Request Planners To Rezone, Vacate

The Novi village planning board Monday night received two requests for rezoning and vacating of streets.

The minimum lot size for the rezoning is 12,000 square feet, while one family residential district has a minimum requirement of 6,000 square feet.

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Retarded Facility Starting Additions

With the help and encouragement of three Northville men — Dr. Russell Atchison, Attorney Clifton Hill and Al Smith, Sr., a builder and carpenter — Gill became one of the charter members of "Cerebral Vascular Accident Enterprises."

And in his modest manner Gill told the Northville Rotarians what his small group had been doing.

"We've made flower boxes, bed heads for rest homes and nice we had an order for 200 small boxes to be made within a week and we did it," Gill explained.

He said that all members of CVA work together to help one another regain their confidence and to do something useful. "We're not a profit-making organization," he added.

But it was easy to regain that a profit of far greater significance was being gained by the CVA members.

Another CVA member sat at the speaker's table with Gill as he described the activities of the group. He is Harry Himmelsbach, an entrepreneur of Brainerd's one of the community's most capable and successful businessmen.

Gill said the price of the candles had not yet been determined.

The Novi library board last week voted to change the hours of operation of the library.

The library will be open on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 1 to 5 p.m., and on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 3 to 8 p.m., she reported.

Saturday hours will be 10 a.m. to 12 noon.

The library board also announced plans to present a feature film at the community building on October 11, when children will not have school because of teachers' institute.

The film will be shown at 2 p.m. Proceeds from the film will be used for library operating expenses, Mrs. Nichols said.

She also reported that the library board is planning to hold a fund-raising event to help defray the cost of the film.

Voter Registration For Fall Nears End

Registration to vote in the November 6 national, state and city election must be completed by October 4, Novi town clerk Hadley J. Bachert announced this week.

He said those eligible to vote but not registered in the township must register by October 4 in order to vote in November.

Those eligible to vote are U.S. citizens who are at least 21 years old and who will have lived in Michigan for at least six months and in Novi for at least 30 days prior to the election. They need not own property.

Bachert said registration may be made from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday at the Novi village hall on Novi road.

Ballots include persons who are absent from the community on election day, or who are unable to attend the polls for either physical or religious reasons.

Although most Northville officials would probably prefer that would wait until the subject of Detroit water seems bent upon becoming an issue for decision sooner than expected.

And it is certain to stir public interest and some definite conflicting viewpoints.

It has been generally expected that eventually this area — Novi, Northville and Plymouth — would buy its water from the city of Detroit. The plan is to extend the present Detroit main westward on Eight Mile to Sheldon road and then south to Plymouth. The line is already well developed.

The Detroit water board operates its system as a utility and is constantly seeking new customers to supply.

Its product has definite advantages including adequate supply and softness.

It also has disadvantages to communities already operating their own systems: cost and loss of control.

To areas like Novi and Northville and Plymouth townships, where water systems do not presently exist, Detroit appears to be the most logical and economical source.

But in order to make it profitable to construct lines to these areas the big water users — the cities of Northville and Plymouth — must first indicate willingness to buy.

Last week Detroit water board officials called for meetings with local area officials. It appears that Detroit would like some definite answers concerning out intentions. Do we want Detroit water and when?

In a letter to Northville's city manager it was pointed out that water would be available for next summer. The proposed rate would be about 54 percent higher than present.

It is generally believed that Detroit turned its attention to the area when the city of Plymouth asked permission to purchase or lease two acres of county-owned land in Northville township to construct a one-to-three-million gallon water reservoir.

Detroit officials interpreted this to mean that Plymouth was ready to enter the water supply business.

But Plymouth officials have said they want the high-land reservoir only to supply badly needed pressure for their present users.

Detroit says it has a commitment to construct water mains through this area to Plymouth by 1965.

If the cities of Northville and Plymouth are not willing to indicate their intentions concerning Detroit water, then Detroit water board officials are ready to build its lines now; it would divert its attention to other areas.

Northville city officials are happy with their present water supply, but recognize the ground supply in that township is running out and they are ready to turn their backs on Detroit because it may become a badly needed source of supply in just a few short years.

Further, it has been argued that soft Detroit water could be more economical when one considers cost of water softening and soaps.

Novi has expressed a definite interest in obtaining Detroit water. The Novi township is the cost of purchasing the existing system supplying Willowbrook subdivision, which is owned by the developer.

His asking \$150,000. Village officials believe this is high.

Northville township has little demand and no system. Officials recognize a water supply will be needed some day and are now establishing commissions that will control and provide maintenance for a township system.

Plymouth township is ready and apparently eager for Detroit water. The cities of Northville and Plymouth appear much the same — interested but not in a hurry.

One Northville official expressed a city point of view when it was mentioned that Plymouth township wanted the water. "I understand their need, but why should the taxpayers of the city who have not paid for this responsibility with their own money be hurried into buying Detroit water to accommodate an area that has waited and made no capital investment."

If Detroit would press Northville for an immediate answer, the council would probably ask for public hearings and a complete airing of all the facts — cost, present supply, etc.

As it stands now, Northville wants time. For this the council would probably ask for some contractual agreement for the future.

But, if Detroit says "now, or maybe never" — we have a serious consideration.

Council Slates Tuesday Deadline For Final Water System Decision

The village council Monday night set Tuesday as the deadline for a special council session to study and make a final decision about the question of Novi purchasing water from Detroit.

Councilman Donald Young, who has been serving on the water study committee along with council President Joseph Crupi, announced the decision.

Assistant Harold Ackley and Willowbrook Water company representative Paul LeBois, told the council Monday that the committee is about ready to report.

The Detroit water board has given the village three weeks in which to reply to the city's offer to sell Novi full treated and pressurized water for \$1.75 per 1,000 cubic feet.

The board outlined the council must consider the offer. It must also consider the offer.

Young added that LeBois does not wish to attend the discussion of the finances, but the village council is ready to make a decision.

Turning to other matters, the council gave final approval to two \$100,000 sewer projects and the other with water.
