Each request is weighed against the other.

Last year, for example, Northville school district received 7.90 mills; Wayne county, 6.10 mills; and Northville township, one mill.

In addition the Northville district has 10 mills voted by the people of the district for school operation providing the school district with a total operating millage of 17.90.

Northville has based its budget on the same allocation as last year. And it is anticipated that the county will be satisfied with its 6.10.

In Novi last year the school district won 8.37 mills of the

Last year Oakland county had sought 5.40 mills, but had to settle for 5.25. Of concern to the Novi school district is the fact that Oakland county will seek 6.04 mills this year - which could result in a decrease in school allocation.

Many school districts, like Northville, extend into more than one county. In this instance the school district must accept the lowest allocation of the counties involved.

Now that their budgets have been submitted, officials of both Northville and Novi school districts must appear before e allocation board and justify their proposed expenditures.
