Summer can be a temptation. It tests your ability to resist excesses.  
Too much sun, speed, excitement — in short, an overdose of fun — often leads to tragedy.

Reports of highway accidents have already started in the immediate area. More will follow. And the most tragic will involve youngsters . . . having fun.

We are reminded by a release from the Red Cross of another summer killer, drowning.  
This tragedy shows little regard for age. Some 6,500 persons died by drowning in the United States last year and Michigan had more than its share with 262.

And while we have annually reminded drivers that caution behind the wheel is particularly important during vacation days when children are all about, these water safety tips deserve attention, too:

1. Learn to swim. If you can swim a little, learn to swim better.
2. Always swim with a companion. Make sure someone is near by to help if you get into trouble.
3. Swim in a safe place. The presence of lifeguards usually indicates the area is safe for swimming.
4. Know the area. Before diving, make sure the water is deep enough, and has no hidden objects such as submerged rocks.
5. Respect the water and know your limitations.
6. Use Discretion. Wait at least an hour after eating before swimming, and don't swim when overheated or overdrunk.
7. Try to remain calm in case of trouble. Assume a face-up floating position, keep your hands under water and slowly move your hands and feet.
8. Even if your boat overturns, stay with it. Most small craft will float, even when filled with water.
9. Don't depend on a tube or an inflated toy to hold you up.
10. In river swimming, watch out for swift currents. Lifeguards will tell you to recognize these conditions and how to save yourself if you are caught.
11. In long distance swimming, always swim parallel to the shore and with a companion or boat nearby.
12. Equip your boat with safety items. A life jacket for each passenger and a stern light are musts. Recommended also are anchor, oars, bear hook, extra line, fire extinguisher, first aid kit, and road kit.

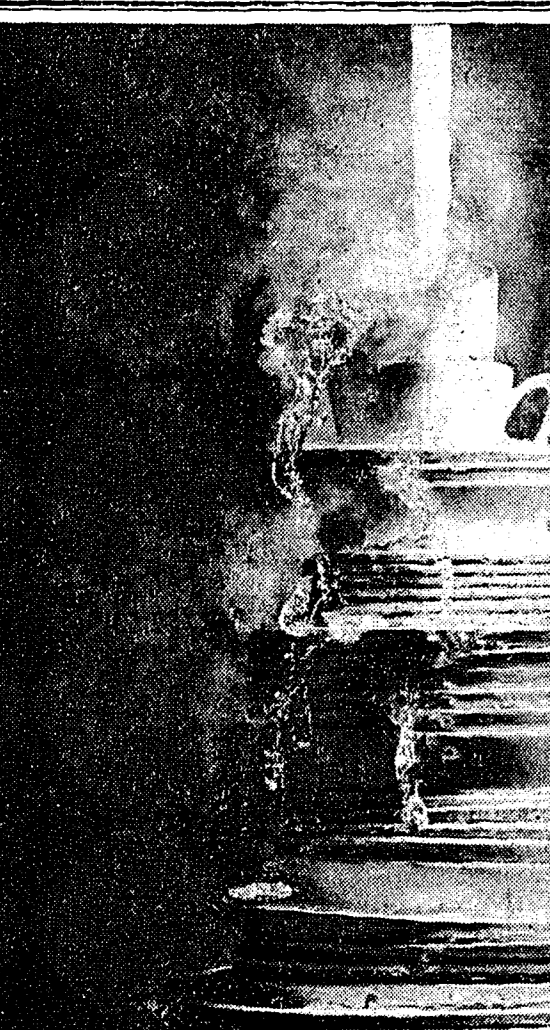

### R R Passenger Business Dead

Northville, Mass. In my opinion over the property of the column which appeared during the week of May 17th, I referred to the new corporations which are being formed by the Bangor & Aroostook and the Kansas City Southern railroads. (I think this Release was No. 2050, which means that I have written this number of columns for a similar number of weeks over the years.)

