You call in an expert, in this instance, a child psychologist would have been the usual choice

Secondly, a statement by Peter Onie rather saddened me. He said, "children are the last of the primitive peo-

I can only conclude that in our mad race to educate everything and everybody, we shall soon change this, too. Already, it seems to me, we are intent upon robbing our children of their most precious possession - those years when they live in a world of games and make-believe.

There are "lessons" for everything and children are starting to be taught at earlier stages of their development. Then we have world championship swimmers at 12 and 14 years of age. I wonder how many games they had time to play in their rigorous training to become "the world's best.'

I'd rather see that glint of devilment mixed with complete concentration to the exclusion of all else in the world on a game of "Ickly Ackly Aiko" or "Knock 'Em Down".
