A "hard-core" of the Community General hospital staff refuses to give up and call it quits.

Northville's new post office plans hit a snag after picking over location developed by businessmen and the city council.

An attempt to locate the differences was made by the council recently when Councilman John Canterbury spoke to a group of retailers. He apologized for the council's letter to post office authorities recommending the retail area of Wing and Cozy without consulting the retailers group.
The letter rushed off a letter stating they preferred a location within the business district shortly after they learned of the council letter.

Topnotch of the whole affair was a dropping of proceedings by the post office department.

Now a compromise letter has been sent. It says that "all's well" in Northville and both sides are willing to accept the final decision of the post office without protest. But the council and business community still prefer their suggested location, and Postmaster Leland Smith and many businessmen want a downtown site.

According to Smith, a decision should be reached in about six weeks.
Four sites are under option. Besides the Cozy-Wing corner, they are: Main street between Mainville Drug and Northville Realty; directly behind the Main street site on Candy; and the southeast corner of Main and Center.

Oldly owned, according to R. B. Carrington, who was Northville's postmaster for nearly five years in the early thirties, the Main and Center street corner was practically sold for a post office site in 1947. The deal fell through after the check had been issued because of local protests and the war then halted all plans for construction by the government.

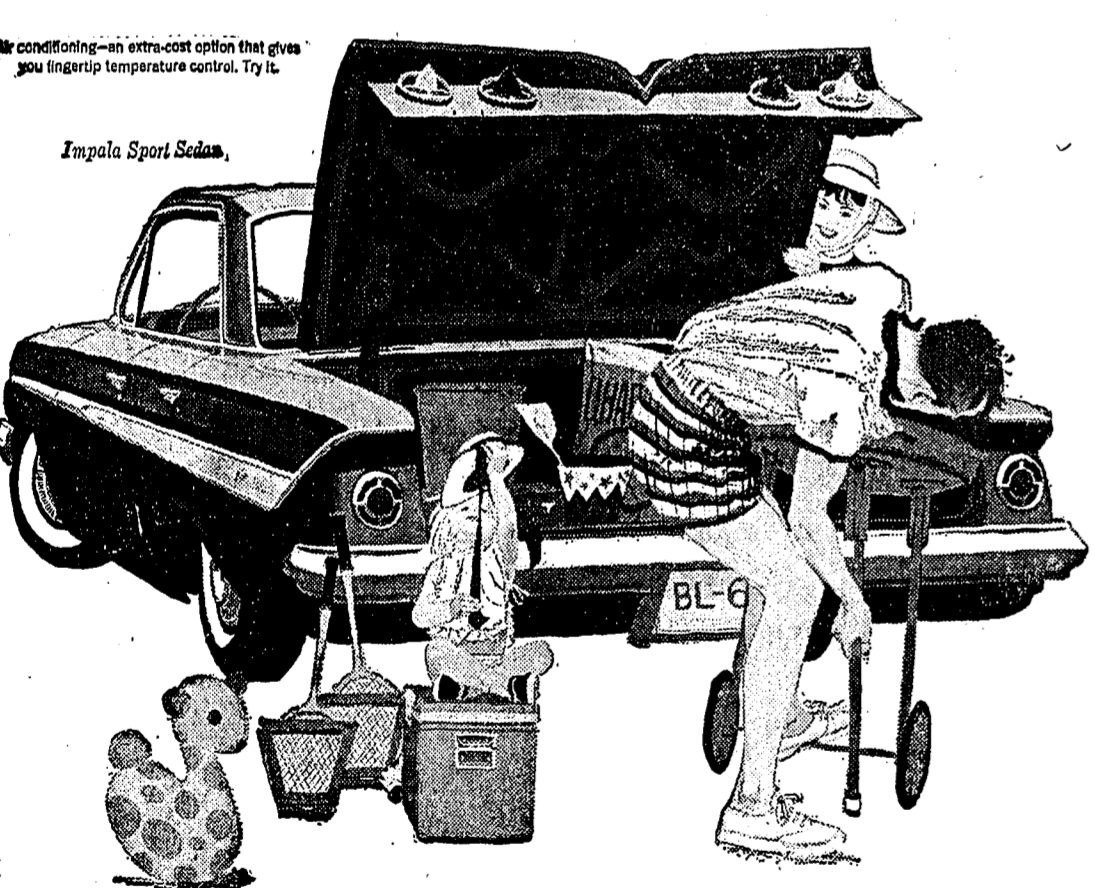
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You May Live to be 120—or More!

