Top Shangai Casserole With Apple Dapple Pudding

Though Mrs. William A. Bake, 418 West Main street, is pressed for time with her duties as regent of the Sarah Ann Cochran Chapter of the D.A.R., she manages to squeeze in time for one of her favorite pastimes, cooking. From her bulging recipe file comes the following taste teasers.

SHANGHAI CASSEROLE
Mrs. William A. Bake

1. Sauté in large skillet 1/2 cup sliced onions in 2 tablespoons shortening until golden brown, remove from pan and reserve.
2. Brown together half pound boneless pork, cut into small thin strips, half pound boneless veal, cut into small thin strips.
3. Add 3 tablespoons soy sauce, 1/2 teaspoon onion salt.
4. Pour two to three cups hot water to cover meat. Simmer in covered pan 30-45 minutes.
5. Add 1 1/2 cups diced celery; simmer 15 minutes.
6. Add 1/4 ounce can mushroom stems, undrained. 1 No. 2 1/2 can chow mein vegetables, undrained, adding browned onions, reserving one tablespoon for topping.
7. Combine 2 tablespoons cornstarch, 3 tablespoons water. Mix to a smooth paste and add to meat mixture, stirring constantly until thick and clear.
8. Season to taste and pour into two quart casserole.

Apple Dapple Pudding

1. Sift together 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour, 1/2 cup sugar, double acting baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt.
2. Add 1 teaspoon celery seed.
3. Cut in 1/4 cup shortening until mixture resembles coarse meal. Blend in reserved brown onions.
4. Add 1 slightly beaten egg - one-third cup milk. Mix only until all flour is dampened. Drop by rounded teaspoonfuls onto hot meat mixture.
5. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees) 20-25 minutes.
6. To complete the menu, Mrs. Bake offers a fall favorite with her family for Apple Dapple Pudding.

APPLE DAPPLE PUDDING

1. Sift together 1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour, 1/2 cup sugar, double-acting baking powder.
2. Add 1/2 cup sugar.

