

SPEAKING for the Record

There's a sharp contrast between the school election being held Monday in Northville and Novi. It's probable that voters will stay away in droves in Northville where only one candidate's name appears on the ballot. But for those who do perform their duty in the Northville district attention should be given to the lone proposition appearing on the ballot.

A "yes" vote here is required to permit the school district to use a dormant account to help retire a 1957 bond issue. The funds had been earmarked for a 1949 bond issue which is already retired, but they cannot be used for another purpose without voter approval.

So vote "yes" on this proposition. In Novi interest is running at a fever-high pitch. In addition to a two-man contest for a lone board vacancy there's a proposed school bond issue.

The only school official who has taken a definite stand for the millage proposal is Superintendent William Medlyn. Two hold-over board members and the incumbent candidate seem to be taking a "let the people decide" attitude without a strong stand either way.

The interesting angle is the board split - right down "old and new" lines. And to the winner of Monday's election goes the edge in board voting which has been consistently 3 to 2.

It appears, experts say, that we're on the threshold of successfully transplanting hearts, lungs, glands, livers and even hands and feet. "Just like changing a spare tire".

Amazing, indeed. But what struck me like a thunderbolt was the name of the doctor who is performing some of these miracles at Stanford University. Working with dogs, the article states, Dr. Norman Humayna has made six heart transplants.

As one of "our gang" when we were kids, we sometimes called him "Stinky" - not that he was, but it sort of rolled off your tongue and seemed to blend with his last name.

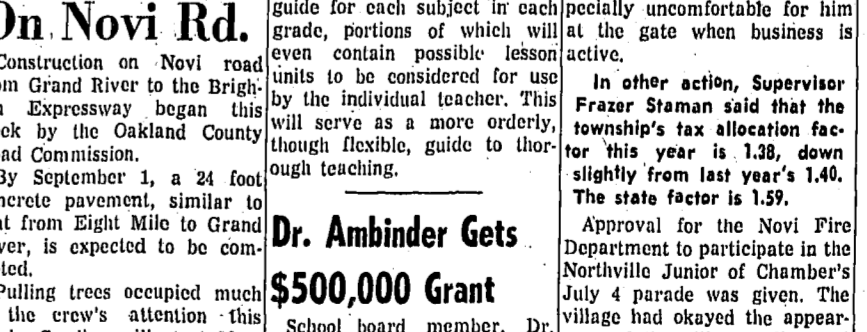

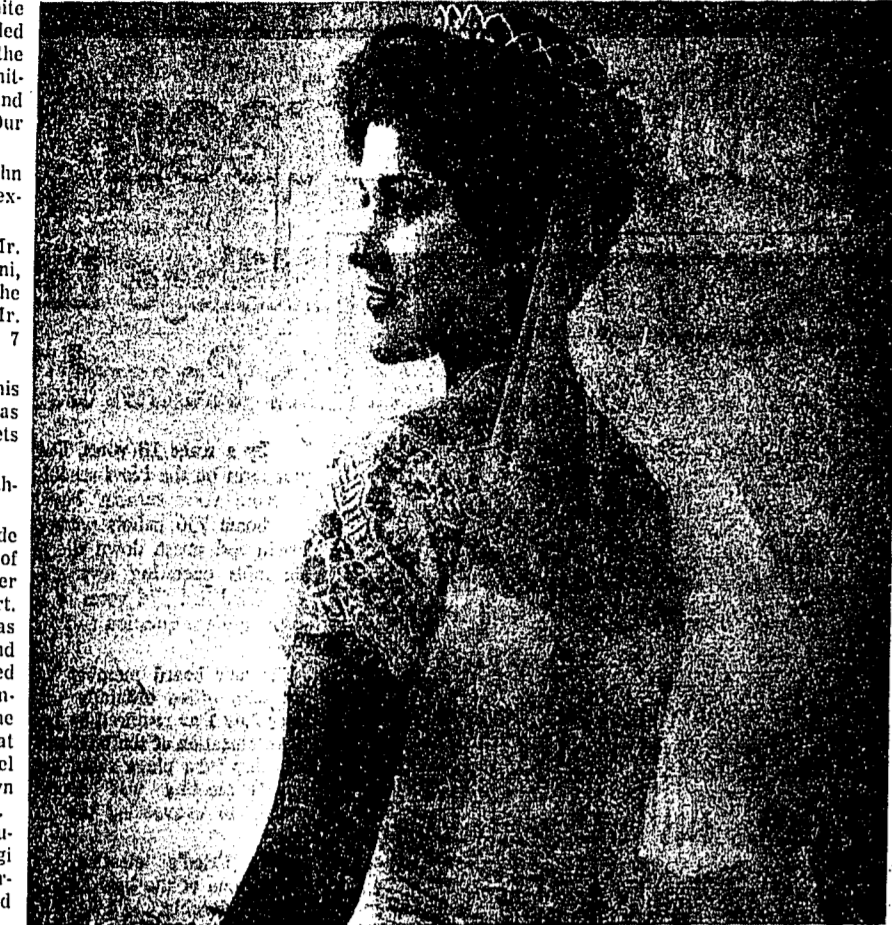
Giannine Bertoni, Donald Perigo Exchange Marriage Vows at OLV

