Kitchen Diary

Old Favorites Please

"Very old, unstrained, but nevertheless delicious" are the terms Mrs. Robert Frost, of 19170 Smoak road, uses in describing the holiday recipes she submitted for this week.

She says the squash biscuits recipe was given her by her mother, who had obtained it from an aunt. She estimates the age of the recipe at about 100 years.

The recipe for Mince-meat was brought from England by Mrs. Frost's mother-in-law about 60 years ago. A yearly ritual a few weeks prior to the holiday season at her mother-in-law's home, Mrs. Frost has made it an annual treat in her own home.

SQUASH BISCUITS. Cream together: 1 c. sugar, 1 c. shortening, 1/2 c. squash (cooked and strained), 1 c. yeast (2 pkgs. yeast dissolved in 1 c. warm water), 1 c. milk, scalded and cooled. Stir thick. (Takes about 2 c. flour).

ENGLISH MINCEMEAT. 1 lb. sugar, 1 lb. mixed candied peel, 1/2 lb. currants, 1/2 lb. raisins, 5 lbs. apples (preferably Spices), 1 t. nutmeg, juice of 1 lemon, juice of 1 orange.

Mix altogether, pack in fruit jars and seal. Allow to stand several days before using. (Harder than using fruit jars I prefer to allow it to stand a few days in a crock, then put in freezer containers and freeze).

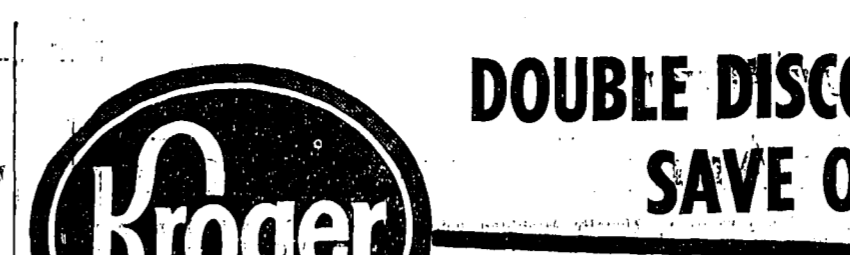

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SPEAKING for The Record

The federal government's public works acceleration act - aimed at pumping up the economy by encouraging immediate expenditures for needed projects - appears to be getting ready takers in the Northville-Novix-Wixom area.

Under the act the government has appropriated some \$900 million of which Michigan will receive \$90 million.

An agency has been authorized to negotiate all projects directly with the local community. Projects that qualify can receive up to 50 percent of the cost of the project from the federal government as a grant - not a loan.

The only hitch to the offer is one of the project must be ready to get underway immediately. And local funds cannot come from regular tax monies already budgeted but must represent special spending.

Naturally, hundreds of applications are pouring into the Housing and Home Finance Agency in Chicago which is administering the project. Undoubtedly, there will be more applications than funds available.

Wixom would like to have a number of roads as part of a road improvement program. The project would cost \$200,000 of which the state contributes from additional taxes next year.

Walled Lake is seeking the interest of Novi in construction of a sewage disposal plant that would serve the lake area proper. Estimated cost of this project is \$300,000.

In Northville the city council is working diligently on new city hall plans. With government participation it is hoped that a library and fire department facilities can be included in the structure. There is \$150,000 on hand for this project as a result of the sale of the community building to the school district.

We like the idea of including a library in the new city hall. It is badly needed - not because our local library is lacking in numbers of volumes - but because the facility itself is in falling down condition.

There will be a number of complications involved in the library question. The present structure is jointly owned by the city and township. They share the cost of maintenance and operation of the building. The proposed new structure would be owned by the city alone.

It is our opinion that cooperation of our community's governmental units (school, as well as city and township) has never been at a higher level.

So we're optimistic that this highly desirable community improvement can become a reality.