These business corporations which are gradually being formed do not change the operations of the railroad passing through your city. Such a "business corporation", however, gives the railroad an opportunity to use its right-of-way, its stations, and its opportunities for business in more profitable ways.

Every Chamber of Commerce should now take this matter up with the railroad passing through its city. Said railroad enlarging its facilities means a profit, which should mean an advantage to your city as well as to the stockholders of the railroad.

The railroad passenger business is dead and every community should recognize this as soon as possible. Otherwise, the railroad stockholder or perhaps should consider alternatives in other transportation fields.

As suggested above, there are many things which a railroad company can do without any additional legislation. The Boston & Albany Railroad, which runs through Westley, Mass., had the most successful stations built during prosperous times.

One of these has been a clothes cleaning establishment, with a small waiting room for passengers. The other railroad station, one mile beyond, is being demolished by the railway company which will sell the land for various purposes.

In almost every community there is a shortage of good parking spaces at the present time. There are sections of vacant land which the railroad company has which could be rented for parking lots. These would be both a contribution to the community, and also give a constantly increasing revenue to the railroad companies from whom it would collect money through the leases of the property.

## Michigan Mirror Network of Taxes Not Exclusive to State

Patchwork taxes, mislabeled "stopgap" measures, are such that they effectively cast a dark cloud over the temporary tax measures which were first passed in 1959 under the term "miscellaneous" and enacted again this year as permanent measures. Opponents of the "miscellaneous" taxes, which they would now be called if supporters had their way, would like Michigan residents to believe this state is the only one with a variety of taxes. The U.S. Census, however, shows that Michigan's taxing ideas are in use throughout the country. Some states have taxes Michigan lawmakers haven't even thought of.

