Job Opportunities Good for College Grads

Employment forecasts developed by the Michigan State University placement bureau indicate a bright future for college graduates.

The economic climate also seemed to improve the bureau's forecasts. Kinney said, "Business graduates also fared well as demand for accountants, engineers, scientists, and teaching fields."

The number of job interviews with individual students dropped to 13,058, slightly below the number recorded during the 1960-61 school year, he said.

Predictions about the demand for school teachers also ranged from the Bureau director's forecast that teaching candidates would be in short supply.

Other major expenditures include 12.3 per cent for medical, surgical care, or delivery room and anesthesia; 11.6 per cent for administration and general operations; and 10.9 per cent for dietary provisions.

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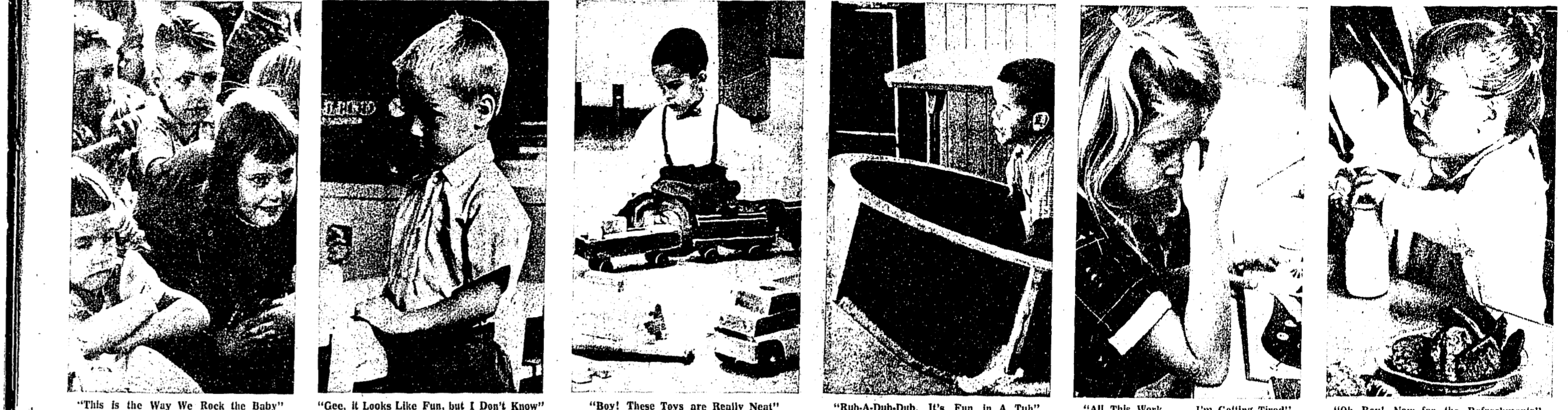

Novi Blood Bank Set To Collect Thursday

"We haven't received the blood that we had hoped for, but we probably have more by now," said Mrs. Guntin Deming, coordinator of the Novi blood bank donation center to be held next Thursday.

"Right now, though," Mrs. Deming said, "our problem is to get the blood that we need for the blood bank program."

"The blood collection center will be held from 8 to 10 p.m. next Thursday at the Novi community building. Reservations for those hours may be made by calling either Mrs. Deming at FI 9-2510 or Mrs. Evan Henschel at FI 9-2700.

"This shows that Novi is interested in the blood bank program," she said. "She explained that through the Red Cross community blood bank arrangement, Novi is able to have a ready supply of blood credit whenever it is needed."

