**Cool Desserts Brim with Chocolate**

Readers keeping close tab on their calories have three alternatives when it comes to this week's Kitchen Diary. First — if you will power er has dipped to its lowest ebb and you couldn't possibly resist the thought of a rich, creamy, chocolate dessert, don't read another line.

On the other hand, if whipping up a batch of delectable chocolate lady fingers or a fluffy chocolate Bavarian cream pie for your family doesn't move you to "just have a little taste", read on.

But, if you promise to watch your calories religiously — starting next week — keep right on reading and indulge yourself in two cool, delicious and wonderfully chocolate summer-time desserts.

**CHOCOLATE LADY FINGER DESSERT**  
Mrs. H. Charles Jordan  
2 pkgs. lady fingers  
2 bars German sweet chocolate  
2/3 T water  
2/3 T hot milk  
2 T confectioners sugar  
1 t. vanilla

**CHOCOLATE BAVARIAN CREAM PIE**  
2 squares unweetened chocolate  
2 T butter  
2/3 cup milk  
2/3 cup sifted, confectioners sugar  
1/4 cup granulated sugar  
1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
1/2 cup granulated sugar  
3 egg yolks

**NUT BREAD**  
1 egg  
2 cups flour  
1/2 to 1/4 cup sugar  
2 t. baking powder  
1/2 t. salt  
1/2 to 2/3 cup nuts (coarsely broken)  
1 cup milk  
2 T melted shortening  
Sift dry ingredients together. Add egg, milk and shortening (melted and cooled). Add broken nuts and fold into mixture. Bake in greased loaf pan in 375 degree oven, 45-45 minutes.

Meth chocolate in double boiler. Stir in water and allow to cool. Add egg yolks one at a time, stirring after each addition. Add sugar and

**CHOCOLATE BAVARIAN CREAM PIE**  
2 squares unweetened chocolate  
2 T butter  
2/3 cup milk  
2/3 cup sifted, confectioners sugar  
1/4 cup granulated sugar  
1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
1/2 cup granulated sugar  
3 egg yolks

Combine gelatin with quarter cup granulated sugar. In top of double boiler, beat egg yolks; stir in gelatin mixture and milk. Cook over hot, boiling, water, stirring until custard is stiff. Fold in custard mixture, then whipped cream, vanilla and half cup coconut. Pour into crust. Refrigerate until firm. Garnish with remaining coconut and grated chocolate.

**School Census Doubles**

Recent census reports prepared by Assistant Superintendent of Schools Kenneth MacLeod indicate the population of Northville children 19 years of age and under will have almost doubled over a 10-year period.

A brief summary of preliminary census figures prepared by Dr. MacLeod in June estimates a possible count of 2,004 children at the end of the 1961-62 school year as compared to 1,110 at the close of 1951-52.

Attendance figures tabulated by Dr. MacLeod this month show 1,881 students were enrolled in public schools in June. This represents a gain of 70 over the previous year. The census count (children 19 and under) jumped by 198.

In a five-year comparison of public school attendance, June enrollments increased as follows: 1956-57, 1,555; 1957-58, 1,631; 1958-59, 1,721; 1959-60, 1,811; and 1960-61, 1,881.

Attendance and census figures are growing at an exceptionally stable rate, noted Dr. MacLeod.

But few would deny that the selection of delegates to draft a new constitution for our state is also important. The last time delegates were elected to a convention in Michigan was September, 1957.

To help voters within our circulation area become better acquainted with the candidates we have published brief biographies on page nine this week.

Secretary Hare says that many voters do not know that they will be able to vote for two, not just one, nominee at Tuesday's primary.

A senatorial area delegate and a representative district delegate will be nominated by both parties.

Tuesday 288 delegates will be nominated. September 12 voters will elect half of these to go with the business of drafting a new constitution.

Within the area covered by this newspaper writers reside in the following districts:

Northville township and city of Northville (Wayne county) - 18th senatorial district and 21st legislative district;

City of Northville (Oakland county), Novi and city of Wixom - 12th senatorial district and fourth legislative district;

City of Wixom (north and south) - Third legislative district.

Actually, Tuesday's voting process will be exactly the same as if the voter were picking party nominees for the state senate and house of representatives.