## Treasury Agents Find Still Near Wixom Area

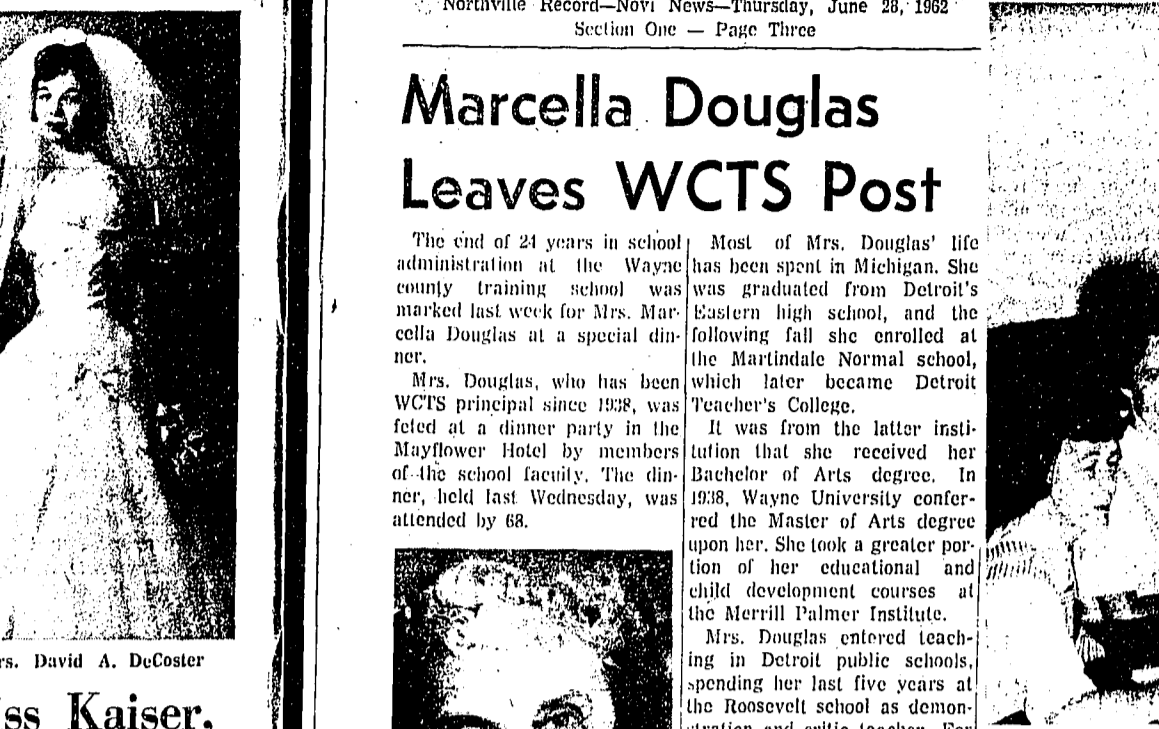

**Build Safety Rest Area**  
On Expressway in Novi

Construction has started on  
Novi's \$10,489 safety rest area,  
located on the Interstate 75  
expressway, between Beck and  
Tatt roads, the contractor said.

The rest area, one of about  
100 planned for the state, will  
serve the eastbound freeway  
traffic only. It is being built on  
the south side of the expressway,  
on property formerly owned  
by the Van Every family.

The land for the new area

firm of Ann Arbor is contractor

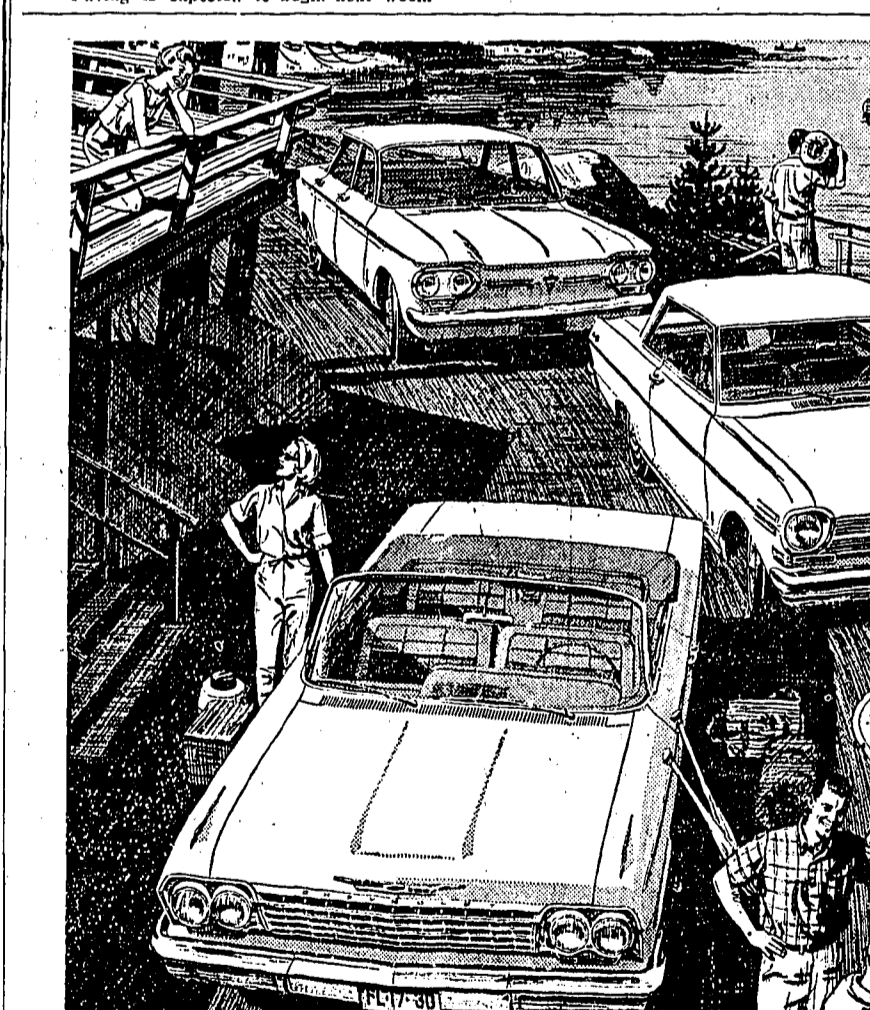