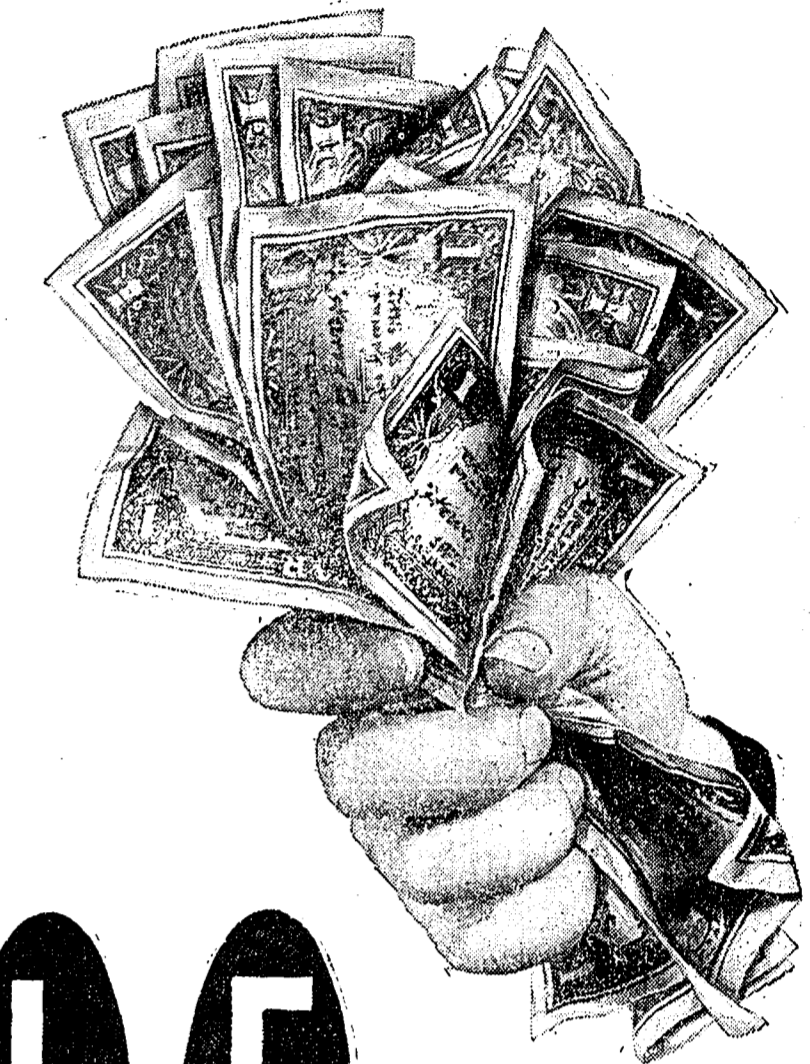

Official Minutes of the Northville City Council

Mr. Ambler said the Recreation Committee might be interested in this for a Tot-Lot. The committee would like to talk to Mr. Cole about the offer. Mr. Ambler will make a report to the Recreation Committee and then make a report to council.

Bids for sidewalk construction: The advertisement for the concrete sidewalk bids was read. With only one bid to open it was decided to have a special meeting in order to give more opportunity for additional bids. Moved by Allen, supported by Ambler that the bid of Paul Palmer be returned and the bidding period extended for one week with bids to be opened at the special meeting on Monday, August 27, 1952.

Ayes: Ambler, Carlson, Juday and Allen. Nays: None. Carried.

Parking in front of Gib Bergstrom's on South Main street: The city manager read a letter from the Chief of Police regarding parking in front of Gib Bergstrom's lot on S. Main street. This matter was deferred for further consideration until the next regular council meeting.

Request to reverse stop signs at corner of North Wing and West Dunlap streets: As per Councilman Carter's request, the city manager reported five accidents during the year of 1951. It was also recommended that a different type of lighting be used at this corner. The possibility of a painted line to assist in noticing "Stop" signs was suggested. Sex Awareness Hampers Creative Thinking Even at 5

Lansing - If your creative five-year-old seems to have similar crises as reported to occur at ages 9, 13 and 17, "It is interesting to note that the generalized drops occur at ages at which the child is making transitions from one developmental stage to another being," says Dr. Torrance. "The drop at about five occurs at the end of the childhood stage and the beginning of the juvenile stage with its demands for social accommodation and compromise and acceptance of authorities outside him. The second drop occurs with the onset of the pre-adolescent stage with its increased need for sensual validation, peer approval, identification with peers of the same sex, and conformity to peer norms," according to Dr. Torrance. The third occurs at the onset of adolescence with its increased anxieties and striving for approval of the opposite sex.

