A Look at Stocks

steps), pillars, monuments and tombs. We visited all the traditional landmarks, museums and government buildings - the Washington monument,

National Archives, Smithsonian, Library of Congress, Supreme Court, White House, Treasury department (FBI) Pentagon, Wax Museum, Mount Vernon, Arlington ceme tery, Voice of America, State Department, the Capitol building - House and Senate, Bureau of Printing and Engraving and Lincoln memorial.

Each was impressive and educational. So far as monuments are concerned, the memorial to Lincoln tops all others, in my opinion. The massive statue of the Great Emancipator seems almost living and the words of his Gettysburg Address carved in the marble walls create a mood for reflection that every American should experience. But for entertainment, you can't beat the sessions in the House and Senate,

We hadn't been in the Senate gallery more than five minutes when my 13-year-old son turned to me and said, "hey Dad, nobody's listening to that guy."








Detroit Might Sell Rehear Landfill Case, If it Owns System Supreme Court Orders
