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


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
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Saturday Collision **Injures** Another

Novi police report that the Madsen car, which was heading north on Novi road, was apparently driven by Mrs. Madsen, Th police can't be certain because both were thrown out, but they explained that Madsen's car keys were in his pants pocket, while Mrs, Madsen's keys were in the ignition, and it was apparently the Madsens' custom to have Mrs. Madsen drive home from their working places in Detroit.

McMullen, who was alone in his compact car, was driving west on 12 Mile road. He, like the Madsens, was thrown from his car. The collision occurred at 7:35 p.m., just before heavy rains fell, washing away all skid marks.

Both cars were hurled westward from the intersection b the impact. The smaller McMullen car was off the north side of the 12 Mile pavement, a short distance from the intersection, while the Madsen car stopped about 250 feet down the north shoulder of 12 Mile.

Madsen, who police believe was a passenger in the right side of the car, was thrown out and along the car's side, so that his right leg was nearly torn off when it was caught on the right rear bumper of the car. His pants pocket was wedged b veen the bumper and the car's rear fender panel.

Mrs. Madsen landed face-down a short distance from he usband, and McMullen was thrown face-down in a puddle of gasoline. All three were near the intersection. Funeral services for the Madsens were held yesterday morn-