"We have observed," Dr. Torrance points out, "that concerns about sex appropriateness and emphasis on sex differences become prominent in the behavior patterns of children in other cultures, but the patterns are different in different cultures."

Another inhibiting factor in young children, Dr. Torrance said, was found to be the forced stifling of fantasy. "Many children at this age (five) are inhibited in their thinking because they have been warned harshly by parents and teachers that they must eliminate fantasy. Although we are interested in developing a sound type of creativity, we need to keep fantasy alive until the child's mental development is such that he can engage in this sound type of realistic creative thinking."

Health Authorities Urge Asian Flu Vaccination

Lansing — The Michigan Department of Health has received a warning from the U.S. Public Health Service that a new outbreak of Asian flu is expected this winter. The public health service has recommended that persons in the following categories be vaccinated: 1. All persons 45 years of age and older, particularly those aged 65 and over. 2. Persons of all ages who have chronic cardiovascular, pulmonary, renal, or metabolic diseases. 3. Pregnant women. 4. Persons in the chronically ill group and pregnant women seek the advice of their personal physician in regard to influenza vaccination. Since there is a reasonable probability that epidemics of influenza A (Asian) will occur during the coming respiratory disease season, serious consideration should also be given to immunizing those in medical and health services, public safety, utility facilities, transportation, education, and recreational fields. In industries and large institutions where absenteeism is of particular concern, large-scale immunization programs are encouraged. For initial immunization, two doses should be given about two months apart, starting as soon as possible after September 1. 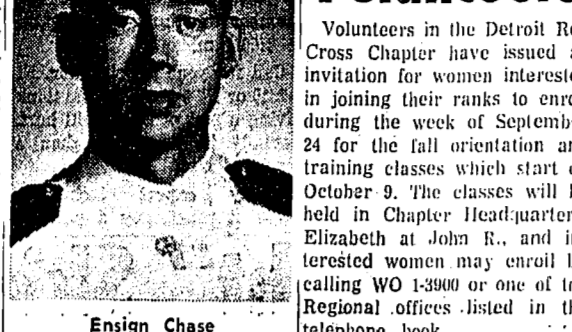

Officer's Son Bitten by Dog

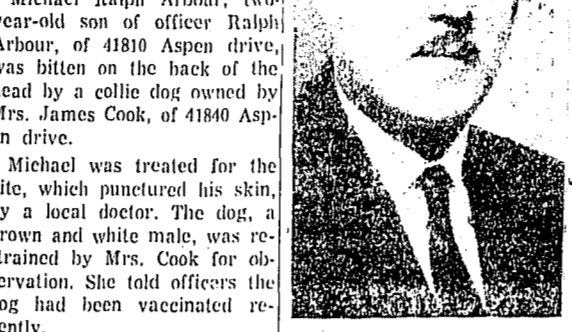

'Get Acquainted' Meetings Start Wednesday at Plymouth State Home

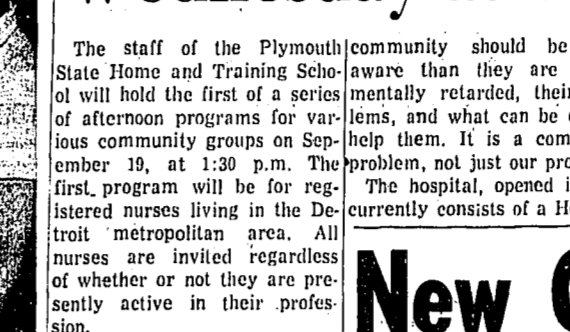

New Constitution Gives Local Government Units More Strength, Flexibility



EDITOR'S NOTE: This is a series about the proposed new Michigan Constitution. Additional articles will appear in subsequent weeks.