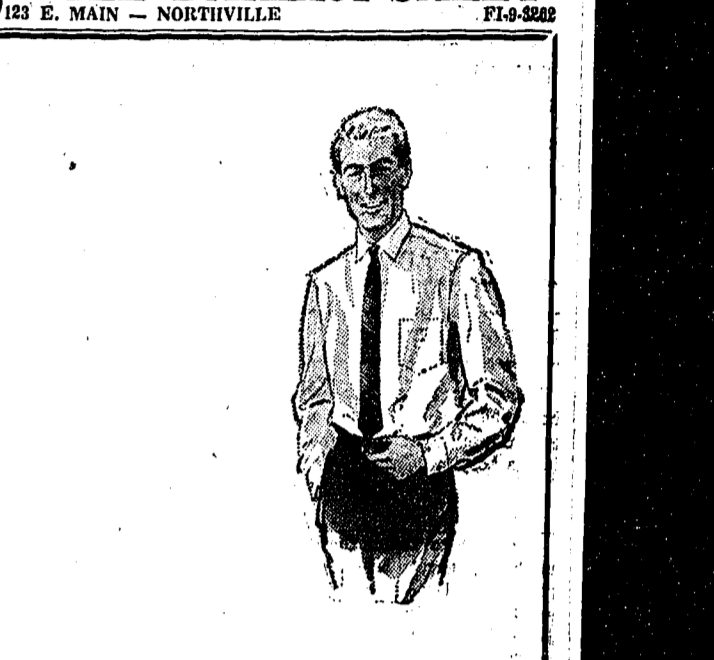

Con-Con Important, Expert Says

Contains State's Future Hopes

There is no single thing more politically important right now in the State of Michigan than the calling of the constitutional convention in October.

Within con-con is contained the "most important" of the kind of State we are or hope to be" and for this reason, voters should elect delegates whose "controlling interest will be to make Michigan a good place to live, play and raise our children."

Thus spoke Alfred M. Pelham before the Novi Board of Commerce June 1 in the Novi Community building. Pelham is budget director for Wayne State university, coming there after holding a similar position for 19 years with Wayne County.

More important in regard to con-con, he is chairman of the Governor's Constitutional Convention Advisory Committee on Taxation and Finance.

The constitution of any state, Pelham said, is the "basis for the fulfillment of its responsibilities to its citizens." It is the "most important" of the kind of State we are or hope to be" and for this reason, voters should elect delegates whose "controlling interest will be to make Michigan a good place to live, play and raise our children."

Since January 1, 1959, when the present constitution went into effect, a total of 125 amendments have been submitted to the people and 49 approved. Some 50 of these were of legislative resolution with 59 of these passing and 35 by the initiative process. Of these winning the popular vote.

In the first 42 years (or up to 1951), Pelham said that only 18 of his proposed amendments passed while in the last decade, 21 of 24 proposed changes have passed.

Pelham said that the last figure is cited by some proponents of con-con as a sign of recognition by the people that constitutional revision is needed.

Opponents cite the fact that four times since 1909 a proposition calling for a convention was defeated. But, Pelham pointed out, that up to last April, a majority of those voting "was" needed for approval. In April after a legislative resolution, a majority of those voting at the time and not of the total coming to the polls was ruled sufficient.

"This is the only reason the con-con call passed," Pelham said.

