Officially, the Novi board of education has voted to place a five mill increase for operating expenses on the ballot June 28 - just two months after a proposed six-mill increase was soundly defeated.

But unofficially, there's a strong effort underway to change the proposal before it is legally advertised. Close followers of Novi's school affairs are convinced

the five-mill request cannot pass. They do not argue that the millage is not needed - only that it cannot pass.

Their conclusions are logical. The board membership is split, 3-2, on the millage pro-

posal with the majority approving a five-mill request, and the minority a 4½-mill request, And any observer of tax-hike proposals know that the odds (these days) are against passage even with full school board

At a meeting last week a handful of citizens listened to the board discuss its differences.

Hope that the "two sides" might come to an agreement faded and the session was finally adjourned. When one considers the consequences of another defeat at

the polls, it should leave little room for argument among those genuinely interested in the welfare of Novi's school system. If the board is to keep its pledge and adopt a balanced budget for 1962-63, more millage must be granted --- or drastic cut-backs detrimental to Novi's educational program must be

If the board is to win new millage, it must present a united front in its appeal to the voters.

Jerome P. Cavanagh, Detroit's dynamic new mayor, is a young man with a mission.

Friday noon, along with a dozen or more other Detroit area community weekly newspaper publishers, I accepted an invitation to have lunch and listen to His Honor. I came away charmed by his sincerity and convinced that he possesses the courage to tread where politicians

The mayor handed out a prepared speech and told us that he would try to stick to it — and not become involved

in his controversial income tax plan. He then proceeded to plunge headlong into the income tax story - his written text temporarily forgotten.

His eyes lit up and his face reddened as he became a man engrossed in a struggle to convince a doubting audience. Mayor Cavanagh believes wholeheartedly in his tax

plan. And he means to push it through. He told us that he would have preferred to have the state take the initiative - and so informed state officials. But when they balked, he marched ahead.

Mayor Cavanagh will tell you that the welfare of the entire southeastern portion of the state is dependent upon a healthy Detroit. And he points to the many industrial, cultural and recreational facilities provided by Detroit that are there for everyone to enjoy.

He told a very convincing story. And further noted that 1500 U.S. cities have income tax plans that include non-residents employed in the cities. And then he became more realistic. "I know that this plan throws up a natural harrier between Detroit and the

uburbs and this is a bad thing. But it has to be faced. It is my duty as mayor to present a balanced budget and I intend to do so." he added. I like Cavanagh's courage, his sincerity and his will-

ingness to tackle something that he believes is just. On the other side of the coin, however, I was disap-

pointed, but not surprised, that neither Cavanagh's written nor spoken remarks suggested any plans for reductions in eovernment spending. He's swimming with the current \_ more agencies.






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