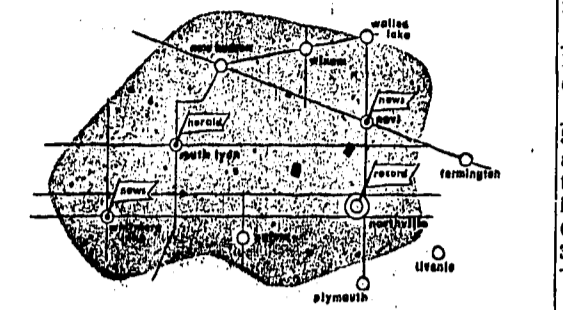

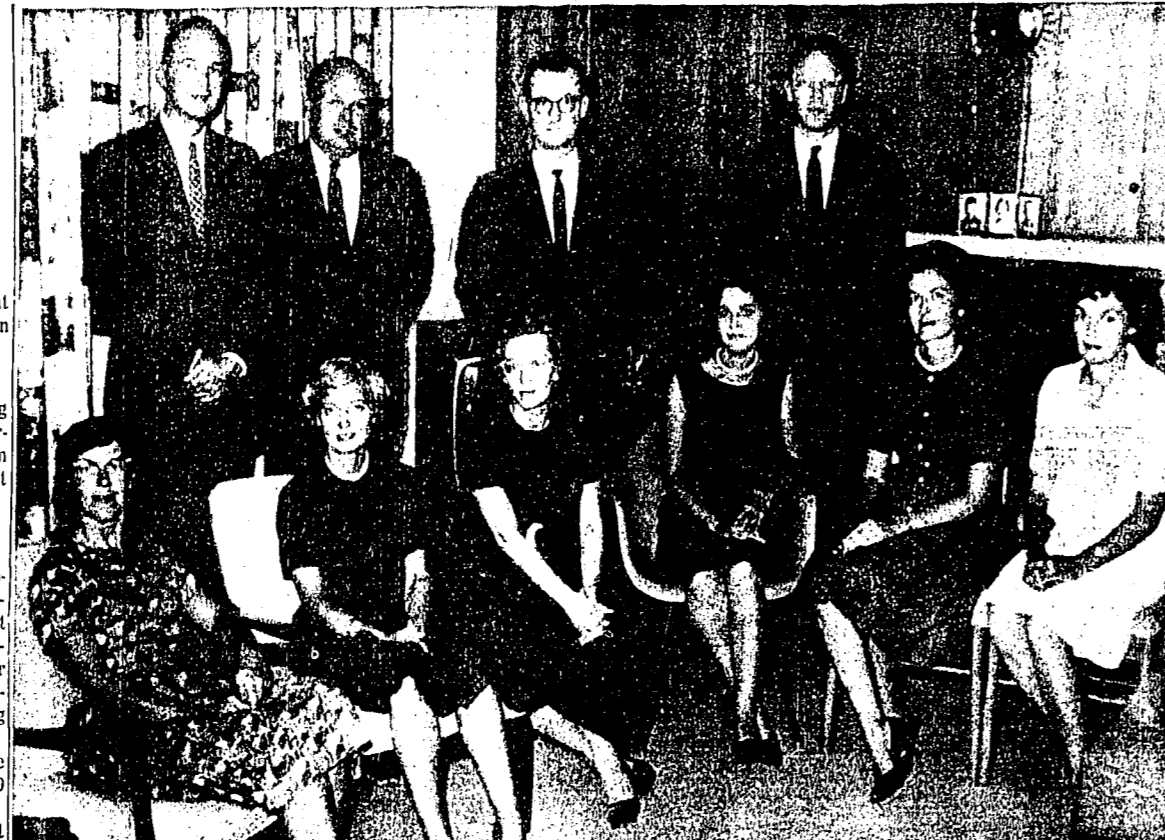

Gill Glasson doesn't pretend to be a public speaker. But last week he could have heard a Rotary pin drop when he addressed the Tuesday luncheon meeting of the local businessmen's group.

Up until last year Gill Glasson was a member of the Northville police force. Then he was felled by a stroke. Months of recovery followed. But Gill was left partially paralyzed.

Now he's active again. Not as an officer, but as a member of a group of handicapped persons who are determined to "get off the shelf and live again."

With the help and encouragement of three Northville men — Dr. Russell Achison, Attorney Clifford Hill and Al Smith, Sr., a builder and carpenter — Gill became one of the charter members of "Cerebral Vascular Accident Enterprises."

And in his modest manner Gill told the Northville Rotarians what his small group had been doing.

"We've made flower boxes, bed heads for rest homes and once we had an order for 200 small boxes to be made within a week and we did it," Gill explained.

He said that all members of CVA work together to help one another regain their confidence and to do something useful. "We're not a professional organization," he added.

But it was easy to regain that a profit of far greater significance was being gained by the CVA members.

Another CVA member sat at the speaker's table with Gill as he described the activities of the group. He is Harry Himmelsbach, an entrepreneur of Breaker's one of the community's most capable and successful businessmen.

Right now the CVA group is making colorful electric Christmas candles. They appear to be about three-foot tall and are made to withstand weather.

Gill said the price of the candles had not yet been determined.

Michigan Mirror

New Faces Due In Legislature

The Legislature of the Michigan State in 1963 is very different from that of recent years. Nine members of the State Senate definitely will not return during the past several months. The incumbents voluntarily mark the end of the ferry-boat service just east of the giant locks was established in 1888. The new gateway linking Michigan with Canada is expected to draw tourists from the north as well as those seeking to travel in the Canadian provinces. State Tourist Council officials said.

Michigan's other international bridges, the Ambassador Bridge in Detroit and the Blue Water Bridge at Port Huron, also are highly regarded for their tourist-attracting value.

Boaters in Michigan next summer may find a host of new rules and regulations governing their activities, depending on the success of a new committee established by the Legislature. The Boating Control Committee was created to promote water safety through more uniform boating regulations.

Headed by a member of the Secretary of State's office, Harold E. Bradshaw, the committee is authorized to recommend whatever controls seem necessary to protect public safety on local waters.

