Although most Northville officials would probably prefer that would wait until the subject of Detroit water seems bent upon becoming an issue for decision sooner than expected.

And it is certain to stir public interest and some definite conflicting viewpoints.

It has been generally expected that eventually this area — Novi, Northville and Plymouth — would buy its water from the city of Detroit. The plan is to extend the present Detroit main westward on Eight Mile to Sheldon road and then south to Plymouth. The line is already well defined.

The Detroit water board operates its system as a utility and is constantly seeking new customers to supply. Its product has definite advantages including adequate supply and softness.

It also has disadvantages to communities already operating their own systems: cost and loss of cost control.

To areas like Novi and Northville and Plymouth townships, where water systems do not presently exist, Detroit appears to be the most logical and economical source.

But in order to make it profitable to construct lines to these areas the big water users — the cities of Northville and Plymouth — must first indicate willingness to buy.

Last week Detroit water board officials called for meetings with local area officials. It appears that Detroit would like some definite answers concerning our intentions. Do we want Detroit water and when?

In a letter to Northville's city manager it was pointed out that water would be available for next summer. The proposed rate would be about 54 percent higher than present.

It is generally believed that Detroit turned his attention to the area when the city of Plymouth asked permission to purchase or lease two acres of county-owned land in Northville township to construct a one-and-a-half-million gallon water reservoir.

Detroit officials interpreted this to mean that Plymouth was ready to enter the water supply business.

But Plymouth officials have said they want the highland reservoir only to supply badly needed pressure for their present users.

Northville has an easement to construct water mains through this area to Plymouth by 1965.

If the cities of Northville and Plymouth are not willing to indicate their intentions concerning Detroit water, then Detroit water board officials are ready to build its lines now; it would divert its attention to other areas.

Northville city officials are happy with their present water supply, but recognize the ground supply is an increasingly scarce resource. They don't want to turn their backs on Detroit because it may become a badly needed source of supply in just a few short years.

Further, it has been argued that soft Detroit water could be more economical when one considers cost of water softening and soaps.

Novi has expressed a definite interest in obtaining Detroit water. The city has a long history of purchasing the existing system supplying Willowbrook subdivision, which is owned by the developer.

Northville township has little demand and no system. Officials recognize a water supply will be needed some day and are now establishing commissions that will control and price water for a township system.

Plymouth township is ready and apparently eager for Detroit water. The cities of Northville and Plymouth appear much the same — interested but not in a hurry.

One Northville official expressed a city point of view when it was mentioned that Plymouth township wanted the water. "I understand their need, but why should the taxpayers of the city who have not paid for this responsibility with their own money be hurried into buying Detroit water to accommodate an area that has waited and made no capital investment."

If Detroit would press Northville for an immediate answer, the council would probably seek for public hearings and complete airing of all the facts — cost, present supply, etc.

As it stands now, Northville wants time. For this the council would probably set for public hearings.

But, if Detroit says "now, or maybe never" — we have a serious consideration.