Although existing forms of local government are retained, the proposed Michigan Constitution modernizes and broadens their powers to enable them to serve more effectively. Article VII of the new document contains the sections relating to counties, townships, cities and villages.

Greater strength and flexibility are given to local governments by these provisions: 1. Charter counties, cities and villages are granted authority to levy taxes other than property taxes for their support.

AMENDMENT TO THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE, MICHIGAN

An ordinance enacted under Act 184, Public Acts of 1943 of the State of Michigan, as amended to provide for the establishment of zoning districts lying wholly within the unincorporated parts of the Township of Northville, Wayne County, Michigan, within which zoning districts the use of land, natural resources, and structures, including tents and trailer coaches, the height, the area, the size and the location of buildings hereafter erected, the light and ventilation of such buildings, the area of yards, courts and other open spaces, and the density of population shall be regulated: to provide further for a method of administration and enforcement of its provisions; and to prescribe penalties for the violation of its provisions: to provide for a board of appeals and its powers and duties:

THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE ORDAINS: PART I. That the Zoning Ordinance of the Township of Northville is hereby amended by amending the Zoning Map as indicated on Amended Zoning Map No. 11, attached hereto and made a part of this Ordinance.

PART II. VALIDITY. Should any section, clause or provision of this Ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole, or any part thereof, other than that part so declared to be invalid.

PART III. CONFLICTING PROVISIONS REPEALED. Any Ordinance or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

PART IV. EFFECTIVE DATE. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety and are hereby ordered to take effect thirty (30) days after final enactment and publication.

Main street in Northville may soon get a new look—one designed to entice more shoppers by means of carter parking and improved traffic flow.

The idea was conceived by Earl Wiemann, new president of the Retail Merchants Association and owner of Ejay Lumber Mart. And it follows in principle very closely the language master plan currently being prepared by Northville's planning commission.

So when he unveiled a drawing of the idea to planners in the city, it met with general acceptance at least a proposal to the commission planning consultant to study the plan and suggest any needed refinements. Then planners will ask the city council to approve or in a trial basis, Wiemann proposes to make Main street traffic between Huttons and Center avenue—west only.

Angle parking on both sides of Main street would then be permitted. He also proposes to remove street parking meters.

Traffic would be directed eastward through the "parking alley" between South Center street and the Presbyterian church. This access to Main street in the single block "alley" area would be gained either off Huttons, parking alley or via West Main street.

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Michigan Mirror
Vote Tally Faster

Michigan voters enjoy a faster tally of election results than do voters in most states. They are able to hear the results of their voting in a matter of hours after the polls are cast because of the extensive use of voting machines.

Secretary of State James M. Smith announced that the automatic voting machines have increased steadily through the years.

"This November, only about 200,000 voters will use paper ballots, while the other 3,075,000 voters will use machines at their precincts."

Of the 5,129 precincts in the state, 28.4 per cent or 1,477 units, are "paper precincts." The remaining 2,652 are "machine precincts," Harte said.

"Despite the widespread use of machines, only four of Michigan's 83 counties are completely machine-operated. These are Bay, Kalamazoo, Muskegon and Ottawa counties."

"There are a number of counties that use paper ballots," said the Secretary of State.

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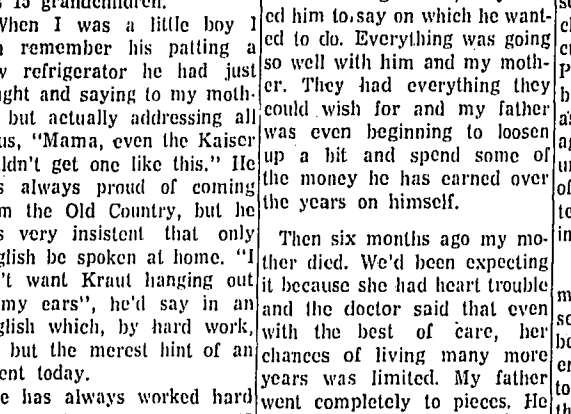
