Next they would add extra beds and attemp to regain full membership in the Blue Cross plan. We suspect that a plan for re-opening will be announced

soon with an appeal for public assistance.

Northville's new post office plans hit a snag after bickering over location developed between businessmen and the city council.

Any motorist who has trave ed on one or more of the many toll roads throughout the knows they are a safer. less fatiguing and far faeter way of covering long distances han alternative public roads rough towns and cities. The only bad part is at the toll gate. Do the benefits justify the toll charges? It's almost impossible to get a dollars and cents answer that will satisfy every-

one. But if time savings are SPECIALS EVERY THURSDAY IN THE DEweighed, the evidence points to the tolls being worth it. Trucking firms who spend substantial sums annually on tolls and are vitally interested in the arithmetic of costs, have made some surveys with illuminating results. Typical is one case where two trucks from the same firm made parallel test runs on toll and public roads ver a 1700 mile round trip Poly-Vi-Sol Drops oute through five states. The results showed the tol road vehicle saved 29 hours and 59 minutes elapsed time in rest stops and 11 hours and 17 minutes in actual travel time.
