Going Steady . . .

A commonly accepted practice, "going steady" has become an American institution. Yet as Anatole France pointed, "It is fifty million people do a foolish thing, it's still a foolish thing." Fidelity and even love are professed, as the couple vowe to date each other exclusively. Then I inquire at the first opportunity, "Do you intend to marry this person?" The answer is invariably, "No". Why then have they promised to date no one else, when they expect to break-up sometime in the future? I have yet to find an answer to this query. Obviously, extraneous pro and con arguments can be waged; such as the virtues of always having a date as opposed to the drudgery of being tied down to one person as early in life. Yet the problem remains, that "going steady" is based on the thoroughly unground premise of making promises that everyone knows will never be kept.

Graduation . . .

As the hallowed eve of June 14 draws near, this writer fears that very few seniors have any sincere concern for the graduation rituals. The seniors manage to fill their heads with many other essentials. "How many presents will I get?" "Where are all the parties going to take place?" The graduation itself does not have the same significance for everyone. Some find it is merely a formal declaration of the right to enter college. For many others, graduation merely signifies freedom from drudgery. For all, however, we do discover that the thrill of receiving a diploma has often been relegated to the thrill of receiving, perhaps some new clothes. During the ceremony, speakers are attended graciously until the first words are uttered. Then, as the speakers disperse, a hush comes over the crowd. Library Millage Vote Is Delayed By Election Rule

The Novi library was born on a dream, and only that dream has continued to keep it operating. Recent word from state library officials means it looks as though the library will have to continue supporting itself for at least a while longer.

The library board, which last month petitioned the township board to place a library millage proposition on the August primary for state and county offices, recently learned that the question cannot be put before local voters until the township election in April.

As the campaign grows, book donations and some additional funds were given to the library for its opening. The township had provided for the library to use for housing the group.

Dozens of residents and organizations joined in the fund-raising effort, and the library board is confident that the library will be able to open on time.

Workmen Race To Ready Downs

Monday night the trotters are scheduled on the 19th season of harness racing at Northville Downs — a 42-night meet ending August 4.

But it's not the trotters that are the main attraction. It's the workmen who are racing. Right now they're odds-on favorites to complete the \$400,000 remodeling project just in time for the start of the new season.

Novi's State Aid Cut by \$20,000

Michigan's new state aid to schools will almost certainly become law, would mean a loss in revenues for the Novi school district of over \$20,000, says Superintendent Tom Culbert.

The bill, which will benefit most of the state's school districts, has passed both houses of the legislature and is ready for the governor's nearly-certain signature.

The Novi school board last week ended nearly two months of divided debate by giving unanimous approval to a four-and-a-half-mill preliminary ballot.

The board, which last month voted three-two to set a \$24,800 expenditure budget for the year, had been trying since to reach a compromise figure that would have support of all members.

With Wayne Engineers Northville Aims Novi Sewer

The question of whether Northville will consent to the connection of Novi to the Middle Rouge Interceptor line has been answered Monday night after a 2 1/2-hour meeting between city, township and Wayne county officials.

Local officials appeared unopposed by the assurances of Wayne County DPW Director George Hines, who stated that the line would be installed in Northville and Plymouth townships.

Water Ordinance Adopted by Board

The Novi township board last Monday adopted a water ordinance covering a variety of boat and water uses. The ordinance, prepared by the Oakland county, is intended to provide uniform water laws throughout the county.

Supervisor Frank Staman pointed out that the sheriff's department handles most law enforcement on lakes in the county, and that the county has a water craft law on file in 100 feet of a swimming beach.

In Novi school voters have a choice Monday. Four candidates (two incumbents) are running for two board openings. A record vote is likely.

One organization that has not been standing still since its formation several months ago is the Northville economic development group.

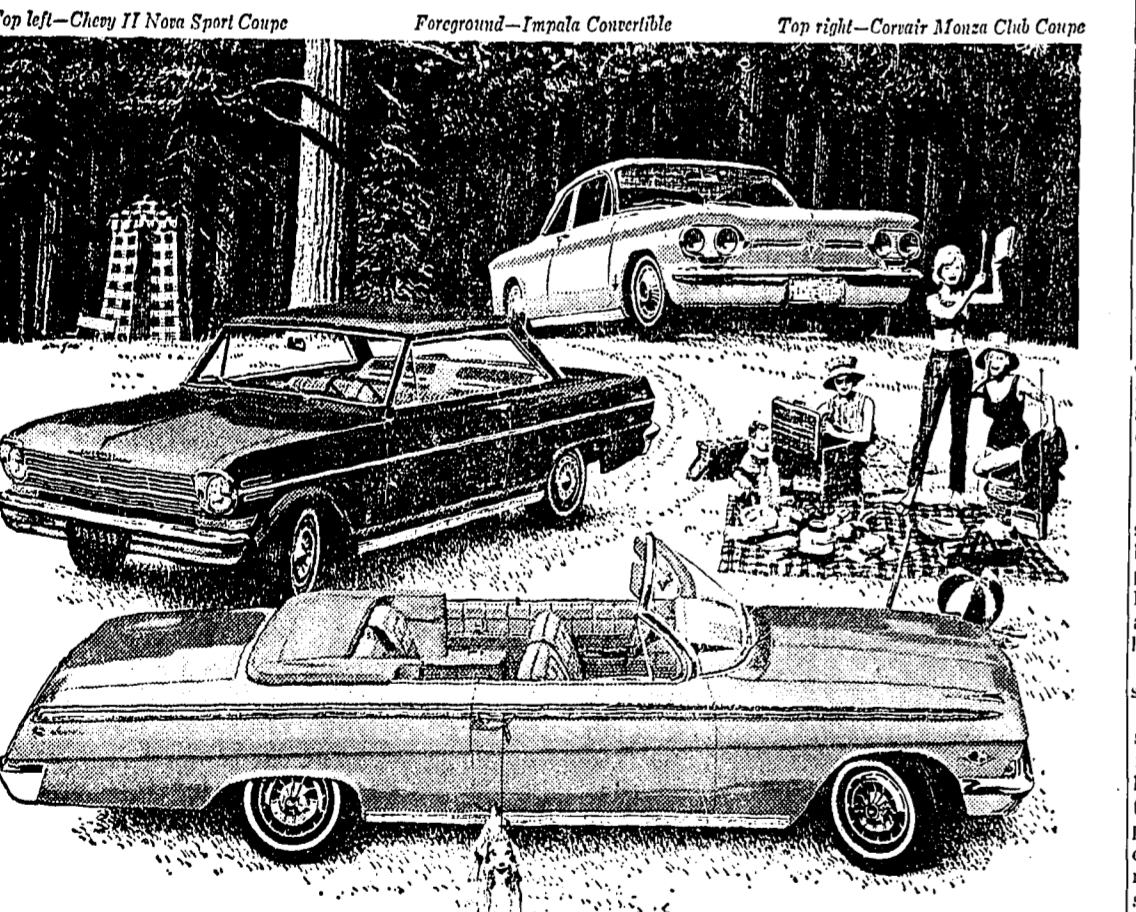
In its preliminary work it has completed an industrial survey of the area and the information has been forwarded to the state economic development office, utilities and the railroad.
