Wixom would like to pave a number of roads as part of a road improvement program. The project would cost \$150,000 with the city's share coming from additional taxes next year

Walled Lake is seeking the interest of Novi in construction of a sewage disposal plant that would serve the lake area proper. Estimated cost of this project is \$800,000. Presumably, the two communities would have to raise half that amount by bonds,

In Northville the city council is working diligently on new city hall plans. With government participation it is hoped that a library and fire department facilities can be included in the structure. There's \$150,000 on hand for this project as a result of the sale of the community building to the school district. The remaining money needed would come from the federal government.

But it is our opinion that cooperation of our com munity's governmental units (school, as well as city and township) has never been at a higher level.


So we're optimistic that this highly desirable community improvement can become a reality.
