

City and township officials put the finishing touches this week on resolutions from their respective bodies concerning the proposed extension of the Middle Rouge interceptor sewer

The county department of public works, sweating to get the project underway so that a state health department ban on building can be lifted, has asked the dozen communities involved to submit a resolution of intent.

To the average resident this problem of expanding sewer facilities may seem quite insignificant. Except for the cost to the taxpayer it brings hardly a ripple of interest. It calls for an important decision from our councilmen.

They must look into the future, at least 20 years, and deermine what our future sewer needs will be.

... In the township the board has already decided. Guided lent to about 1,000 resident taps. This will cost the township about \$3,000 annually under the 40-year bond issue. The city has an allocation of taps equivalent to providing
