This week two well-known area officials announced that they were giving up their posts as heads of their respective governmental units. Circumstances and reasons surrounding the announcements differed, however.

In Northville township Supervisor George Clark told fellow board members that he would not be a candidate for re-election.

In Novi township Supervisor Prover Staman resigned to seek appointment to the Oakland county board of road commissioners.

Clark served two terms as supervisor of Northville township. And during his four years in office he devoted himself to the responsibilities of the job with complete thoroughness.

Clark points out that township activity is growing rapidly and says that he could not reasonably expect to do the work load without having his own business.

There are many achievements that could be singled out during Clark's administration — a new planning commission, sewer and water commission and efficiency and public service improvement — but none, we believe, compare to his efforts toward better community cooperation.

We believe Supervisor Clark has boosted considerably the relationship between city and township. He has suggested joint planning meetings, cooperated with a community economic development committee, joined in the effort to hold a joint city-township board meeting.

In short, he has recognized that boundaries do not divide the community insofar as common good and progress is concerned.

This new era of cooperation has served to strengthen each of our governmental units, thus dispersing the fears held by some that a dark, grim fate might fall and usurp their individuality.

We believe Supervisor Clark when he says that progress of personal business make it impossible to continue in public office. He would not give less than his full effort.

And we hope that his able board, and eventual successor, will continue this policy of community-wide thinking.

In Novi Staman's status is still somewhat "iffy." If he is chosen as road commissioner for the county, he cannot serve as township supervisor.

The selection was scheduled to be made in Pontiac Wednesday (yesterday). It was necessary that he submit his resignation to the board before he could be considered for the county position.

But this is a sticky question, and it is known that options arise sharply on the Novi board.

Staman has been Novi's supervisor for 10 years. It has been a period marked by progress, normal controversy and complacency — just about in that order.

We have not always agreed with Staman — but we'd call his handling average \$50, tops in any league. And frankly, we have to see him step aside.

Our congratulations to Phil Ogilvie, Northville's city attorney, for his "Silver Beaver" award in scouting.

Presented by the Sunset District, the award means that Ogilvie has devoted many hours to helping boys in scouting.

