fund. Note it has been called a street improvement program but in reality it is nothing more than just a plain old special assessment with all of its inequities because it is against the principals as laid down in the past.


However to those of us who have waited up to thirty years or more to have our streets paved, another year or so will t make any difference.

It is my opinion from obser vation that any of the old paved streets that need resurfa ing should be put on a speci assessment basis thereby alle viating the general fund. If, in any such case it could be proven that it was inequitable to handle a situation of this kind in such a manner we could take the money from the general

This underwater exploration takes place from huge, man-made, metal islands called drilling platforms. The islands are built as far as 72 miles offshore in the tidelands and coastal waters. and are supported by long legs reaching to the ocean bottom. These "treasure islands" support tons of equipment, living quarters for the crew, and a helicopter landing platform.
