**The New "12-12" Warranties**  
The 1961 manufacturers' warranties of "12 months or 12,000 miles" on all makes of new cars is simple evidence of a fact that has become more apparent with each new model over the last few years — that the modern mass-produced automobile has attained its highest degree of reliability in history.

We must bear in mind though, that cars are just machines, and no machine is perfect or possibly ever will be. It is because of this reality that the car dealership exists as a service establishment primarily and attempts at "super-market" car selling have never proved successful.

Though some car buyers tend to overlook this fact in thinking it is only the "idea" that matters, the manufacturers do not. That is why to understand the new 12-month warranties you must realize that the wording of these agreements makes it clear that it is upon the dealer's "sole judgement" that the manufacturer has his replacement guarantees.

Commenting on this, a recent issue of a national consumer's magazine of 1,000,000 subscribers, which carries no advertising and does not permit advertising use of its ratings of various manufacturers' products, had this to say:

"Car warranties are so worded as to be expressly DEALER warranties — they obligate the dealer, not the manufacturer, to make good on faults. We require among friends and acquaintances in your community, and restrict your car shopping to those dealerships which have earned a reputation for fair dealing in making warranty repairs. In other words, buy the dealer as well as the car."

We might add that you have everything in your favor if all your service work is done by the dealer from whom you bought your car.

**Teachers Profile**  
*She Stirs Their Interest*

"A good teacher is one who keeps the child interested in learning about the world around him," says Miss Francis Story, a second grade teacher at Orchard Hills school. Realizing this fact is a step toward successful teaching, Miss Story believes it to be the most challenging aspect of the profession.

Miss Story lives at 422 DuBour in Northville, but is originally from Howell, Michigan. After high school she attended Olivet Nazarene college in Illinois on a church scholarship. While there she continued her education with a college scholarship. Transferring to Eastern Michigan university, she majored in elementary education and minored in language arts, science, social studies and art. While at Eastern she took part in community service work at Blackham School for orthopedically handicapped children. She then entered her actual work in teaching, and she is now in her third year at Novi.

Miss Story believes motivation to be of first importance in teaching any subject. She likes to teach reading and enjoys teaching writing, because second graders are just beginning the transition from printing; therefore, they are more easily interested in learning this "grow-up" skill.

She has also enjoyed a social studies unit on Indians. Students are usually interested in this subject, she noted, and they learned about it by making costumes, drums and food, and by taking part in dances and songs pertaining to the Indians. This is another example of the teaching approach called "learning by doing."

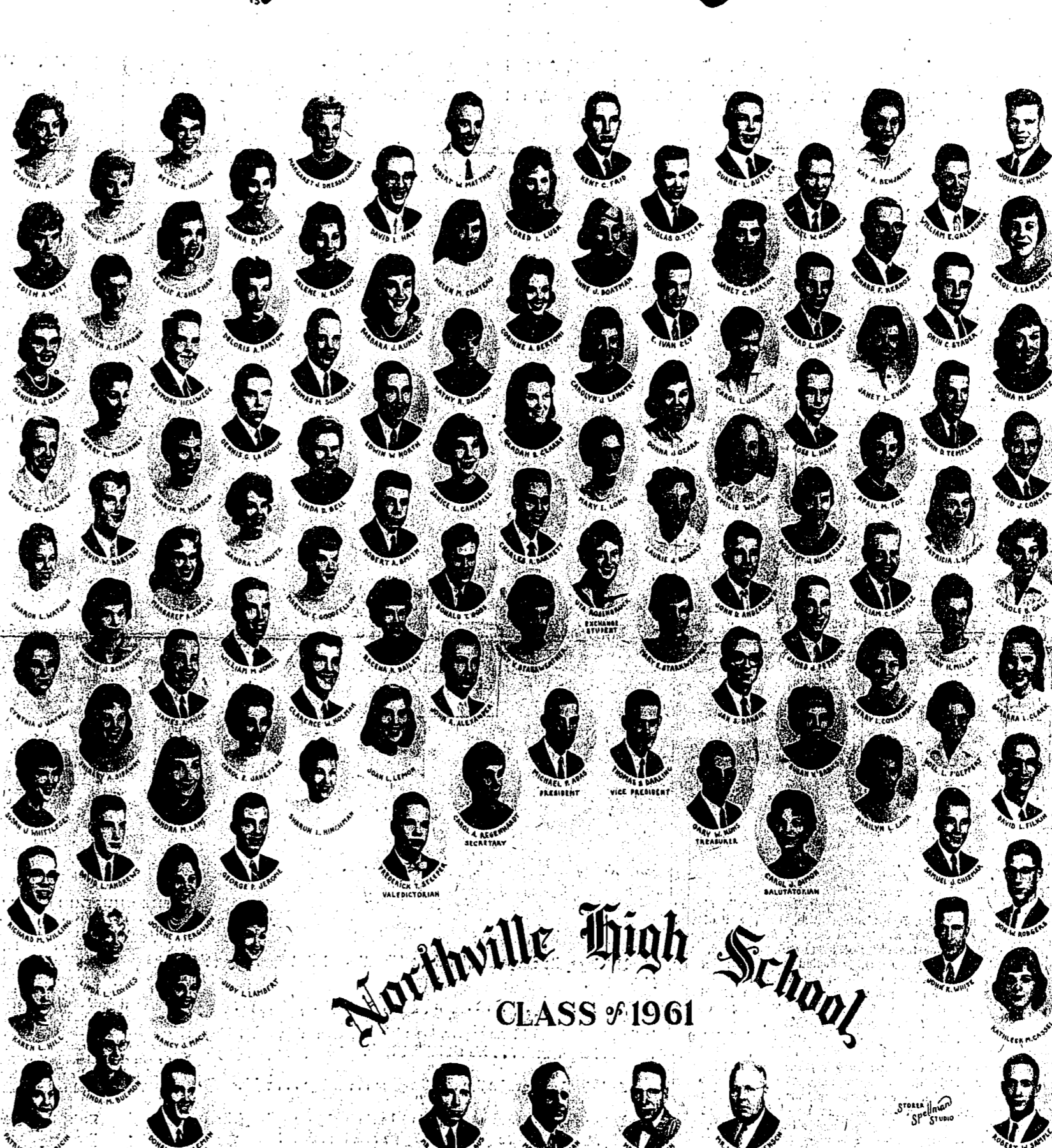
Other units were concerned with the Eskimos, and — expanding to other parts of the world — the Japanese. The cultures of these peoples are involved with hunting, fishing and nature study to quite an extent, and this involvement, Miss Story pointed out, guided the children's natural interest into reading. Science was covered when the unusual variation in the Arctic day and night was discussed.