As the more liberal social security laws take effect and other forms of insurance become available to more people over 55 years of age, it is not surprising that the number of people over 55 years of age has increased about 25% compared with the headcount taken ten years ago.

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Michigan Mirror Scenic Route Plans

Michigan highways take advantage of Michigan's scenic beauty, and many of the scenic routes planned for the future are a road along the southern shore of Lake Superior from Detroit to Muskegon; another along the East shore of the Keweenaw peninsula from Hancock to the Port Wilkins area; a third from Ludington to Mackinac Island; and a fourth along the western shore of the Lower Peninsula, and a scenic route from Cross Village along Starvoan and Cadillac to the Lake Michigan coast.

There will be a new look in the roads themselves, too. Everything about them will be designed for the greatest possible advantage of the tourists who want to feast his eyes on the natural beauty and panoramic grandeur of Michigan's woods and waters.

The exact place for the remainder of a scenic highway program has not been determined. Although a study is in progress, Mackie reports, certain of the physical facts about the scenic highways themselves have been determined.

They will be wide, Mackie says. The roadways themselves would be normal width, but the shoulders would be paved and would lend themselves easily to "roadside" parks.

Turnouts and roadside parks will abound.

Perhaps the most unique thing about the roads is that Mackie promises they will have no relation whatsoever to the shortest distance between two points. Locations which "blend with the natural topography" will lead to a situation where "directness will be avoided whenever possible," he said.

Speed limits, special route markers and other safety and location devices will mark the scenic routes of the future, the Highway Commissioner promises.

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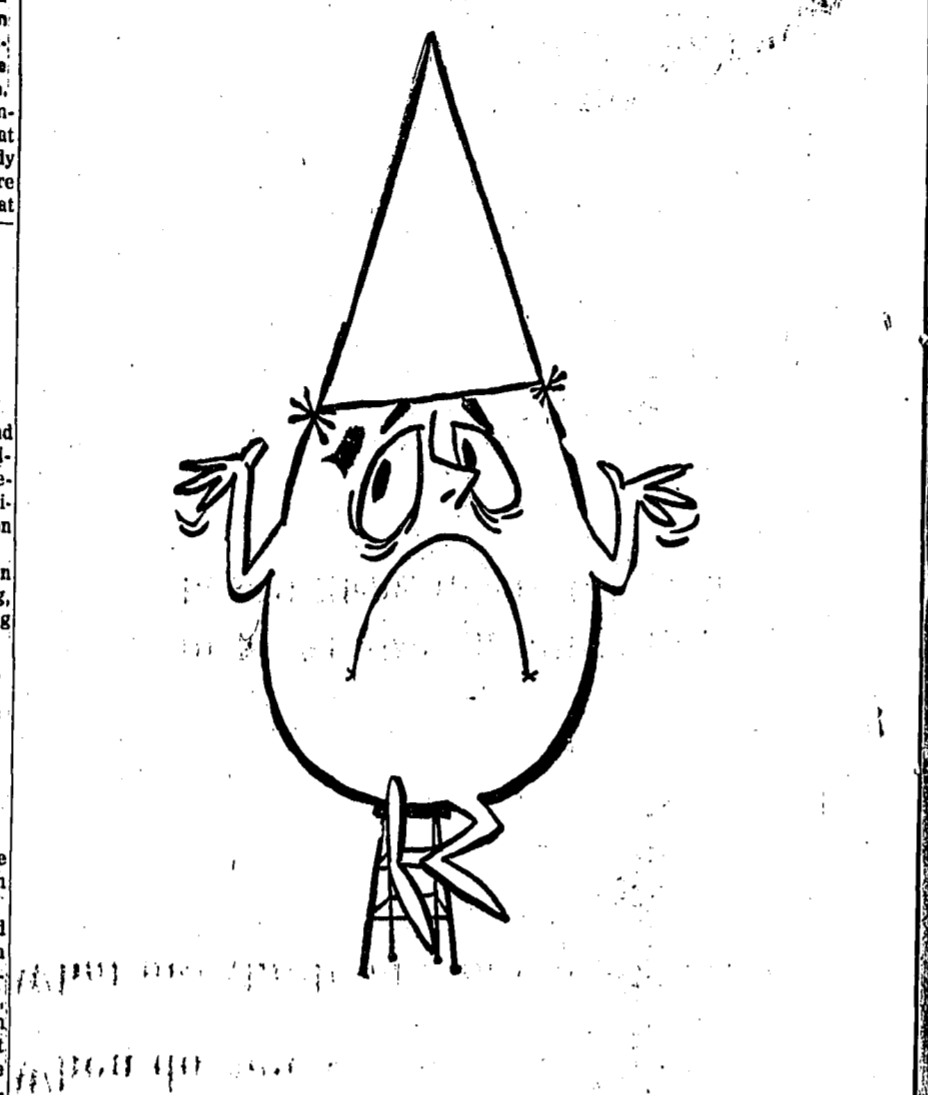

Township Pledges Faith, Credit in Sewer Project

Novi Township formally has pledged its full faith and credit behind the proposed sewer project for the southeastern part of Wayne County into the Rouge Valley system.

