PROPOSED UNIFORM WATERCRAFT ORDINANCE FOR OAKLAND COUNTY

the authority granted the Township Board of the Township of

. Definitions

a. Boats are defined as all water craft with or without selfpropulsion machinery, including sea-planes when not airborne. The word "boat" shall include water skis, water sleds, surf boards or similar contrivances while being towed by any boat.

b. The term "navigable waters" is defined as including at lakes, ponds, streams, lagoons, canals or other waters capable of navigation within the territorial limits of the Township of Novi. 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any boat

upon any navigable waters unless said boat is properly licensed as equired by state and federal laws and regulations." 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any boat upon any navigable waters while under the influence of intoxicating iquor, parcolic drugs or barbituates. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any boat or any person having such in charge or in control thereof to authorize or knowingly permit the same to be operated by any person while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, narcotic drugs or barbituates.

4. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any boat upon any navigable waters in a reckless manner or at an excessive rate of speed or in a manner causing a wake which would endanger or be likely to endanger any person or property of any erson. No person shall operate any boat at a rate of speed greater than will permit him in the exercise of reasonable care o bring the boat to a stop within the assured clear distance ahead. No person shall aperate a heat in a manner so as to unreasonably interfere with the lawful use by others of any navigable waters.

5. No person shall operate on any navigable waters a motor boat at a speed in excess of 10 miles per hour within 100 feet of any hoat lawfully anchored on such navigable waters, within 100 feet of any lawfully marked bathing beach or within 100 feet of any lawfully anchored raft or float used for swimming purposes. 6. No person under the age of fourteen (14) years shall operate any motor propelled boat equipped with a motor greater than 71/2 horsepower, unless accompanied by an adult.

7. No person shall throw, place or otherwise discard any bottle, box, paper, garbage, rubbish or similar objects or any type of unsanitary matter, material or fluid into or upon any 8. No operator of any boat shall have in tow or shall otherwise

assist in the propulsion of a person on water skis, water sleds surf boards or other similar contrivances before 10:00 a.m. (In the morning) on any day. Such activities shall be permitted until sunset, except that on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, the day first preceding a holiday and the holiday, such activities shall be terminated not later than 7:00 p.m. (in the afternoon). Any person permitting himself to be towed on water skis, water sleds, sur boards or similar contrivances before or after the time set forth above shall be in violation of this paragraph and shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. 9. No person shall operate on any navigable waters a motor

boat having in tow or to otherwise assist a person on water skis, water sled, surf board or similar contrivance unless there is in such motor hoat in addition to the operator at least one competent person in a position to observe the progress of the person being towed. This requirement shall not apply to motor boats equipped with not less than a 170 degree wide angle rear view mirror affixed in such a manner as will permit the operator to observe the progress of the person being towed.

10. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate any boat inless equipped with a proper muffler as required by State law, r to use any siren or noise producing or noise amplifying instrunent on any boat on any navigable waters in such manner tha e peace and good order of the neighborhood is disturbed; pro ed, however, that nothing in this ordinance shall be constructed prohibit the use of whistles, bells or horns as signals required the United States Motor Boat Act or other Federal law for the afe navigation of motor boats or vessels.

11. The provisions of this ordinance shall not be construed t ohlbit the running of racing or exhibition boats muffled or unmuffled during any race or regulta operating under the provisions Act 208 of the Public Acts of Michigan, 1958, as amended. 12. Should any provision, sentence, clause or phrase of this rdinance be held to be invalid for any reason, such holding shall affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any part hereof other than the part so declared invalld, it being the legislative intent that this ordinance shall stand not withstanding such

13. Every operator of any boat livery or boat launching site open to the public shall post a copy of this ordinance in a conpicuous place.

14. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be subjected to a fine not exceeding the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or by imprisonment in the Oakland County Jail for a period not exceeding plnety (90) days or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion 15. This ordinance shall become effective thirty days after

Learn to swim. If you can swim a little, learn to

2. Always swim with a companion. Make sure someone is near by to help if you get into trouble.

3. Swim in a safe place. The presence of lifeguards sually indicates the area is safe for swimming, 4. Know the area. Before diving, make sure the water s deep enough, and has no hidden objects such as sub-

5. Respect the water and know your limitations. 6. Use Discretion, Wait at least an hour after eating before swimming, and don't swim when overheated or

7. Try to remain calm in case of trouble. Assume face-up floating position, keep your hands under water and slowly move your hands and feet.

8. Even if your boat overturns, stay with it. Most small craft will float, even when filled with water 9. Don't depend on a tube or an inflated toy to hold

10. In river swimming, watch out for swift currents. Lifeguards will tell you to recognize these conditions and how to save vourself if you are caught. 11. In long distance swimming, always swim paralle to the shore and with a companion or boat nearby.