Stressing cooperation in reading, Miss Story uses the devices of having each student bring in his favorite story and read it before the class as a means of encouraging more frequent reading.

Outside of the classroom, she is a participant in church work, especially youth groups and choir. A personal hobby is working with ceramic tile mosaics. Traveling is also enjoyed; last summer she toured the West, collecting information and material which she has used in the classroom.

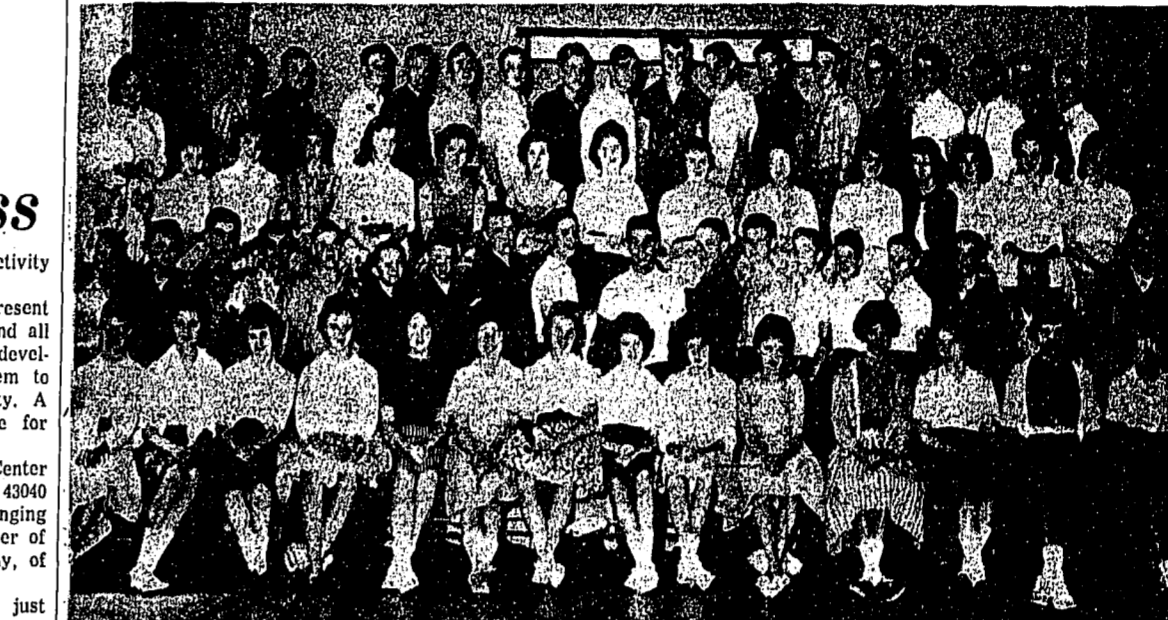