In effect, the township is pledging its faith and credit for the number of taps it will control in the future.

The method of paying the bonds over the 15 year period would be similar to one discussed at the village's special sewer meeting two weeks ago.

Similar action is expected to be taken by the village council at its meeting next Tuesday September 11.

There was no commitment made by the board on a definite number of taps because an supervisor Fraser Stamen explained, the important thing was to get a firm commitment to Wayne county.

He said one Oakland County surveyor skayed the project and bonds were sold to finance the sewers that then would be the appropriate time for the township to go in its bid. The township area which is near the proposed trunkline would be made to get a better picture.

At a special sewer meeting August 17, the village council received several proposals for almost 1,200 of the township's taps. Wayne county is offering the village.

The township's approval was necessary because the trunkline would run from Seven Mile in Northville to about 9 1/2 Mile and Meadowbrook roads to 100 and 100 from Clarendon of township lands bonding money to W. B. Chase, of 4330 East Eight Mile.

That property alone, it was pointed out, has the potential capacity for 500 taps. Whether it would be acceptable to taking any number of taps to another matter which would have to be discussed with him.

Stamen said that there was a township council meeting on Tuesday, August 22, when the township approved to go forward with the sewer project.

25 New Teachers On Northville Staff

Northville's public schools will have 25 new teachers in its system this year when classes open next Thursday.