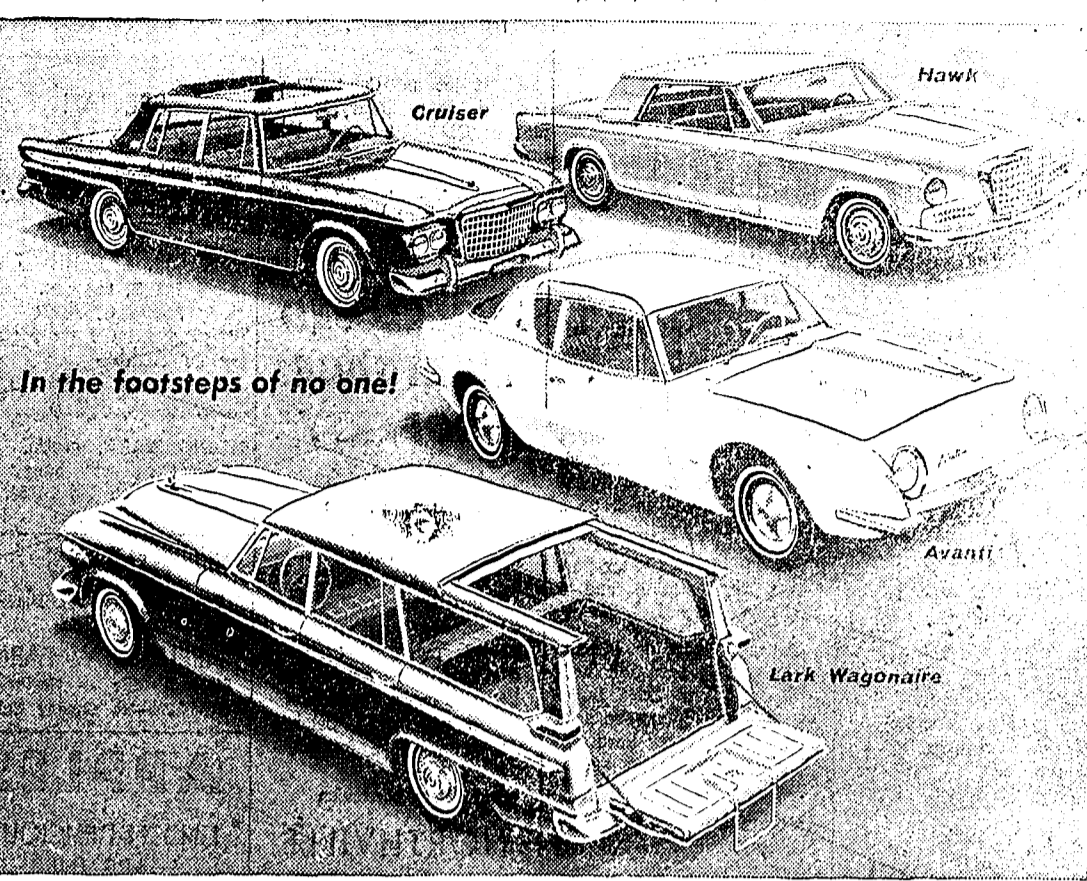



Heart Attack Victims Need Influenza Shots

Because the greatest suffering and deaths from influenza falls upon them, priority in influenza vaccinations should be given to victims of heart attacks and coronary disease, the Michigan Heart Association notified all physicians in the state this week.

The request, made in a letter by Dr. Muir Clapper, president of the Association, followed a series of warnings by local and state health authorities that an epidemic of Asian influenza is probable this winter.

Dr. Clapper, who urged, "Now is the time to begin immunization," listed four classifications of cardiac as being in greatest need of immunizations:

1. Rheumatic Heart with mitral valvular disease.
2. Left Ventricular failure.
3. Symptomatic coronary diseases.
4. All other cardiacs.

"This does not imply that protection against influenza for the chronic pulmonary patient, the diabetic, and the aged is not also necessary," Dr. Clapper, a professor of medicine at Wayne State University wrote, "but does recognize that the greatest suffering and death influenza falls upon the cardiac listed above."

MHA, a Michigan United Fund Agency, through education and public service projects, combats Heart and Cardiovascular disease throughout the state.

Duck Hunters Must Know Their Species

Michigan duck hunters will be called upon this season to know their ducks like they know their species.

To meet the test, the state's waterfowling will have to be on their toes in the fall. The reason is that duck hunting will be down throughout the season. Conservation Department game men offer the following as a sort of primer for fall shooting:

Michigan ducks are divided, for convenience, into Mergansers (fish ducks), Dabblers (marsh ducks) and Divers (open water ducks).

In flight, certain characteristics are useful for distinguishing the major groups. The dabblers have a slow wing-beat and a distinctive stretched-out horizontal position in the air that separates them from the other ducks.

Dabblers, in rising from the water, spring up almost vertically, especially when surprised, but Divers and Mergansers "glide" along the surface of the water before they take off.

Coming in to decoys, Dabblers tend to circle the blocks and hover for a moment with outstretched legs a few feet over the water, while Divers usually fly in at lower altitude and "touch down" directly.

The traits of these three groups provide good clues for identifying ducks. Of course, hunters need to know the birds in detail to each group. And there are some look-alike species within each category which may be most distracting eyes.

If hunters do their job - shooting the right combination of targets - they can actually bag two more birds each day than last year.

Most importantly over the long haul, there is some optimism that current conditions are nearing their end in the continent's northern "duck lake."

With the right break from the nation's gunners this fall, these birds might bounce back.