The committee is empowered to set boat speed limits and regulate the size and horsepower of boat motors, and establish hour restrictions on motorboats.

It may also direct the marking of special areas to reserve them for navigation, boating, swimming, fishing or other single uses.

Bradshaw, emphasized the law provides that all recreational activities on the water are subject to acceptance by local units of government. Enforcement of the regulations will be done by local authorities.

Future planning in aviation service for Michigan will be partially based on a recent survey conducted throughout the state under the direction of the Department of Aeronautics.

The airlines kept track of passenger origin & destination and asked each passenger to fill out an economic information post card. Volunteer interviewers questioned the pilots of general aviation aircraft before take-off and after landings.

James D. Ramsey, state aeronautics director, said the results of the survey will not be known until the end of the year.

"The results will be used to provide the statistical basis for sound planning here to allow our state to take advantage of the transportation and economic value of aviation in the years to come," he said.

One typical day during the survey, drawn out of the file as a sample, showed 512 introductory recorded almost 4,000 general aviation aircraft operations. Passengers' information cards were not fully returned for the sample day, said Ramsey.

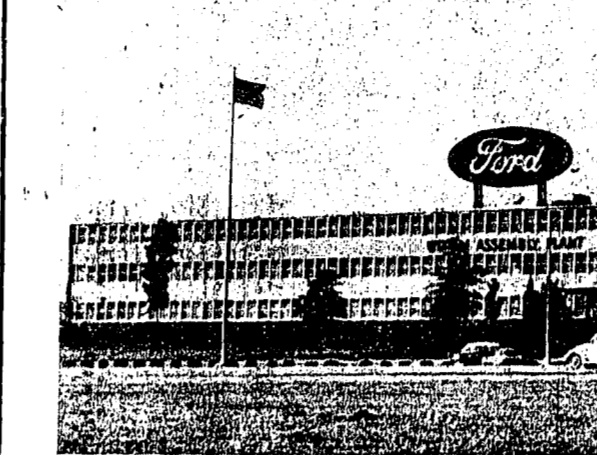

Blood Bank Collects 92 Pints, Gains 55

Novi's blood bank last week collected 92 usable pints of blood, but already its account is down to 55 pints.

Mrs. Gordon Deming, coordinator of the blood bank donation center held last Thursday, explained that about 10 of the pints collected were donated for other communities and individuals.

Another 27 pints went to clean up the "debt" Novi had made in overwriting its blood bank account, she said, so Novi now has 55 pints of blood on hand.

The Red Cross credits communities that participate in the amount of blood collected for the amount of blood donated to the community at the donation centers.

While the blood is put in immediate use, the community account remains to be drawn upon as needed.

Last year Novi collected 10 pints, and was overdrawn by the 27 pints at the end of last week's collection, Mrs. Deming pointed out.

She urged Novi residents to attend other area blood banks during the rest of the year to donate for Novi.

By a certain amount of over-draw, based on the amount collected at the donation center. Unless Novi receives further credit from later donations, she added, it may run out of a blood source.

Novi's only opportunity to add to its account will be donations at blood banks held in other area communities, she said.

A collection center will be held in Milford on November 8. Mrs. Deming's collection will take place in February.

Mrs. Deming also issued a "thank you" to all the volunteers who donated blood and to those who gave time and work for running the collection center.

All medical services at the blood bank were donated by area nurses and doctors. The refreshments for donors were supplied by the community at the dinner for the workers by the Mothers Club.

Novi Policemen Attend Courses

Two Novi policemen completed special training courses at different schools last week.

Patrolman Ralph Arbour completed the week-long traffic management institute, held at Michigan State University.

Sergeant Vern Loerfer finished a five-day course in methods of police work instruction held at the Metropolitan police academy.

Arbour's course dealt with traffic law enforcement, courtesy in dealing with violators and current changes in traffic laws. He attended the institute on a scholarship from the Automobile Club of Michigan.

The course Loerfer attended, held over a two-week period, was sponsored by the academy, the Wayne State University center for adult education and the delinquency control center.

The course was aimed at improving the quality of police work.