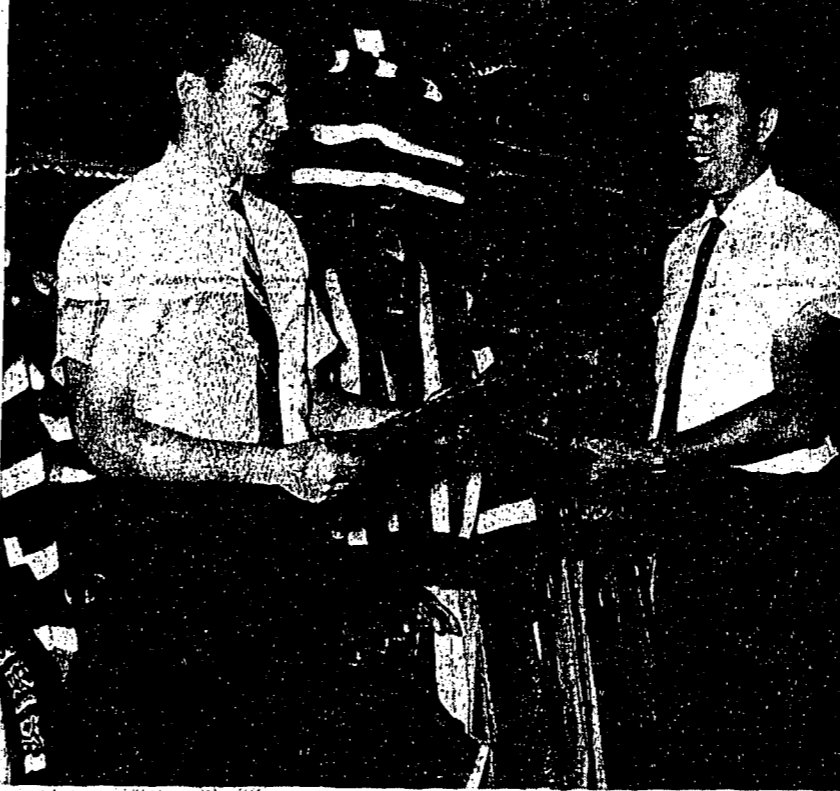

New Assignment For Col. Van Atta



Col. Ward H. Van Atta, a recent graduate of the U.S. Army War College has assumed the duties of Director of the U. S. Army Engineer Geodesy, Intelligence and Mapping Research and Development Agency (GIMRADA), Fort Belvoir, Virginia. He succeeds Col. L. L. Haseman, who had served as Director of GIMRADA since its foundation in August, 1950, to meet the needs of the Army's requirements for equipment, procedures, and techniques in the fields of geodesy, engineering intelligence, and mapping for application to base plant and troop operations. Col. Haseman was one of 14 Army officers selected to the Class of 1952 to attend the National War College in Washington, D.C. Col. Van Atta is neither a stranger to Fort Belvoir nor to the fields of mapping and geodesy. In 1948, he served as Commander for the Engineer Center, Fort Belvoir, and in 1953, he was assigned to G-4 (Logistics) for the Engineer Center. During the period of 1953-54, he was Chief, Mapping and Geodesy Division, Office of the Assistant Chief of Staff for Intelligence, Headquarters, Department of the Army. In his capacity as Chief, he provided advice and direction for the world-wide military topographic mapping program; monitored international mapping agreements with foreign countries; represented the Department of the Army at SHARP Mapping Conferences; represented the Department on the Committee on Cartography of the National Academy of Arts and Sciences and the Van-American Institute of Geography and History, and presented the annual budget to the Department, the Department of Defense, Bureau of the Budget, and the Congressional Appropriations Committees. During the past year, Col. Van Atta was a student and Commander of the Far East U. S. Army War College, Carlisle Barracks, Penna., and he also took courses at George Washington University which enabled him to earn an M.A. Degree in International Affairs. Col. Van Atta entered an active Army duty as a second lieutenant in 1937, following his graduation from Michigan State University where he obtained a B.S. Degree in Civil Engineering. After serving as a platoon leader, he progressed through company commander, battalion executive officer, and adjutant commander in all phases of Engineer and military training to include construction, bridge building, and maintenance instruction. In 1944, he attended the British Senior Officers' School, Oxford, England. In 1945, he served as Battalion Commander directing the construction of an airfield in England. He later landed on Omaha Beach, and one month later joined Army Headquarters as Executive Officer, Army Engineer Section. Upon his return to the States, Col. Van Atta served as Executive Officer, First Army Headquarters, Fort Bragg, N.C., in the Bavaria, Michigan 1945. In 1946-47, he attended school system.

Correct fit is especially important in children's shoes. Check your child's shoe size (length and width) — preschoolers, 4-8 weeks; and 2-4 months for older children. Children's feet are flexible and grow rapidly. Their feet can easily become malformed through adjusting to an incorrect rest size or shape of shoe. It is the widest part of the ball that should correspond to the widest part of the shoe. The heel section should dry out between wearings. Have repairs made promptly. Polish leather shoes to keep the leather supple and attractive.

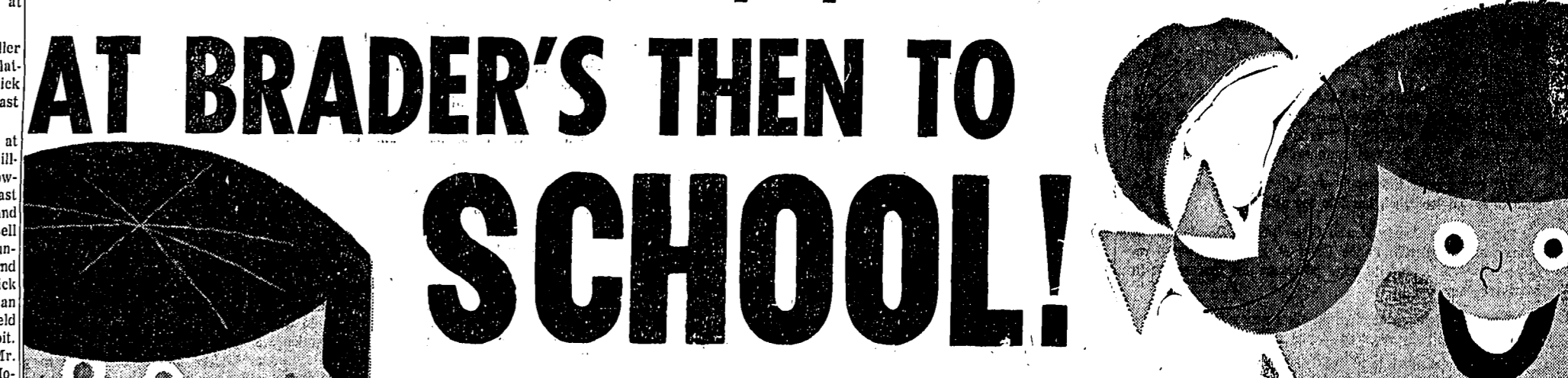