Reviewing the procedure that will be followed, Pelham said the "most important" of the kind of State we are or hope to be" and for this reason, voters should elect delegates whose "controlling interest will be to make Michigan a good place to live, play and raise our children."

Should the long ballot be eliminated? Should there be less frequent elections? Should the voting age of 21 be lowered? Should the terms of office of the house and senate be in-representing each state senator created? Should the legislative and state representative - will be elected in a primary election July 25 (could be referred?

Should the number of elected officials be reduced? (Presently there are seven. Pelham thought that maybe only the governor, possibly the lieutenant-governor if we have one and secretary of state should be elected.) Should the terms of office of the elected executive officials be increased from two to four years? Should the constitutional status of Civil Service be changed? Should judges be appointed rather than elected? Should the judicial branch be made more flexible by providing for a more unified system of courts? Should justice of the peace be integrated into this unified court system? Should the limit on State borrowing (presently \$250,000) be increased or eliminated? Should the 15 mill limit on property taxes be revised or eliminated? Should the earmarking or dedication of funds be revised or eliminated? Pelham emphasized that these were not the only issues that would come up on the floor, but were among the more important ones. He said he was certain the delegates would be confronted with some "most difficult issues."

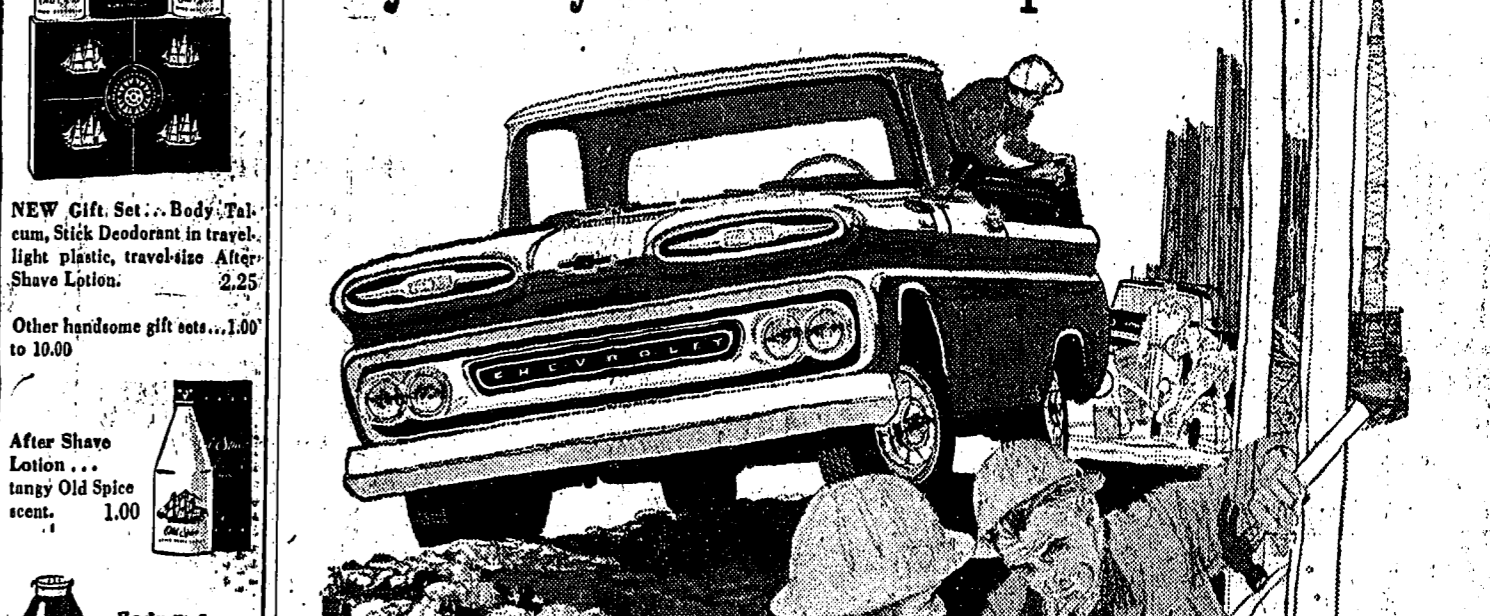

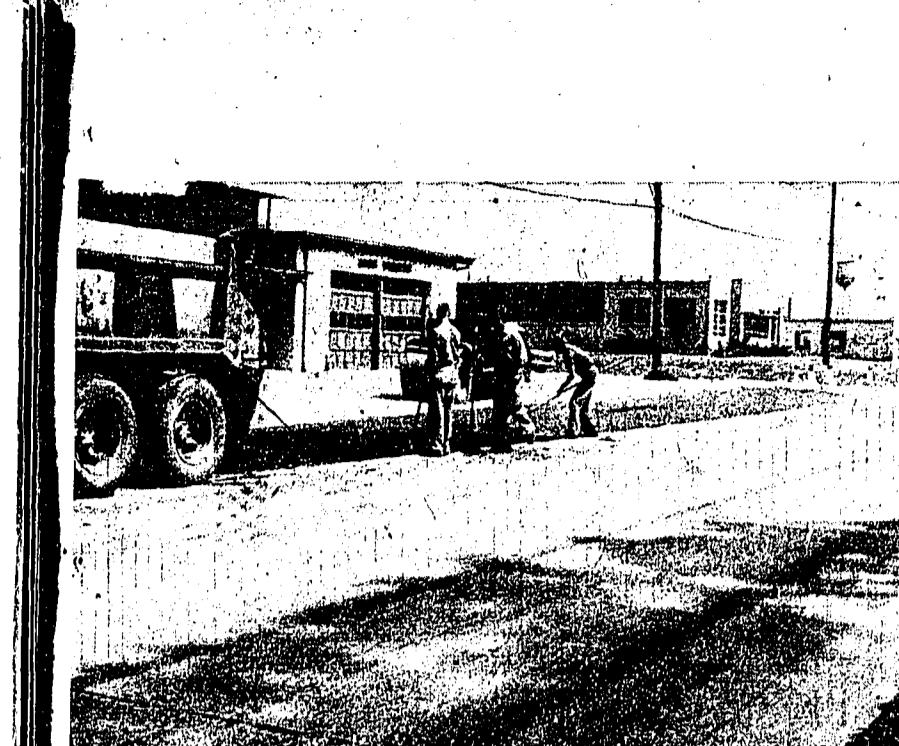

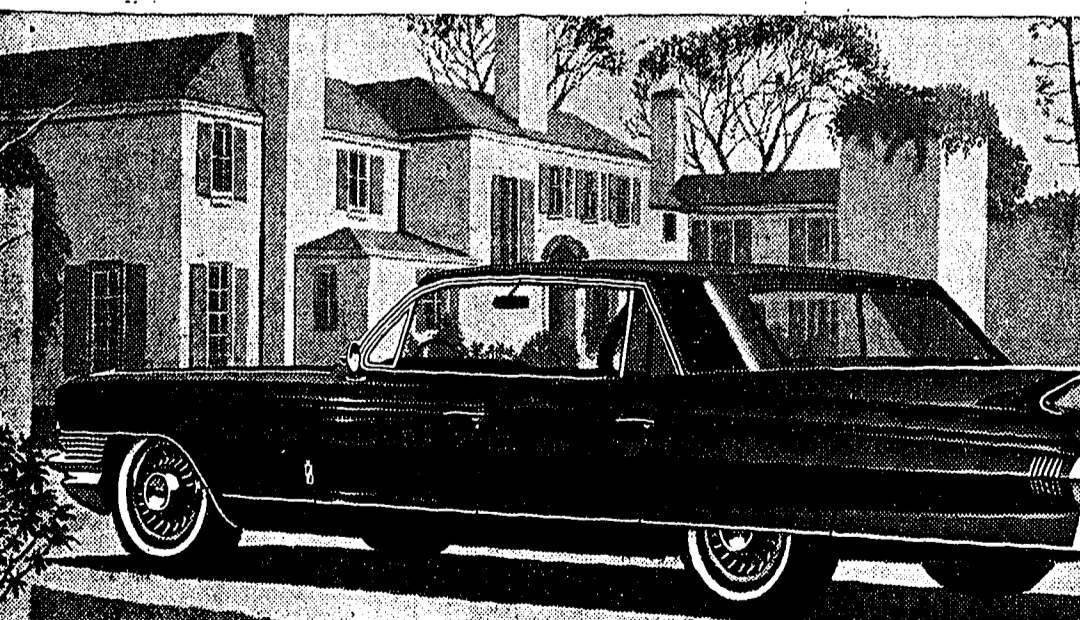