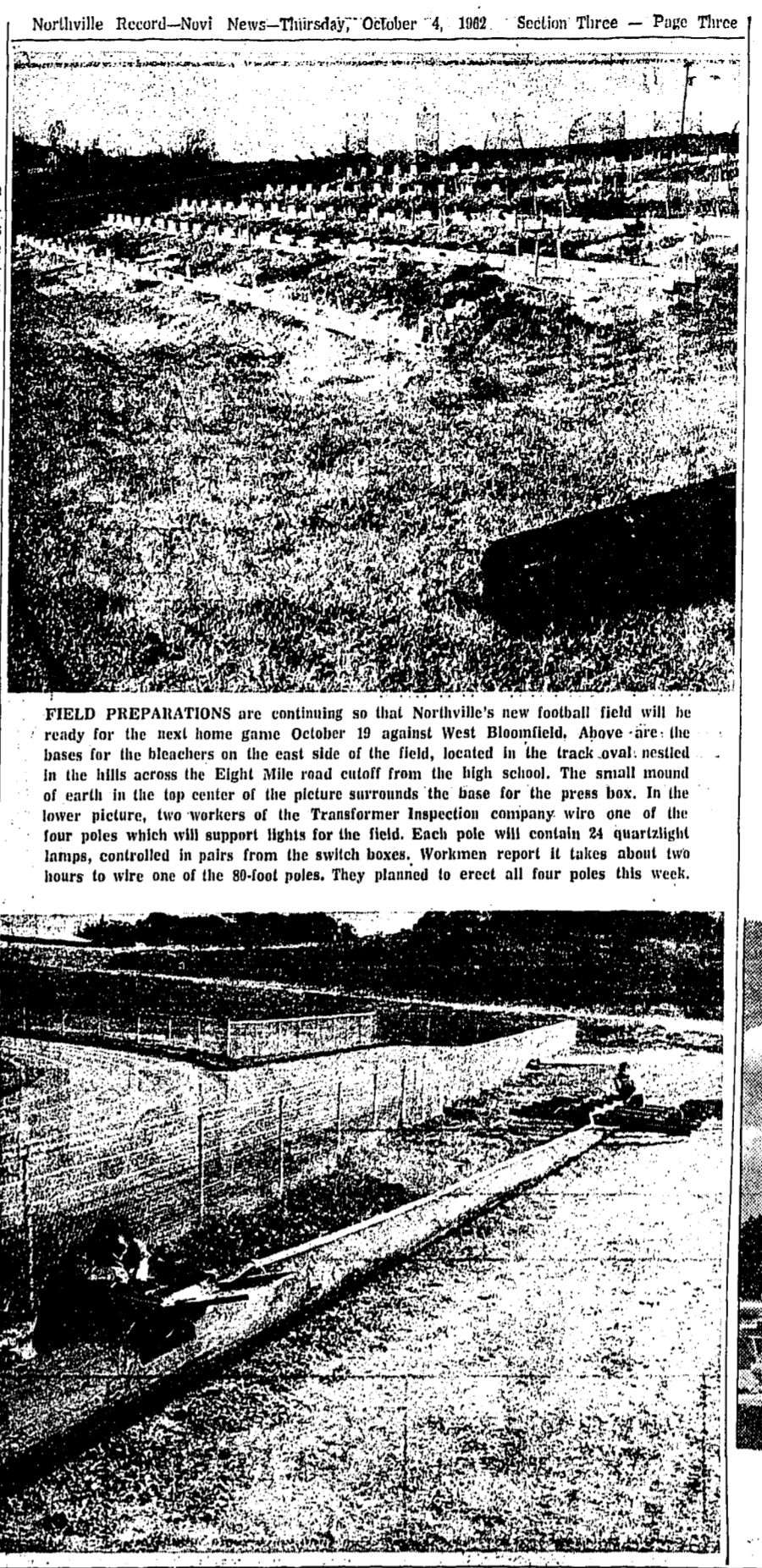

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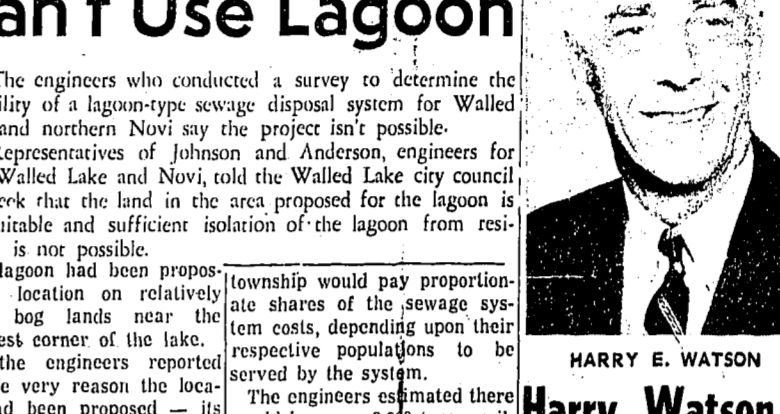
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Artists' Conception of Proposed Huron Valley Community Hospital



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
