For several months - perhaps years - Northville's planning commission has been working on a master develpment plan for the entire community,

While the finishing touches have not been applied, the city council was given a sneak preview of what to expect when the wraps are taken off the report and the public is given an opportunity to consider the long-range nmendations for our community.

Without revealing details, it can be said that the report is extremely conclusive and delves into basic goals, community characteristics, population projections, new concepts for business area, residential and industrial potentials, a thoroughfare and street plan, plus areas for schools, parks

The planners have taken a long, studied look at the future and have recommended guide lines for the future progress of our community. The work has been done in relative obscurity with the assistance of a professional planner who also assists Northville township and is therefore aware of mutual problems and can offer advice where singleness of purpose is needed.

In the not too distant future this plan will be ready for public presentation.

We mention it now for two reasons

First we believe that George Zerbel's planning commission deserves public recognition for its outstanding job. The work is tedious and time-consuming, its only rewards are the knowledge a genuine contribution is being made toward the future welfare of the community.

Secondly, I believe it is particularly important now that local businessmen (and citizens interested in what lies ahead for Northville) know that their government is de voting serious study to this problem.

The closer one becomes to the matter of preserving and planning for a healthy, prosperous community, the greater becomes the realization that action is needed.

And when one recognizes that in less than two years a \$20 million shopping center featuring some of the nation's leading merchandisers and providing parking spaces for 4,000 cars will be scarcely 10 minutes away, talk that "Northville has plenty of parking and adequate shopping facilities" sounds hollow, indeed.

(The Sears, Crowley center will open at Seven Mile and Middlebelt early in 1964). With this in mind we hope that the planners' re

port, when announced, will be digested slowly and that would-be critics remember it is a recommendation for long range guide posts.

And acknowledge, too, that outside developments' may dictate prompter action on some aspects of the plan than may have seemed necessary when the planners began.

Upon driving away from the theatre, Dave picked up a toy detective gun belonging to his seven-yearold brother, John, that had been left in the seat of the car. Phil was driving, and apparently as Dave was fooling around with the toy gun he was observed by a pedestrian in Plymouth who immediately called police to report what had been observed: a motorist being forced to drive a car under gun-point

Moments later the report was received by radio by Northville police. Alertly, they observed the car at the root beer drive-in.

Just as Phil and Dave were about to order a refreshing glass of root beer from the waitress, two officers with guns drawn opened the front doors of the Jerome car and ordered them out.

And just like on television, the boys were ordered to stand with their hands on top of the car while the officers searched them.

Dave still had the gun in his hand.

The officers then searched the car. They found a number of books and other religious lit-

erature including Bibles and a hymnal entitled "Rejoice and Sing' It hardly seemed like the time for that, however,






