Northville residents have known this from past experience with different assessing practices in Wayne and Oakland counties that, until corrected, resulted in school tax inequities

There's another odd twist connected with the multi-county status of the school district that concerns the library. Kenneth Shrewsbury, a township resident and member

of the recent city-township library study committee, brought it to our attention.

He called it the principle reason for the committee's reason ommendation that the school district be the contracting organization for the library.

While all city residents may use the library without an additional fee (regardless of whether they reside in Wayne or Oakland county), the Oakland county residents of the school district must pay a \$10 annual family fee.

hrewsbury points out that this discourages assignments at the public library by the school system.

"As far as I'm concerned, the committee wasn't trying to bring the township's share of the cost up to the city's", Shrewsbury declared. But he calls the present library set-up in conradiction with the school district.

Under the committee's proposal residents of the school district would be asked to vote a one-mill levy carmarked for library support. The school board would then be the contract-library support. But some of the communities - like Northville township Livonia and Redford township - did not wish to buy the entire number of taps allocated to them.

Meanwhile, Wayne county must guarantee the full cost of the entire sewer - so it had to look around for communities

that might want a larger allocation. Wayne county communities were given the first oppor-

tunity to buy additional capacity. Then, according to George R. Bingham, director of Wayne county department of public works, it became a question of whether to save the additional capacity for communities within the county who cannot now afford to purchase their full allocated share (like Northville township), or to permit Oakland county to purchase taps.

Bingham admitted that there was a split opinion at th county administrative level. Some believed it would be better to save all the capacity for Wayne county; others thought it would be in the interests of inter-county cooperation to give Oakland county at least a portion of the extra capacity. The latter course was agreed upon - for more reasons