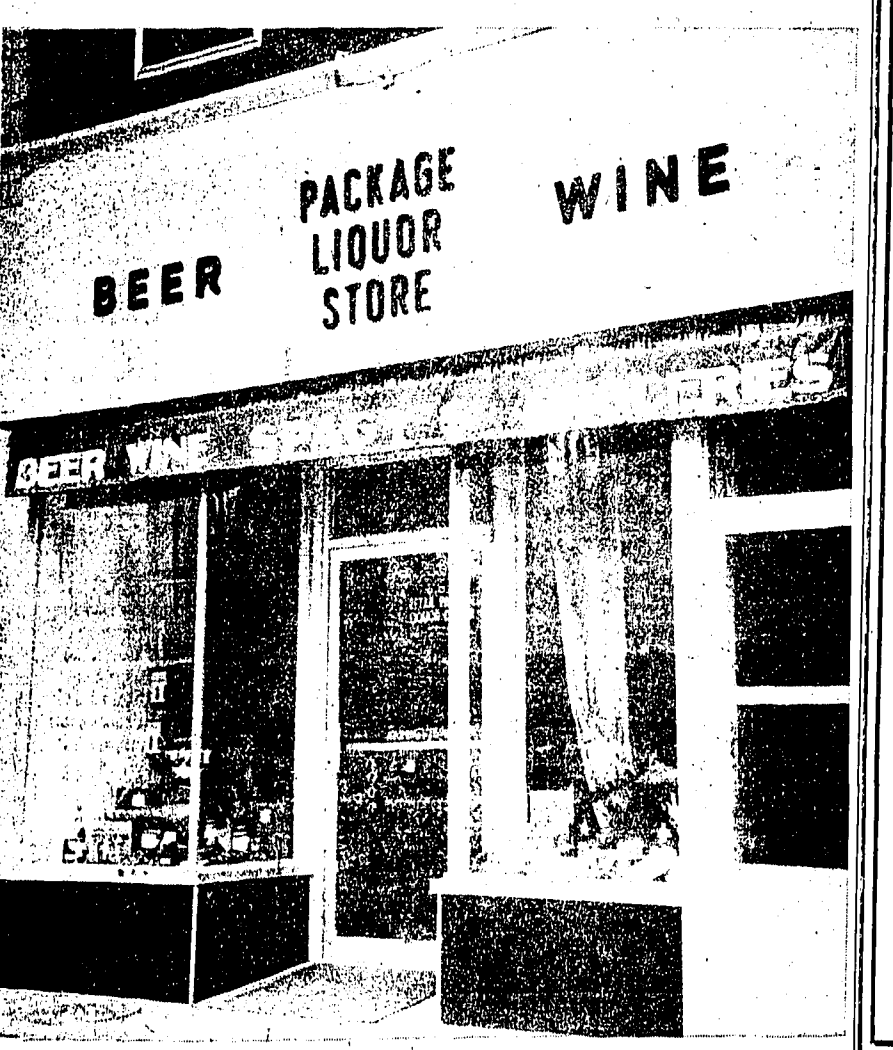
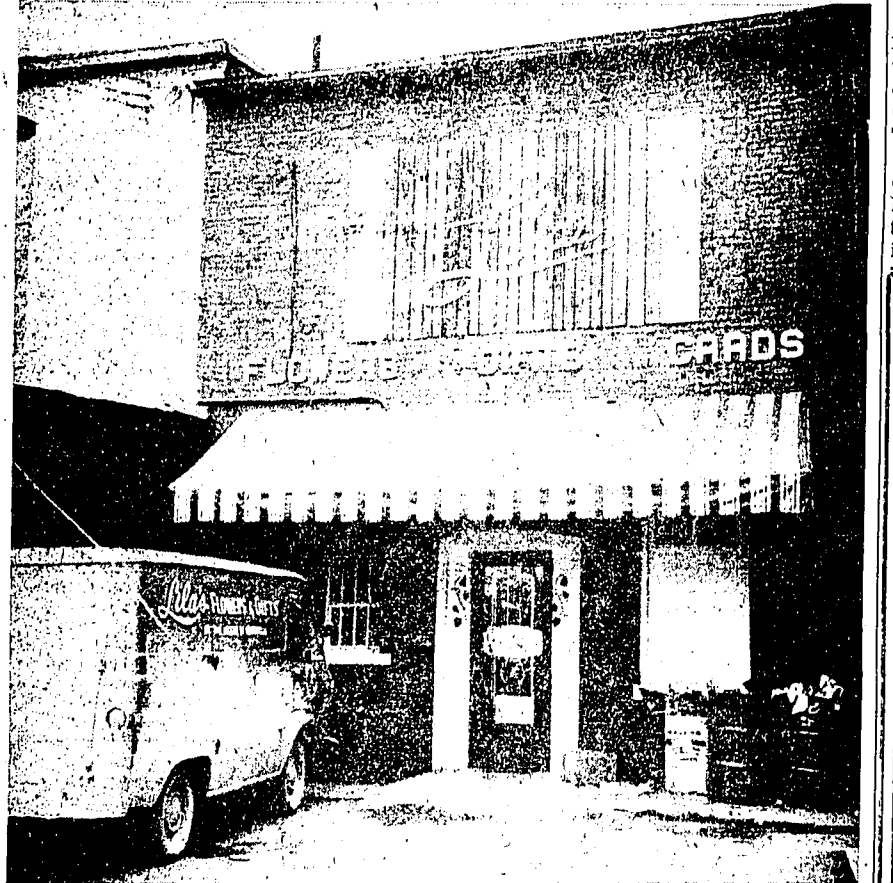
